



Today is the 3rd Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from the Old Testament prophet Jonah. This is the second time that God comes to Jonah. Initially, Jonah disobeyed because he had no desire to be a vehicle of conversion or repentance for the Ninevites. But God intervened with the famous story of the whale and Jonah now has a different outlook. However, even though he does God's bidding, he hopes that the Ninevites won't listen. He feels so strongly that the Ninevites so deserve the punishment that he can't wait to see it fall upon them. You can imagine his incredible response when they repented. Later, in this same book, we'll hear Jonah lamenting the fact that God

spared the Ninevites. Jonah is one of the biblical characters who never seems to learn.....Our next reading from Paul's letter to the Corinthians deals with the fact that the early Christians felt very strongly that Christ would return to them soon. They so believed this, that many of them sold their businesses, their homes, gave up their jobs and began to live in a frenzied state of charismatic prayer, living in common and giving their wealth to the community. It is in this line of thought that Paul is writing. The later church would have a very difficult time when they slowly began to realize that Christ's second coming is not immanent.....We get our gospel today from Mark and it announces that John has been arrested and hints that as Jesus follows John in ministry, so will he follow him in death. An awareness of John the Baptist's impending death forces Jesus to proclaim the kingdom, to gather his disciples and begin his public ministry, a ministry that will lead to his death..... I recently signed the 2012 contract with Vineyard Gas for our heating fuel for this year and am happy to report that our per unit cost has come down again this year. That happened last year and it's simply because we are using less fuel each year. At this point, we've been able to reduce our fuel usage at the church and rectory by about 20% and, in addition, we don't have the fuel costs of the Cauley Auditorium. Of course, I've got frostbite on my fingers and there is a build up of ice in my ears, but I'll sacrifice anything for the good of the parish!!!......It's fascinating where some of our clichés come from. I know these have nothing to do with religion, but religion doesn't have to be serious all of the time! England is very old and people started running out of places to bury the dead in the 1400s. They would then dig up the coffins and take the bones to a bone-house and re-use the grave. When opening these coffins, one out of 25 coffins were found to have scratch marks on the inside, and they realized they had been burying people alive. They then started to tie a string on the wrist of the corpse, lead it through the coffin and up through the ground and tie it to a bell. Someone sat in the graveyard all night (hence, "the graveyard shift"), to listen for the bell. And, thus, someone could be "saved by the bell," or was considered a "dead ringer.".....I'm happy to tell you that we have sold over \$5,000 worth of the new books on the history of the parish......I mentioned that we have installed a device at the pulpit that will record the homily and place it on our webpage. People can go to the webpage, click on it and hear the homily. Once we are finished with the restoration of St. Patrick's Church, we are going to set a camera in the choir loft so that when people click on the webpage, they will get both audio and video. When I was at St. Jude's and we had a funeral, we used to record two of the hymns and the homily and give it to the family. I still have people tell me that they listen to that every once in awhile. I think once we get this system working well, we'll make a CD for families and give it to them after a funeral.....A ten year old in the parish lost his I-Touch about a month ago. In early December his mother found this note which her son had written: Dear St. Anthony—I need your help to find my I-Touch. If you find it, give it to me on St. Nicholas day if you need more time give it to me on Christmas. If you do it I will be nicer to my brother. Please help me. Your friend, Jared. On the eve of St. Nicholas Day (Dec. 5) his mother was up late packing for a family trip. She spotted a box that needed to be sorted and there was the I-Touch. She could not imagine how it got there and then she remembered her son's note. She looked at the clock and it was 1:38 AM on December 6, the feast of St. Nicholas. She read her son's note again and placed his I-Touch on the mantle next to his stocking! I love those stories of simple pure childlike faith......The company that has printed our bulletin for the past years has been purchased by a larger bulletin company in Cleveland. This transition enables us to do a number of things that we were never able to do in the past, including the use of color photographs in the bulletin. It's going to take us some time to get familiar with all that is available to us, and I ask your patience. Once the restoration begins at St. Patrick's, we can run weekly photos which will help keep our shut-ins up to date on what is happening.......I'm grateful to St. Patrick parishioners Paul Balczun, Dick Brugger and Jim Wehan for their expertise and time in working with the electrical upgrades for the church as well as all of the specifications for the new A/C system. Work is underway on those projects now. Once the wall units for the A/C are installed, they will be faux finished to match the marble, making them much less visible. Electrical upgrades are also underway in the church to accommodate the new system as well as the upgrades we will make to the lighting once the restoration work gets underway.



<u>A FAMILY PERSPECTIVE</u>: It must have been difficult for Zebedee to watch his sons walk away and follow Jesus as it seemed he had his own plans for his children. We often forget that our children were never ours to begin with. They are only on loan to us. We raise them to let them go.
