From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear from Deuteronomy which is composed of speeches delivered by Moses to the Israelites at the end of their forty years of wandering. In today's reading, Moses foretells the arrival of a prophet who will guide the people. He is warning them that they are not to accept the cultures of others, but to remain uniquely God's people. But his words also contain a warning that if they do not listen to God's word, he will make them answer for it.

First Corinthians 7 opens with the line: "Now in regard to the matters about which you wrote." Paul responds by offering them advice on marriage but remember that Paul is driven by the popular thought that Jesus' return is immanent and so he thinks in very short terms about everything. Paul tells us elsewhere that he was not married and that married people are anxious about how to please one another. With his heavy focus on the Second Coming of Jesus, he recommends that the unmarried stay that way so as to live without distraction.

The opening chapter of Mark's gospel is filled with miracle stories. In Mark, the most common miracle that Jesus performs is exorcism. Also in Mark, the demons know Jesus' true identity. The demons never waver in their understanding of Jesus, unlike the crowds, and even at times, his own disciples who fail to recognize Jesus as the Messiah and the Son of God. Not surprisingly, those in the synagogue who heard Jesus' teaching and witnessed the exorcism were amazed. Strangely, Mark does not include any details about what Jesus was teaching that day. But clearly the crowds viewed Jesus as someone with authority. According to Mark, it is Jesus' teaching and his ability to control the demons that helped him gain widespread fame.

One of our priests wrote the following in his bulletin and I couldn't agree with him more. "I love having little kids at Mass. I love it when they get distracted by a moth and spend five minutes following the moth's precarious voyage among the lights. It's all good. They are being soaked up in the Mass. Sometimes people complain and make veiled remarks about behavior and discipline and decorum and the rapid deterioration of morals today and stuff like that, but I have no patience for it. For one thing, they were little kids at Mass once, and for another, if there are no little kids at Mass, pretty soon there won't be any Masses. You have to let kids be kids. If you are distracted by a little kid being a little kid at Mass you are not focused on what is holy. Little kids are holy. Let it be. My only rule is no extended fist fights. Other than that I don't care about grapes and yawning and Cheerios. I think the cadence and rhythm and the custom and the peace of the Mass soak into little kids without them knowing it. That why I think lots of kids come back to Mass—it sparks some emotional memory in them and once they're back at Mass they pay attention in new ways and find new food in it. It's all good." Well said.

The St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 18,361 pounds of food during the month of December at a cost of \$1,565.21 to the parish. During that month, we served 849 families or whom 456 were elderly and 1,341 were children. Again I thank you for your generous support of this project.

During Lent I am going to offer 4 Scripture classes on Feb. 26 and March 5,12 & 19 at 10 AM in the church. The first will be on the Scriptural Mary, not the Mary we think we know. Second on "Who are the Apostles?" Third on "Who Wrote the Gospels" and the last class will be an overview of life in Jesus' time. How did people live, what were their homes like, who were his enemies, who were his friends, as well as an introduction

to the apostle Paul and the first Christians. Classes will be held in church. We simply ask that you call the parish office so we know how many copies of the material to print. The classes will be on line also. I will have handouts at the end of each class.

I'm grateful to the Ancient Order of Hibernians, Fathers Cauley Chapter, for a gift of \$500 to the St. Patrick's Food Pantry.

I'm also grateful to the Sisters of St. Joseph Social Outreach program which recently made a gift of \$500 to our Food Pantry.

Celebrant of the Masses at St. Patrick's next weekend will be Msgr. Richard Sullivan, retired pastor of St. Andrew's Parish.

Priests of the diocese recently had a four day seminar on change, on improving our skills to deal with people who are mourning, people who are resisting change, trying to help people walk through the changes that have to come in the diocese. There is a part of me that wants to see this whole process over with, but after the workshop, I understand Bishop Persico's slow and deliberate approach to this. Next step will be listening sessions for people in the parishes and then another general session in June.

The homeless man was astounded. "Won't your wife be furious with you for doing this?" The man replied, "I don't care. It's important for her to see what a man looks like after he has given up drinking and golf."



HOMELESS SHELTER NEWS

Saint Benedict Joseph Labre—Patron Saint of Homeless People

As mentioned previously, St Patrick's Parish is hosting a homeless overflow shelter February 11-24 at the Russian Church of the Nativity Social Center at Front & German Streets.

We are in need of **WINTER** clothing (new or clean used) for men and women, *i.e.*, underwear, socks, sweatshirts, small men's jeans (size 32-

34), hats, gloves, shoes, boots, coats, long underwear, etc.

We also need personal hygiene items, *i.e.*, sample size toothpaste, toothbrushes, disposable razors, shaving cream, sample size deodorants, bath products, combs, brushes, feminine hygiene products and hand sanitizer.

The shelter also is in need of disinfectant sprays and wipes, trash bags (large black & tall kitchen w/drawstrings), paper products (plates, bowls, cups, cutlery, napkins, paper towels & toilet paper) gallon size ziplock bags and black permanent markers.

Items can be dropped off on the rectory side porch, or they can be placed in a box at the entrance to the church at each Mass.

Training for all volunteers working at the homeless shelter sponsored by Saint Patrick's Parish February 11-24 will take place on **Sunday, February 8th at 4:00 PM** at the Russian Church of the Nativity Parish Center at East Front and German Streets. The training and tour of the facility is expected to last about an hour.
