From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. These same readings are used in every one of the 3 year cycle of our readings. Each of the readings speaks to the reality that God wills his Son to be made manifest to all the nations of the world. Our first reading from Second Isaiah written during the Babylonian Exile about 550 BC. He offers the captives a vision not only of better days to come, but also of a future of unimaginable joy. What he saw was a total disconnect from their experience of exile. The images he uses such as "the glory of the lord shines upon you" seem foreign to people after two generations in Babylon. He challenges them to believe that the God of Israel would once again restore them to glory as he had done with their ancestors.

Paul's Letter to the Ephesians is called Deutero-Pauline because the author is unknown but wrote in Paul's name and drew upon his authority, applying his theology and ethics to a contemporary situation. The letter was written between 80 and 110 AD and Paul was martyred in the late 60s, but this adaptation helps us understand that Paul's theology was working its way into common belief. The language of Paul and the Pauline Christians describe Jews and Gentiles as "coheirs" and "copartners." All believers are members of the "same body."This is one of the main themes of Paul: God makes himself manifest to the nations through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus.

We hear today from Matthew because he is the only one of the four gospels to tell us of the Magi. There is a parallel to Luke's gospel where shepherds visit. For Luke, recall that the birth of Christ is God coming into the world to empower the weak and the marginalized. For Matthew, who writes to a Jewish audience, he is pointing out that it took Gentiles to recognize the birth of

Christ because the Jews missed it. This recurring theme of Matthew includes the Gentiles in the historic promised and covenants between God and Israel and even appear in the find words of the resurrected Jesus to his disciples: "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." (Mt 28:19)

Plans are being finalized for our Homeless Shelter from February 11-24 at the Russian Church of the Nativity Social Center at Front and German Streets. I'm rather overwhelmed by your response to this project with volunteers to monitor the night as well as people preparing meals for 60 people and providing clothing, etc. We can still use additional volunteers. Sign up sheets are in the back of church near the bulletins.

The birth rate among women in the U. S. continues to fall, according to a new study. The fertility rate in the U. S. has dropped to an all-time low of 1.86, well below the replacement level of 2.1. *The Wall Street Journal*, in reporting the trend, notes that unless immigration makes up the difference, the American population will dip, with negative implications for the economy. This means fewer workers to propel the economy and a smaller tax base to finance benefits for the elderly. This same trend has been occurring in countries such as Italy, Greece, etc. and the results have devastated the economy.

The St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 14,600 pounds of food during November at a cost of \$676.04 to the parish. In addition, we had costs of \$400 for police patrol during the distribution of turkeys. Can you believe that? Some of the people get so out of hand that we have to have police here to give some of them a gift. It's a very small number but they disrupt the day for everyone. During November we served a total of 827 families. It is your ongoing generosity that supports

this worthwhile project.

The diocese recently shared information with the priests concerning the declining number of priests. That report shows that in the past ten years we have ordained 20 new priests. During that same period, however, 60 priests died and an additional 18 left the ministry. As a result, we had 78 less priests and only 20 new ones. The report also shows that Mass attendance in the West Erie Deanery has declined an average of 23% over the past ten years. One parish had a decline of 60%, another 45% and a third 40%. We have not yet received the data for the East Deanery of which we are a part. I can tell you, that Mass attendance at St. Patrick's during that period of time has increased rather dramatically.

We're finally able to give you a bottom line on the Irish Festival. Our one-time up front expenses totaled \$18,000. \$14,000 of that was for electrical work alone. We also had to build a stage and do several other things. As a result, our profit was about \$30,000. If we didn't have those one time expenses, the profit would be closer to \$50,000. Next year we want to start buying one piece of kitchen equipment each year so we don't have to rent them.

When children exhibit dramatic behavioral changes, adults must find out what caused the changes. Being aware of what's happening with our children means talking to, listening to, and observing them—at every opportunity.
