



Today is the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. By placing this event at the end of the Christmas cycle of feasts, it Best gives us an opportunity to reflect on the manifestation of God in the person of Christ. Elements of the first reading are embedded in the gospel

where we hear the same sentiment ("with whom I am well pleased") addressed to Jesus as is here addressed to God's "servant" as "one with whom I am well pleased." Four sections of the Book of Isaiah are known as Songs of the Suffering Servant, poetic sections that pay tribute to a "chosen" one" whose mission is to bring justice, but whose fidelity to God's will brings him great suffering. Today's liturgy clearly identifies that Servant as Jesus who saw his life as the fulfillment of these prophecies. In the final section of today's excerpt we no longer hear about a suffering servant but one who opens eyes, frees prisoners, etc.

In our second reading from Acts of the Apostles Peter will allude to Christ's baptism and presents Christ as THE sacrament of God to the world, the manifestation and implementation of God's will among his people. Peter understands that what Isaiah said would be accomplished through the suffering servant—Christ. A God given vision has brought Peter to the home of the gentile Cornelius, where he discovers that God plays no favorites. Formerly an adamant proponent of Jesus only for the Jews, Peter suddenly recognizes the error of his ways. Speaking to a gentile who. even before baptism, has received the gift of the Holy Spirit humbles Peter and colors his tone.

Already in Advent we heard John's selfabasement when he said, "One who is coming after me is mightier than I." Then he spoke to the crowds, today he speaks directly to Jesus, and yet Jesus submits to John's baptism. The early church saw conflict between Jesus's followers and those of John, whom some believed to be greater than Jesus. In that context, the baptism posed a problem for Jesus seems to be submitting to John as if he were greater. The dialogue between these cousins is Matthew's answer to the problem: Jesus did submit, but it was "to fulfill all righteousness" not to concede superiority. Jesus submits as did the suffering servant in the first reading, and thus the baptism established the servant character of Jesus's ministry. Matthew's account differs in significant ways from

Mark and Luke's accounts. In those accounts the voice from heaven speaks directly to Jesus (YOU are my beloved) in an intimate moment between Father and Son. But in Matthew, God addresses not Jesus but the crowd ("THIS is my beloved,") making the baptism more a manifestation of Jesus's true identity as God's Son and God's faithful servant. Since this baptism leads to the cross, perhaps the voice should sound like the voice that spoke to Mary years earlier: "Be not afraid. You have found favor with God."

"We do not live better when we flee, hide, refuse to share, stop giving and lock ourselves up in our own comforts. Such a life is nothing less than slow suicide." Pope Francis in his encyclical The Joy of the Gospel.

Now I need to ask parishioners to notify the parish office when such a need arises so that we can bring in some meals. A new baby, coming home from the hospital, etc.

Bishop Persico has asked churches in the city to open facilities to accommodate the homeless during the winter months. We do not have a facility, but our neighbors at the Russian Church of the Nativity are opening their Parish Center Feb. 12-23 for the homeless and are looking for volunteers, hopefully from St. Patrick's and St. Hedwig's. Volunteers are needed to make/serve meals each night for about 40 people. Others are needed to take shifts at the center from 7-11PM, 11PM-3AM and 3-7AM each night. Volunteers will have a training session and will be supervised at all times. From the Pastor's Desk continued......

I'm happy to tell you that 7 of our parishioners helped with the December homeless week. The total number of homeless people (individuals and families) in Erie County increased 39% between 2012 (731) and 2013 (1,195). The total number of homeless children in Erie County increased 50% between 2012 (128) and 2013 (255). Transition and mobility is a risk factor related to youth who belong to families who move frequently. It is correlated with juvenile delinquency, truancy, substance abuse and depression. Youth in the city of Erie have an elevated risk factor score that is higher than Erie County, that of the state of Pennsylvania and the entire USA (Source: PA Youth Survey).

Someone asked recently if there were people interested in forming a Bible Study Group. If you are interested, please call the office and leave your name.

Last February I invited all of the special ministries (lectors, Eucharistic ministers, choir, ushers, greeters) to the rectory for a drink and heavy finger food. This year, rather than have one event for everyone, we are breaking it down into the individual ministries and are inviting the ministers as well as their spouses to join for an evening. I've already had the group in who care for and clean the stations, next is the choir and then the lectors.

The Baptism of the Lord

Is there any connection between the Baptism of the Lord and my own personal Baptism? Yes there is! When a person is Baptized, Christ Himself **Assimilates** or joins you to Himself. This union makes them adopted sons and daughters of His Eternal Father and sharers in union with, through Jesus. A sharing in this type of union is called sharing "God's Life" or Grace. God keeps the union from His side by dwelling within our souls through the Holy Spirit. You and I keep union from our side by our wills and our willpower aided by God i.e., staying in a "State of Grace". To stay in state of grace, we must say "no" to many sinful urges and temptations...and in this way, we could say that doing so is a continuation of what was started at Jesus' Baptism and continued right up to the Cross.

CHILD PROTECTION AND CREATING SAFE ENVIRONMENTS

Be vigilant: It is vitally important that we are constantly vigilant—that we always observe the behaviors of those who interact with children. We must always communicate our concerns to the appropriate parties. Sometimes this mean communicating our safety concerns to our children. And sometimes this means communicating our concerns about seemingly inappropriate behavior to those who are in a position to intervene. Parents must also listen carefully to their children and observe both their children's activities and the behavior of older children and adults who interact with them. When children exhibit dramatic behavioral changes, adults must find out what caused the changes. Being aware of what's happening with our children means talking to, listening to, and observing them—at every opportunity. A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7

Reading II: Acts 10:34-38

Gospel: Matthew 3:13-17



In today's Gospel we read about the profound religious experience Jesus had at the river Jordan. Jesus became aware at his baptism that his heavenly Father was very pleased with him, that he belonged to God as his Son, and that it was now time to begin his mission. And that is what he did. His baptism inaugurated his mission and he embraced it wholeheartedly. The disciples initially felt that their mission was to the Jewish people, but after Jesus' resurrection, it became clear to them that God is the God of all humankind. And our baptism is meant to draw us into this global awareness, that we are a world-wide community of believers and doers. In living out our baptism call to a wide embrace, we sacramentalize in our actions our belief that God is the God of all people. It is about treating all people with respect, dignity, and love. That was Jesus' mission. That is our mission.

<u>A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE</u>: The words in today's gospel, "This is my beloved, with Him I am pleased," are words every child needs to hear often. Affirmation is important to raise happy and confident children.














