



Today is the third Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from the prophet Nehemiah. This is the only time in the three year cycle of the lectionary that we read from his book. Ezra and Nehemiah were the two most responsible for the religious formation of the people after the Babylonian exile. The two OT books which bear their names were originally one. In them we read that Ezra led the people back to the law and Nehemiah spearheaded administrative reforms and engineered the rebuilding of the walls of Jerusalem. Seven times in the reading the phrase "all the people" appears. Ezra, in today's preaching, is speaking to all the people, not just to his audience. Their words were so harsh and strong that we hear them offering words of comfort at the end.

Today is the second of three Sundays on which we hear from 1 Corinthians 12. Recall last week that Paul laid the groundwork for his analogy of the body which he develops in today's reading. That groundwork consisted of reminding the Corinthians that the source of their different gifts is the Spirit. Today Paul begins by drawing the connection between the one Spirit and the one Baptism which they all share. Last Sunday he spoke of the different spiritual gifts we are given; today he speaks practically about the interrelationship of the human body and its individual parts. In this reading he reminds them that they are "Christ's body." This is the first time Paul uses this phrase.

Our Gospel from Luke is divided into two sections with the first, the prologue, intended to be an introduction of both his account of Jesus' life in the gospel and his subsequent account of the early church in Acts of the Apostles. The second section describes Jesus' proclamation in the synagogue in Nazareth. It precedes next Sunday's gospel when he will be rejected by his home town. Both sections contain key Lucan themes-Jesus as the fulfillment of Scripture; the Spirit working in Jesus, and that announcement of the Good News, especially to the poor. The prologue lays out Luke's qualifications for writing this account and notes that he has explored other accounts and will now write his own. The reference to Theophilus is not to an individual. The name means "friend of God" and Luke is addressing his gospel to all who believe in God. The second section includes the wonderful quote from Isaiah which Luke actually modifies to meet his need

that Jesus is the one anointed by the Spirit and sent to proclaim good news to the poor.

A new report on the Polish Catholic church shows that even that once stalwart Catholic country is showing deep signs of regression. While 95% of the Polish people still identify themselves as Catholic, only 32% are now attending Mass. That percentage is down from 90% just twenty years ago! While Poland continues to have more seminarians than any other country in Europe, that number is declining sharply. This year there were 804 priestly ordinations compared to 2011 when there were 1,510. At the same time, the number of women entering religious orders has dropped by two-thirds since 2005. Like many European countries, the church receives a sizeable annual subsidy from the government. It is now at .9% and the government is going to drop it to .3%.

Our St. Patrick's Food Pantry is presently serving almost 900 families per week. During November, for example, we distributed 24,214 pounds of food to 871 families. This entire project is run by volunteers and derives its support mainly from the generosity of parishioners. During November it cost the parish \$1,284 to furnish this food, all of which was covered by donations. We have also encountered the unfortunate problem that the entire floor under the food pantry is collapsing; it's simply rotting away. The bids for replacement are \$5,789. I'm very happy to tell you that we have been given a grant from the Erie Community Foundation to underwrite the entire cost of replacing the floor. Thanks to this grant, the project will not cost the parish one penny.

I am thinking about offering an 8 AM Mass on Easter Sunday at St. Patrick's if there is enough interest. The Mass would have to be without music as I have to be over at St. Hedwig's for the 9 AM Mass. If you think you might want to attend that Mass, either tell me or let the office know.

Lent is going to be upon us much sooner than we imagine—it is at its earliest this year with Ash Wednesday on February 13. Last year I did a series of homilies during Lent on the Gospel Jesus. My premise is that we can't say we believe in him if we don't know who he is. The homilies were much more instructional than inspirational, and I had a great deal of positive feedback on them, so much so that I'm thinking of doing a similar thing

this year. Each weekend I'll take a different look at Jesus as revealed to us in the scriptures. I'm going to begin with "Jesus and Sinners," then "The Compassionate Jesus," next "The Combative and Dangerous Jesus," followed by "The All Forgiving Jesus" for the 4th Sunday of Lent when our gospel is the incredible story of the prodigal son. Then the gospel for the 5th Sunday of Lent is the story of the woman caught in adultery and I want to expand on what I spoke about last year on "Jesus and Women."

This year we are going to have our Holy Thursday Mass at St. Patrick's rather than at St. Hedwig's. There is not adequate parking at St. Hedwig, it's dark and 95% of the people attending the Mass are St. Patrick parishioners, so we'll move the Mass to St. Patrick's.

You may have noticed that the bells at St. Patrick's are no longer ringing. The carillon is beyond repair. I had a representative from the Verdin Bell Company out of Cincinnati here recently and asked him what it would cost to repair it, and he said it's beyond repair. I asked him what a new one would cost and it is in the neighborhood of \$10,000. I really wish we had bells, particularly to call us to Mass, to toll at funerals, etc, but I just can't justify spending that much money in light of the fact that we are about \$200,000 in debt from the restoration because of having to do so much work on the roof. Perhaps at some point in the future someone might consider making that a memorial and we could put a plaque in church.

At the pearly gates, St. Peter greeted a priest and a congressman and gave them their room assignments. "Father, here are the keys to one of our nicest efficiency units. And for you, Mr. Congressman, the keys to our penthouse." "This is unfair," cried the priest." "Listen," said St. Peter, "priests are a dime a dozen up here, but we've never seen a congressman before!"

The pastor was rather touched when the first grade students presented him with a birthday card on the occasion of his 75th birthday. On the front of the card, they had printed, "Inside is a message from God." When he opened the card, he was surprised to read, "See you soon."
