





Today is the feast of the Epiphany of the Lord. Our first reading from the prophet Isaiah announces to Jerusalem that her time of exile will come to an end and that a new and glorious day of hope and light has dawned for them. In the midst of murky clouds and darkness a light has begun shining, and the light shines directly on those who have been living in fear. Isaiah's words have special meaning for us today. We are being roused from our sleep to hear God's

message of hope.....Our second reading is from Paul's letter to the Ephesians and Paul is telling us that the revelation of God's saving action is not just a past event we gather to remember, but a present and ongoing reality that the Church must continually announce. Paul says that the universality of God's plan was not made known in the past but is now revealed by the Spirit. What does it mean? The very people Israel feared are now part of their family. Those once considered to be "others" are now "us." God has now made Jew and Gentile co-heirs and members of the same body.....In our Gospel, we hear today from Matthew because he is the only Gospel author to tell us this story of the Magi. There is not a single word about it in any of the other 3 gospels. Recall he is writing to a Jewish audience to show them that Christ is the fulfillment of all OT prophesies and that the Jewish people did not recognize Christ when he came. Instead it took these pagan magicians who recognized him and come to worship. And, once again, we hear Matthew take an Old Testament prophecy and relate it to ChristLet me update you on plans for the restoration of St. Patrick's Church. A "mock-up" or ten foot wide section from floor to the dome will be done in the coming weeks. This allows all of us to see what will be done throughout the building as well as allow the committee to tweek or make changes in the appearance. Work will begin in mid-August 2012 and will start in the northwest corner of the church. The workmen need places in the ceiling to provide breaks for the work. Once they complete this area, they will move to the center of the sanctuary. During that time, we will use a small portable altar in the center aisle, and we won't use lectors because the only microphone will be the one I am wearing......Once the entire sanctuary is complete, the area along the east wall will be scaffolded and work begun there. Then they will scaffold the center of the church to do the dome but we will have access to the main aisle though it will be a bit dark. Then to the west center of the church. Then they will start and go across the back of the building.....As they finish each area, the company restoring the pews will come in on a Monday morning and take apart all of the pews in that area, install the new cushions, reassemble them and put them in place. We will do the carpeting of the aisles as the last and final step in the work.....Also to be done scheduled here during that time encouraging them to use St. Hedwig's or another church as their wedding is going to be terribly disrupted. We will only use the church for weekend Masses. I hope to have all funerals at St. Hedwig's during this period. We will not have any other services in the church and the building will not be open during the day as it is now...... know this is going to be disruptive and unpleasant, but it's going to be worth every discomfort when we finally restore this magnificent building.....We will keep a constant update of the work on our web page and you will be able to see it each week when you come to Mass.....Two trends that are beginning to develop rather rapidly in the diocese are two issues that have to do with death. First of all, burials in our Catholic cemeteries have declined at a rapid rate. More and more people are opting for cremation and then not burying the urn. Church law says that the urn must be interred. Secondly, when someone died in the past, it was customary for people to offer a Mass for that person. That is a custom that is almost totally disappearing. Today, instead of offering a Mass, people tend to make a donation to a favorite charity of the deceased. We have parishes in the diocese where they simply have no Mass intentions. It's interesting to try to keep our finger on the changing church and world in which we live.....St. Patrick's Parish has received its annual distribution of \$1,610 from the trust established by the late Father Stephen Cauley. The letter from the diocese notes that its use is at the discretion of the pastor. Though there is temptation to use it for a cruise, it will go into the St. Patrick's Foundation......Have you ever thought of remembering your parish in your will?......An old Italian man wanted to plant some tomatoes in his garden in New Jersey, but the soil was rocky and he was too old to dig it himself and needed help. His son, Vinnie, was in prison, and the father sent him a letter complaining that there was no one to help him with the garden. Vinnie felt bad that he wasn't able to help his dad, but he thought that he had better send a response to his letter. "Dad," he wrote, "don't dig up the garden; that's where the bodies are." The next week the FBI showed up at that father's home and demanded access to the garden. They proceeded to dig up the entire garden looking for bodies. The following week, Vinnie sent his dad a second letter. "Go ahead and plant," he wrote, "that's the best I could do under the circumstances.".....I mentioned a few weeks ago that we have a new addition to the sound system which records the homily each week and then puts it on our web page so that shut-ins, etc. can click on that and listen to it. I want to thank Attorney Jay Habas, a St. Patrick parishioner and a lector, for taking the lead with doing this. I had also mentioned that it costs about \$1,600 and if anyone would want to make a donation of perhaps \$200 toward it, we can list on the web page that it is in memory of someone you designate. Lecture on Catholic Thought and Action

Gannon will welcome Todd David Whitmore, Ph.D., as the keynote speaker for the University's Thomas J. and Mary H. Loftus Lecture on Catholic Thought and Action. The lecture is free and open to the public and will be held at 7:30pm, Tuesday, January 31 in the Waldron Campus Center, 124 West 7th St. Whitmore is associate professor of theology and director of the program in Catholic social tradition at the University of Notre Dame. Whitmore's lecture at Gannon, "The Coherence of Catholic Social Teaching: A Framework for the Global Economic Crisis", will offer a broad overview of Catholic social teaching and the contemporary social issues and concerns. Whitmore's lecture will be the focal point of the University's "Celebration of Catholic Education at Gannon."

The Epiphany of the Lord What is the Epiphany?

According to the Catechism of he Catholic Church, the Epiphany is "the Feast which celebrates the manifestation to the world of the new-born Christ as Messiah, Son of God, and Savior of the world. The Feast celebrates the adoration of Jesus by the Wisemen (Magi) from the East, together with His Baptism in the Jordan and the Wedding Feast at Cana in Galilee (p.876; no. 528).
