From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time. The Book of Zephaniah was written during the reign of King Josiah of Judah (640-609 BC). One of the few righteous Israelite kings, Josiah attempted to reform Judah's regression into idolatry and its choice to depend upon foreign alliances rather than trusting the Lord. Much of Zephaniah's prophecy speaks of the impending day of judgment, but today we hear him address those who have faithfully served the Lord by worship of God alone in their rituals and in their daily lives. The reading is taken from two different chapters. The opening addresses the faithful in Judah while the remaining lines appear after a lengthy description of God's wrath. After describing God's judgement on the unfaithful, the prophet describes God's promise to the faithful.

Last Sunday's passage from First Corinthians briefly noted the importance of the Cross of Christ. In today's reading, Paul grapples with those who cannot or will not see God's wisdom in a crucified Savior. Because Corinth was such a large port city, members of the church there had been exposed to varied religions and philosophies. Paul, Jewish apostle to the Gentiles, must attempt to present Jewish views of wisdom to those influenced by Greek philosophy. While philosophy relied on human reason and abstract propositions, Jewish wisdom saw God as the sole source. Paul notes that God reversed the status quo of human wisdom, which placed great value on power and rank resulting from accidents of birth. Instead, divine wisdom on the lowly and despised emphasizes redemption as a gift, unearned and unmerited.

Matthew, writing to a Jewish audience, is aware of the growing presence of Gentiles in the church and stresses today that Jesus comes to both Jew and Gentile. Today's familiar reading—the

Sermon on the Mount - is the first of five sections of extended teachings of Jesus, whom Matthew portrays as a true teacher and interpreter of the Law of Moses. Like OT encounters with God, it takes place on the mountain and Jesus sits—assuming the posture of a rabbi.

Pope Francis said recently, "The Big Bang, that is considered to be the origin of the world, does not contradict the creative intervention of God; on the contrary, it requires it."

CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) is headquartered at Georgetown University and does surveying, etc. of the laity. Their new report is the most frightening I've read as it claims that young Catholics are leaving the church at an early age, often before the age of 13, and it is much more than being bored with Mass. They are leaving, says the report, and opting for no religion. Of those who have left, 63 percent said they stopped being Catholic between the ages of 10 and 17, and 23 per cent say they left the faith before the age of 10. The most common reason given is that they stopped believing in God or religion. The study reveals they want proof of what they are being taught about God. The study concludes that "it's a trend in the popular culture to see atheism as smart and the faith as a fairy tale."

Each year the diocese conducts the Catholic Services Appeal. To achieve their goal, each parish is assigned an assessment which we are required to pay. Any money raised above that assessment amount can stay in the parish. Last year our assessment was \$64,000 and we generated over \$100,000 which means that \$36,000 remained in the parish. Our assessed goal this year is \$74,000, and I'm hoping that we can generate funds above and beyond that so that we can begin the restoration and rebuilding of our pipe organ. The income from this drive is the largest

source of revenue for the diocese, and we all have an obligation to support the work of the diocese. We will conduct our appeal this year again during Lent with the kick-off on the first Sunday of Lent. You know I will not talk about money from the pulpit, but each of you will receive a letter and pledge card and I'm hoping you'll be able to help us with this appeal.

Msgr. Joe Wardanski retired Dec. 31 after 30 years as chaplain at St. Mary's Home. In anticipation of that, he moved into St. Patrick's rectory in early October and has been living in the former housekeeper's suite on a back wing of the second floor. That apartment includes a large living room with fireplace, large bedroom and bath. **229 DAYS TO THE 2017 ERIE IRISH FESTIVAL
THE CROSS OF ST. BRIGID OF KILDAIRE.**

Don't mean to be preachy, but this coming Wednesday, February first, just happens to be the feast day of the patroness of Ireland, St. Brigid. All over Ireland, schoolchildren will be making a cross just as Brigid did some 1,500 years ago, out of reeds. It is said that the cross, along with the Shamrock and the Harp, is one of the three symbols of Ireland.

So here's the story. In brief.

Brigid was born into pagan Ireland in 451, the daughter of a slave and, so, a slave herself, although it is said her father was a chieftain. He wasn't a very nice fellow as he apparently sold Brigid's mother when he found out she was pregnant. Brigid was born, the property of another chieftain, but would hold no food down that he gave her because he was impure. She was fed by a white cow with red ears instead. She was a wonderful giving person who always helped the poor and because of her loving nature was eventually freed and joined the church, reportedly becoming a good friend of St. Patrick.

One day, she had been called to the deathbed of a pagan chieftain, some say her dear old dad, in order to preach the word of Christ. The dying fellow was delirious and while ministering to him, Brigid picked up some straw from the floor of the hut and wove it into a cross. As she did so, the chieftain's delirium subsided and he requested to be baptized before he died. Brigid herself died on February 1, 525, of natural causes and this became her feast day. It is, coincidentally, also the pagan holiday Imbolc, which is the celebration of the pagan goddess, Brigid. St. Brigid, among other things, is the patron saint of eternal flames and her cross is said to protect homes from fire. Oddly, she is credited with the invention of a whistle used for calling others in the night. Originally buried in Kildaire, her body was plundered more than once and her skull (or most of it, at least) is in a church in Lumiar, Portugal.

If you are in Meadville with nothing to do, you might stop in at St. Brigid's Church there which dates originally from 1881 and say a prayer to Ireland's patroness.

And, if you come to the Erie Irish Festival, we'll have some reeds on hand and we'll offer a class in how to make your very own St. Brigid's Cross.

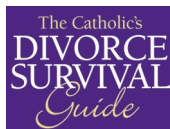
