

Today is the Feast of the Ephiphany of the Lord. This ancient ceremony, which actually predates Christmas, is part of a fourfold manifes-

tation of the Christ that begins with the shepherds, and continues with the Magi, Jesus' baptism in the Jordan and his first miracle at Cana. Today's celebration focuses on the fact that Christ comes not just to the House of Israel but to all nations, a reality particularly articulated by Paul who was the very first to understand that Jesus came for all. Had those who argued against Paul remembered their Scripture, they might not have been so resistant. This magnificent first reading from Isaiah anticipates Israel's light to all the nations. Her exile will end and the darkness in their hearts will give way to a bright light. No flame of a star will brighten their light, but the Lord himself will shine upon them. Isaiah paints a picture of impossible things: their children will be carried to Israel by the Gentiles in whose lands they have been exiled; within Israel, foreigners will sing praises to Israel's God.

Our second reading from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians contains Paul's defense of his right to be called an apostle, even though he acknowledges that he did not enter by being a disciple of Christ, but came in through the back door. He notes that he did not experience Jesus on earth, but in a divine revelation and he believes that he is given the special task of taking Christ to the Gentiles. Paul met with great resistance among the Israelites, particularly Peter.

An epiphany is a manifestation and what is manifested in today's gospel is a child who is God among us. We find this story only in Matthew and he wants most of all to demonstrate that Jesus' life fulfills the ancient prophecies and that the hand of God guides Jesus from birth to death. We're told that not only Herod, but "all Jerusalem" felt the tremors from Bethlehem. These leaders had strayed so far from the promises of the patriarchs that they feel compelled to plot against the very will of God. This story would have been a great insult to Jewish leadership because it is saying that they could not see the coming of the Christ; it takes pagans from foreign lands to first recognize that God has come among us. From the moment they heard this story, the would have begun plotting to rid themselves of this new born King of the Jews.

Today we encounter the Magi, a story told only in Matthew. It is not found in any of the other gospels. The popular story contains many details that are assumed to be part of Scripture, but are not!! We assume there are three Magi, but scripture doesn't say that. We have names for them, but Scripture doesn't say that. It's often assumed that the Magi traveled on camels, but there is no mention of that in Scripture. The Magi are pictured as coming to the manger shortly after the birth of Jesus. However, the story says that they came to the "house." Remember, Herod had every child two years and younger put to death, which means that Jesus must have been somewhere around that age. The story doesn't say that the Magi followed the star from the East, rather, it says that the observed the star at its rising. We also believe that the Magi went back to their own country by another route because of a dream, but no mention is made in Scripture of a dream!

The Magi could not have had an easy trip. Travel was difficult and dangerous. Roads were bad with no signposts: inns were awful places to stay: thieves were everywhere and there was no law enforcement to protect people. In the story, Jesus is adored by Gentiles at the same time that he faces death from the leader of his own people. Herod. The Magi prostrate themselves and give homage to Jesus, an action properly given only to God. Throughout Jesus' life and even after his resurrection, there will be two ways of responding to the revelation of who he is. On one hand discovery, new awareness, acceptance and homage. On the other hand: fear, defensiveness, anger and violence. There is no neutral approach to Jesus and this story exemplifies that.

Frankincense, one of the gifts of the Magi, is made from the resin of the boswellia tree that grows in the Horn of Africa, near Arabia. Scientists believe there may soon be a shortage because farmers are cutting down the trees to increase land for their cattle or farmland. Most estimates are that they will all be gone in 50 years. About half of the 4,500 tons of frankincense exported annually from Ethiopia is sent to China where it is used in medicine.

and the doors of the sacraments must not be closed for simply any reason." *Pope Francis in his new encyclical The Joy of the Gospel.* Those words could have ramifications not only for divorced and remarried Catholics but also calls for rethinking refusing the Eucharist to politicians and others who do not uphold church teaching on some matters.

My apologies for the long delay with the new ladies restroom in St. Patrick's church. The process was much more complicated than we anticipated mainly because that building is built so well that trying to get through the walls, etc. is a real nightmare. We're getting very close to being complete. Then we'll start on the men's room.

We have had all of the sacramental records at St. Patrick's photocopied and put on discs. The 176 year old ledgers are now wrapped in a way that no humidity can get to them and we now can read the information on a disc on the computer. I am now starting to do the same thing with the sacramental records at St. Hedwig's so that they are preserved.

During November, the St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 19,886 pounds of food at a cost of \$518.77 to the parish. We distributed to 901 families, a sharp increase from the normal 700. I spoke recently with Rev. Rick Crocker of the City Mission and he was telling me how their number of clients has skyrocketed. How Congress can allocate huge amounts of money for some of the silly projects they do and then attack the most vulnerable in our society by cutting food stamps and monies for the poor is beyond me.

Paddy had a heavy night of drinking with his buddies and started home in the midst of a howling, ice cold rain storm. Part way home, he stumbled and fell about five feet down into an open ditch. A bit later, his friends started home and found him lying there. Unable to get him out by themselves, they asked what he wanted. "Get the rabbi," Paddy replied. "What?" they asked. "Get the rabbi," he said again. Finally they asked, "Why do you want the rabbi?" Out of the ditch came Paddy's shaky voice, "Dear God, you would want to call a priest out on a nite like this!"

Each of us having received this light by virtue of our baptism is responsible for manifesting its glory. What areas of darkness around you would you like to bring some light?
