



Today is the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time and again we hear first from the prophet Isaiah, a reading we earlier heard during the Christmas season. The lands of Zebulun and Napthali were parts of the northern kingdom of Israel which had been occupied by

the Assyrian Empire. Isaiah recalls the pain and shame of that occupation and promises a future time of glory when these lands will become Galilee, west of the Jordan river.

Our second reading continues from Paul's first Letter to the Corinthians, Scholars believe that there were originally three such letters, but today we only have two of them. The double endings of the first letter indicate that one letter has been lost. There is a great deal of rivalry and discord within the community and Paul urges them to change. Paul writes this letter from Ephesus and expresses concern that they have lost sight of the meaning of baptism. He reminds them that they were baptized in Christ Jesus, not in Paul's name or any other leader. Apollos was a fine orator and won the allegiance of the intelligentia; Cephas (Peter) drew the loyalty of the Jewish members of the community; and Paul drew the pagan converts. Paul vents his frustration through three rhetorical questions.

In our gospel we are told that a great light has shone in Zebulun and Napthali, but the only one who can understand it (John the Baptizer) has just been thrown into prison. Ironically, John's imprisonment sets the stage for Jesus's proclamation of the reign of God; it's as if John's exit were the cue for Jesus's entrance. Jesus moves to Galilee and it is here, among the gentiles, and not his own people, that he begins his ministry. Matthew is again showing that the gentiles accept Jesus, but his own people reject him. Note again that Matthew cites an Old Testament prophecy to show how Jesus is now the fulfillment of that prophecy. Then he calls men to assist him and Matthew notes how they immediately responded and followed him. Matthew notes that they leave everything (nets, boats, even their own fathers.) Jesus enters people's lives and turns them upside down. And then Jesus immediately begins what will be the characteristics of his ministry: teaching, proclaiming, curing. We're told that Jesus heals every disease and illness among the people.

During Lent each year the diocese conducts the annual Catholic Services Appeal. We did not have the appeal the past two years because of our capital restoration campaign (though we still had to pay the assessment.) The goals for this year have arrived and our assessment at St. Patrick's continues to skyrocket. This year it will be \$42,350. My first year here (4 years ago), the assessment was \$26,616. Any money we raise above the assessment can remain in the parish, and I am hoping that we can raise money to help pay the debt on the restoration.

In looking back on the parish, the 2008/09 total parish income was \$160,000, a decline of 4% from the previous year. This past year, our total income was \$781,133 of which \$354,769 was payment on pledges for the restoration and the remaining \$427,000 from offertory, etc. In the audit which I had done by the diocese when I became pastor, the report notes that total weekend Mass attendance in 2009 was 107 people. During October of this year, our average total Mass attendance was over 1,000 people. There were 291 families registered in the parish in 2009 and today we are just under 700 families.

Cardinal Walter Kasper gave an interview to the German newspaper *Die Zeit* recently which was later picked up by Vatican radio in which he said, "Christians who want to live by faith with the church, who acknowledge that they have made mistakes by the breaking of a first marriage. which they also regret, for them it should be a way back fully to participate in Christian and ecclesial life." He went on to say that the rules will shortly be changed to allow divorced and remarried Catholics to be admitted to Holy Communion. He also said, "Turning someone away from the communion rail—one doesn't do that."

Our neighboring Russian Church of the Nativity will again open their Social Center from Feb. 12-26 for homeless people to have a meal and stay overnight. They are in need of volunteers to cook/serve a meal for approximately 40 people as well as people to take shifts during the night. Supervisors will always be there. In December 7 of our parishioners volunteered and I'm hoping that some of you will again. An informational meeting will be held Wed., Jan. 29, at 6 PM at the Social Center (2nd & German). We have also stopped a leak in the vestibule above the west door. Again we are waiting for that to completely dry and we will restore it.

I am lecturing on Monday, February 3rd, at 7 PM at the Jefferson Society on Pope Francis. The lecture is open to the public but you must register by contacting them. I believe there is a \$10 fee for people to attend the lecture. It is titled, "Pope Francis: Taking the World by Storm."


