

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from the Book of Job. Written sometime between the seventh and sixth centuries BC, the Book of Job is considered one of the finest work's of Israel's wisdom tradition. The main question raised in Job is: why do innocent people suffer? The plot of the story is established in the opening twelve verses: Job, a wise man, blameless and upright with many blessings from God, including children and wealth, is suddenly put to the test by Satan. Will Job remain strong in his faith when all is lost and suffering endures? His response makes up the remainder of the book. Today's reading is part of Job's reaction to a friend, Eliphaz, who attempts to comfort and console Job, but Job finds no relief in his words. At the end of the book, Job will find resolution and reward, but that is not expressed today.

Today's reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians is a continuation of his response to various questions raised by the Corinthians. This short excerpt is somewhat disjointed as it includes Paul's rationale for not charging for his preaching of the gospel and his freedom as an apostle.

We continue in our gospel to hear about Jesus' many healing and exorcisms at the start of his public ministry in Galilee. Mark begins his gospel account with a strong emphasis on Jesus' powerful deeds. In fact, in Mark, the emphasis in the Galilean ministry (chapters 1-8) is much more an emphasis on Jesus' deeds more than his words. There are four movements in today's reading: the healing of Peter's mother-in-law, evening healings of the sick and possessed in Capernaum, Jesus at prayer and his departure from Capernaum. We learn not only that Peter was married but that he and Andrew lived in Capernaum, a town about 20 miles northeast of Saint Hedwig Parish

Nazareth where Jesus was raised. An interesting play on words occurs when he heals Peter's mother-in-law as we are told Jesus "helped her up." The Greek word is the same word used for resurrection. She is raised up and immediately becomes a disciple who serves others. The section concludes with Jesus talking to the disciples after he prays to the Father and tells them that he comes to "preach." That it is not his deeds but his words that are important.

A week from Wednesday is Ash Wednesday, a day of fast and abstinence for those between the ages of twelve and sixty-two. No meat should be eaten and only one full meal with two smaller meals.

There will be an 8 AM Mass and a 12:05 Mass at St. Patrick's. I will distribute ashes after the 8 AM Mass, from 11:40 until noon and again after the 12:05 Mass. I will also distribute ashes at 4 PM.

Did you know that only 6.7% of the population of the city of Erie are under the age of 5; 20% are ages 6-19; 35.9% are ages 20-44; 22.7% are ages 45-64 and 13.6% are 65 and older. In another statistic recently presented to the Erie County Historical Society, the population of the city has been declining every year since 1970. At that time there were 129,231 people living in Erie; today there are 101,786.

A one hour Scripture class will be offered in the church on February 26, March 5, 12 and 19. We ask that you call the office if you are planning to attend so we can have enough hand-outs for everyone. After I give the class, I will give you very detailed notes on what I said so that you might be able to revisit the topic. I'm going to do one on Mary of the Scripture (quite different from the popular image), Who Wrote the Gospels?, Who are the Apostles? and the final class will be sort of a show and tell!!!! What was life like in Jesus'

time, what were homes like, what did the temple look like, etc. The handout will be filled with illustrations.

St. Patrick's Parish recently sent the Russian Orthodox Church of the Nativity a check for \$1,000 to cover utility costs, etc. for the two week homeless shelter that we will staff using their Parish Center. In addition to utility costs, the Russian parish supplies coffee, coffee cups, etc. To help with this, we have purchased all of the cups, plates, utensils, etc. that we will use during our two week shelter. People have been very generous in giving me money to help with these costs. In addition, Saint Jude's Parish is hosting the last three nights of the shelter and they recently brought in a check for \$650 to help with all of the supplies. Another parishioner went to Sam's Club and bought a ton of underwear, socks, etc. to be distributed. We also have a great deal of winter clothing which you brought in and will be greatly appreciated by the homeless people.

I hope we can make a commitment to do this again next year. It is what the gospel is all about and certainly what Pope Francis is asking us.

Cardinal Sean O'Malley, archbishop of Boston, was celebrant and homilist January 22nd at the annual Mass for Pro-Life in Washington, D C. He made a plea that pro-life people change their tactic from confrontational to one of love and outreach. He noted that we achieve much more with honey than with vinegar, and he hoped they would tone down their rhetoric.

Doug Smith is on his deathbed with a nurse, his wife and 3 sons around him. He asks for witnesses for his last wishes and says, "My son, Bernie, I want you to take the Mayfair houses." "Samuel, you take the apartments at the east end." "And Jamie, you take the offices over in the City Centre." "Sarah, my dear wife, please take all the residential buildings on the bank of the river." The nurse and witnesses are blown away at the extensive holdings he has. As Doug died, the nurse said, "Mrs. Smith, your husband must have been an incredibly hard working man to have accumulated all this property." Sarah replies, "Property? The idiot had a paper route." St. Monica prayed for eighteen years for the conversion of her son; after that he became a Doctor of the Church and a great saint—St. Augustine. Our Lord also gave us the example in this; after having labored all day, He frequently passed the night in prayer.



Reading I: Job:1-7



Reading II: 1Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23

Gospel: Mark 1:29-39

Though we live in a culture that often thinks either/or saying: it's dark or light, good or bad, happy or sad, the spiritual journey invites us to live a <u>both/and</u> life that holds together both light and dark, good and bad, happiness and sadness. This week's Gospel shows Jesus living out a <u>both/and life</u>: he prays in community and alone; he prays during the day and at night; he preaches with words and with actions. Prayer and service are two sides of the same coin. The spiritual life is about being both a contemplative and an activist: we are called to be contemplatives-in -action. How have you experienced this?
