



Today is the 2nd Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from Isaiah. The passage comes from a Best section of Isaiah known as Trito-Isaiah or Third Isaiah because it is believed to have been written by a different author than chapters 1-39

and 40-55. Third Isaiah draws on Isaian themes. but develops them in light of thepeople's new situation. No longer are the people exiles in a foreign land; they have returned home to Jerusalem. We hear that the Lord has restored Israel and the names given Jerusalem reflect the Lord's forgiveness for the people's association with pagan fertility cults. God refers to Jerusalem as a bride, an obvious connection to today's gospel.

For the first four Sundays of Ordinary Time, our second reading comes from the latter half of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Today we are focused on the diversity of gifts in the Christian community. Corinth was mired by ugly divisions within the church. They were silly issues that sidestepped the real issues such as what kind of meat they can eat, should women cover their heads when they pray, etc. Paul explains to them the diversity of gifts and how we all use our unique talents for the good of all. The last gift he mentions is "speaking in tongues" because it was the most controversial of all of the gifts.

Our gospel from John is the familiar story of the Wedding Feast at Cana, a story only found in John. It is not to be found in Matthew, Mark or Luke. This is the first of four signs in John's gospel, signs that are much more than miracles because they will reveal the abundant glory and power that Jesus brings into the world. There are three distinct sections to this reading. The first is the setting. The second includes the preparation for the sign, the sign itself and the headwaiter's public recognition of what Jesus has done. Note that Jesus doesn't do anything that causes the water to turn into wine. Rather, his words coupled with the obedient action of the servants yield the transformation. The consequences of the sign follow in the last section and we learn that more signs are to come. Witnessing this miracle will allow the disciples to make the next step in their faith journey.

I've been to Cana and it's a beautiful little village in southern Galilee. There are wonderful remains of an early house which gives you an indication

of how people lived. An open courtyard was a very prominent part of the house. There is also a small fourth century church near what is believed to be the site of the miracle though contemporary Scripture scholars dismiss it as not being historically correct.

It's amazing seeing the large number of people who are stopping to see the church and the joy and wonder they express at what they see. Everywhere I go people stop me and comment on the church.

I can't figure out the delay in the rest of the electrical order. It was placed in early November and we still do not have it. When the rest of the lighting is put in place you're going to be even more amazed because the room will just jump out at you. Hopefully it will be here soon.

There has been such interest expressed by the employees at Erie Insurance Exchange that I am working with their communications department and we are scheduling four different times for the people who want to see the church to come over and see it. The times are being scheduled during their lunch hours and the communications department will determine which groups can come at what particular time. As you know, without the generosity of Erie Insurance, we would not have been able to do this. We had to vacate the building and their generously giving us the former Cauley Auditorium made all of this possible. And beyond allowing us to use the building, they would not take any rent nor anything to cover the cost of the utilities. Erie Insurance is the best thing that ever happened to downtown Erie.

The same interest has been expressed by UPMC Hamot for us to schedule an Open House so that their employees might also see the restored building.

The regular tour groups who visit the church are all now calling and scheduling tours. Sister Marie gives an explanation of the building, Alice Daub opens the gift shop and Mark Alloway gives a demonstration on the pipe organ.

In conjunction with the diocese, the parish office will be closed on Monday for Martin Luther King Day. Please notice that there is no Mass also.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

A new sociological study reveals that Catholics now report the lowest proportion of "strongly affiliated" followers among major American religious traditions, while the data indicates that evangelicals are increasingly devout and committed to their faith. The report states that in 1970, there was only a 5 point difference between how strongly Catholics and evangelicals felt about their religion. Today, that gap is twenty percent. Only 35% of Catholics today describe themselves as "strongly affiliated" with their religion as compared to 56% of evangelicals. Even mainline Protestants reported a higher level of religious intensity than Catholics, at 39 percent.

The study notes that the decline among Catholics began in the mid-1980s, and that coincided with the first revelations about the sexual abuse of children by clergy, a scandal that has haunted the church ever since. Moreover Latino Catholics are much less likely to report a strong affiliation compared with other Catholics, and the number of Latino Catholics has been growing steadily in past decades.

The study states that the surge in evangelical devotion began in the early 1990s and coincide with their growing presence in the public square. African Americans report a religious intensity similar to evangelicals. The study surveyed over 40,000 people.
