



From the Pastor's Desk Today is the 6th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading is from the OT Book of Leviticus, the third book of the Old Testament. As you listen to the reading, watch for the connection to the gospel, as is always the case. We're dealing with leprosy in both readings. In this reading, the response is stern and harsh. Leprosy was a two-fold threat. It is contagious and therefore dangerous in a world lacking modern medical remedies. In addition, there was a spiritual component: exposure to the disease rendered people spiritually unclean and disqualified them from participating in the community's worship. Ultimately, God is the speaker in this reading as he gives instructions meant for the safety

and survival of the community......In our second reading, we continue with I Corinthians. Paul is counseling his audience to do everything for God; to give no offense to either Jew or Greek or the church and he asks that we all imitate him.....Our gospel excerpt from Mark revisits leprosy. Mark is typically the most economic story teller among the evangelists, stating facts and quickly moving on. But of the three evangelists who tell today's story (Matthew & Luke also tell it), Mark not only delivers the most detail, but also the vivid and human. Scholars tell us that we have two stories dovetailed here: one which shows Jesus' pity toward the leper and another which shows his anger toward the spirit of leprosy. The dismissal statement ("warning him sternly, he dismissed him at once.") they claim, is directed at the spirit, not the leper. If that's the case, it would explain why Jesus, after sending him away, is suddenly addressing the leper again and instructing him to "tell no one anything." Whatever the case, the heart of this gospel lies in the encounter between Jesus and the leper who pleads, "If you wish..." The man makes a claim on Jesus' compassion and Jesus reaches out and touches the man, thus rendering himself unclean and making him ineligible to enter the synagogue. But Jesus has bonded himself with the outcasts and puts their needs ahead of his own. Levitical law required a return visit to the priests to document one's healing, and while Jesus wants the leper to comply, he also asks the impossible-to tell no one. The leper immediately tells everyone. Mark seems to be telling us that the presence of God in Jesus is so great that it cannot be hidden; it will be found out.....A new study by the Pew Research Center shows that cohabitation, single person households and single parenthood is on the rise, and that the percentage of Americans who are currently married is at an all-time low. In 1960, 72% of Americans over the age of 18 were married. Today, only 51% are. The study also shows that since 1972, the number of marriages celebrated in the Catholic Church has fallen nearly 60 percent. In 1972, there were 8.6 marriages in the church per 1,000 Catholics, but last year the figure was 2.6 church marriages for every 1,000 Catholics. The study shows that 55 percent of white Americans are married, 48 percent of Hispanics and only 31 percent of African-Americans (in 1960, 72 percent of Hispanics were married and 61 percent of African-Americans were married.) Also shown in the study is that the median age at first marriage has steadily risen. In 1960, the median age was 22.8 for men and 20.3 for women. Today is is 26.5 for women and 28.7 for men.....During the month of December, the St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 15,501 pounds of food at a cost to the parish of \$1,356.05. That food was distributed to 752 families.....We have been fortunate that the costs of this undertaking is always borne by others; I've not had to put any parish money into it since coming here. People always step forward and make very generous contributions, and we had some during the Christmas season. The Sisters of St. Joseph recently made a \$700 donation toward this work....During 2011, the Food Pantry distributed a total of 284,707 pounds of food!!! The total costs involved were \$11,884.77. It is simply mind boggling when you stop and think of the monumental undertaking that this ministry is. What would some of these people do without it?....Ash Wednesday is Wednesday, February 22, and will be the beginning of 40 days of penitential acts combined with a more prayerful environment. Why not start thinking now of something that you can do to make this Lent more meaningful? One of the things that always impresses me here during Lent is that no matter what hour of the day I go into church, there are people saying the Stations of the Cross. There are both individuals and small groups who come from near and far to take advantage of these beautiful stations. I thank God daily for Father Peter Cauley's insightful wisdom in commissioning them in 1891 and then building this beautiful church to house them.....Also during Lent, we will be conducting the DSA appeal at St. Hedwig's while at St. Patrick's we will be conducting the drive to secure pledges and initial payments toward the restoration of the church.....I will be giving a lecture on the history of St. Patrick's Parish on Thursday, February 23, at 7:30 PM at the Jefferson Society. The lecture is open to the public but reservations are required......Did you know that it currently costs the Diocese of Erie \$38,000 a year to educate each of our seminarians? God willing, we will ordain one new priest a year for the next 3 years. What a change! My ordination class in 1970 had 13 of us.....A little girl was watching her parents dress for an evening out. When she saw her dad donning his tuxedo, she warned, "Daddy, you shouldn't wear that suit." "And why not, darling?" asked the father. To which his daughter replied, "Because it always gives you a headache the next morning."

Gospel: Mark 1:40-45
