

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord and we read first from Isaiah. While the exile in Babylon took place more than two millennia ago. its spiritual significance remains with us as it speaks to the condition of the human heart that so regularly wanders from God, languishes in self-imposed exile and when it hears the promise of redemption, must choose whether to heed or ignore it. Isaiah speaks comforting words to exiles longing for liberation; but all we know from the text is that the prophet spoke. We do not know the response of the people. There are two details relating to today's liturgy. First, the prophet crying in the desert closely resembles John the Baptist. Second, the hope and joyful expectation speak s of God coming with "power" to restore Israel.

In the Letter to Titus we are told that through baptism, Christ comes into our lives and becomes the driving force that conforms us to the will of the Father. Baptism, we are told, initiates a lifelong training for a life in the Spirit and cleanses us of godless ways and worldly desires. We are also reminded that we live in a middle time between Christ's first coming and his return and that this interim time is not to be marked by fear but by gratitude.

The remarkable relationship between Jesus and his cousin rests at the center of this brief gospel. John has so impressed the people with his teaching, his austere lifestyle that they begin to ask themselves if he is the Messiah. Several pretenders had tried to claim the messianic mantle, and each was eventually exposed. But John is different. He makes no claims about himself, he challenges people to live with integrity. John has no delusions about himself and quickly acts to dispel any misunderstandings. With striking humility, he points to one who is greater than he.

Lent begins very early this year (February 10) and I am going to offer two separate Scripture classes. A three-part morning class will be offered at 10 AM and will address the passion and crucifixion of Jesus as it is presented in dramatically different ways in the four gospels. A second three -part evening class will be an Introduction to the Four Gospels. I will supply handouts for both classes. The only thing I ask is that you call the parish office and let us know if you will be attending so I know how many handouts to prepare. If you are attending the evening class, please indicate which time you would prefer: 5 PM, 5:30 PM, 6 PM, 6:30 PM or 7 PM and I will go with whatever time is most popular. The classes will be held on Wednesday, March 2, March 9 and March 16.

St. Patrick's Parish will again host a Homeless Shelter February 10-16 at the Church of the Nativity Social Center. This year we will not be collecting clothing, but instead will ask for cash donations so that we might purchase what the clients need. We're in need of volunteers to prepare and serve an evening meal to up to 75 people; to staff the Shelter from 7 PM until 7 AM. Once people leave the shelter in the morning, they can go to the Upper Room (10th & Peach) for the Bishop's Breakfast which provides them with a daily hot cooked meal.

There are envelopes in the back of St. Patrick's Church if you wish to make a donation to help us with the costs of the Homeless Shelter. It will cost us approximately \$6,000 to undertake a week's hosting of the Shelter.

Bishop Persico is going to meet with all of the priests of the diocese on January 11 to announce the reconfiguration of Catholic schools in the city of Erie. In April he will meet again with all of us to announce the reconfiguration of parishes in the city of Erie. There will again be a period of time, as there was with the school proposal, for

people to provide input and then the final announcement of the reconfiguration will be given in June with the restructuring to take place in early September 2016.

Again, might I thank you for your generosity with our Christmas collection. You have no idea how these extra monies help me with bills. As I also mentioned earlier, we tithe 10% of that Christmas collection and give it to St. Martin's Center. Your generosity helps the parish as well as the poor and the needy of our inner city.

I am on the board of BEST (Bayfront Eastside Task Force) and we work in tandem with Erie Insurance and UPMC Hamot to improve the neighborhood from the Bayfront to East Sixth and from State to Reed Sts. As a result of those efforts, we have demolished over 50 badly deteriorated homes, have built over 25 new homes, have created some very nice low income apartments as well as created a great deal of green space. Take a drive through the neighborhood sometime to see all that has been done. Thanks to this coordinated effort, things are changing.

A parishioner at St. Patrick's undertook a special project for Christmas. He contacted almost all of the attorneys in town, some doctors, bankers, etc. and as a result of his efforts, he gave me 71 \$50 gift cards to Wegman's. We distributed these through both St. Martin's Center as well as BEST. I am a bit overwhelmed at your generosity over the Christmas season. The gifts for St. Martin's Center, these gift cards, outreach to BEST, etc. I've never been in a parish with such a social conscience as I experience here.

Having just moved into his new office, a pompous Colonel was sitting at his desk when an airman knocked on the door. Conscious of his new position, the Colonel quickly picked up the phone, told the airman to enter, then said into the phone, "Yes, General, I'll be seeing him this afternoon and I'll pass along your message. In the meantime, thank you for your good wishes, sir." Feeling as though he has sufficiently impressed the young enlisted man, he asked, "What do you want?" "Nothing important, sir," the airman replied, "I'm just here to hook up your telephone."


