

Today is the First Sunday of Lent and we read the story of our origins as found in the Book of Genesis. We are all familiar with this story of creation; but we have to remember that there are two stories of creation in the Book of Genesis. Prior to the account we

read today is the equally familiar story of creation at the very beginning of Genesis in which God creates the world in 6 days and then rests on the 7th day. In that first account, we do not have the story of the fall of man, ie., the devil, the woman eating the apple, the two of them discovering their nakedness. The two differing accounts come from two different traditions that were found in Israel in the 900s when this book was written.

Paul's message in today's Letter to the Romans provides a nice bridge between the first reading and the gospel, where Jesus, too, is tempted. Paul compares Jesus and Adam and the condemnation and salvation that resulted from each of their respective temptations. Paul's language is very convoluted and difficult to follow—this is typical of the scribe who wrote Paul's letters. Some sentences are forty and fifty words long. What he is doing is contrasting Adam's response to temptation and Jesus' response.

Our gospel today immediately follows the baptism of Jesus by John in the Jordan. As soon as he was baptized. Satan moves in and takes him to the desert for the familiar three temptations. Hungry and weakened to the point of collapse, a vulnerable Jesus waits in the desert. The tempter does not waste the opportunity urging Jesus to satisfy his needs. Read this passage carefully and you will see that Jesus' energy grows with each response and he saves his best for last. His strong dismissal contrasts with the rather mild dismissal we read in Luke's account of the temptation. The familiar gospel concludes with Jesus collapsing into the arms of angels.

Our 2014 Catholic Services Appeal gets underway in all the parishes in the diocese today. The funds raised in this annual drive support our retired priests, educate our seminarians, allows the diocese to participate in Catholic Charities, etc. Each parish is assigned an assessment which must be paid whether we raise the funds or not. We have not conducted the appeal the past two

years at St. Patrick's because of our campaign for the restoration of the church, even though I had to pay those assessments. This year, we have to raise \$11,803 at St. Hedwig's and \$42,350 at St. Patrick's. Any monies raised above those amounts remains in the parishes. I am hoping to raise additional money at St. Patrick's to help pay down our debt. I hope you will consider helping me meet these goals.

I promised my first weekend at both parishes that I will NEVER mention money from the pulpit. The pulpit is reserved for the Word of God and money doesn't belong there. But remember, I didn't say anything about the bulletin!!

Mark Alloway and I met for several hours with Mark Fischer of Fischer Organ Works as he and Mark have been telling me for sometime that the pipe organ is in need of some major work. Mark Fischer tells me that the last time work was done on the organ was in 1972 when Father Plunkett was still here. He took me inside the organ to show me how badly worn some of the pieces are and what needs to be done. He's preparing me a bid which I asked him to prioritize what has to be done and tell me what is necessity and what is luxury and then we'll see where we go from there. I have some money in a fund for the pipe organ but nowhere near what we're going to need for the project. I think you would all agree that we don't want that magnificent instrument to fall into disrepair. We have several wonderful pipe organs in the city that are no longer functioning because they were let go. We can't let that happen here. I'll keep you posted.

We started our Lenten Scripture class this past Thursday, and I'm thrilled with the large number of people attending. What I hope to do in four one hour classes is explore the New Testament, ie., timing of writing, purpose of each gospel or letter, audiences, etc. Rather than use any type of a book, I've prepared handouts which I am distributing each week. The class is open to the public. I just ask that you call the rectory office and register so I know how many handouts.

### From the Pastor's Desk continued......

I continue to be amazed at how many people help support our St. Patrick Food Pantry. Just recently we received a check for \$200 from Chapter 435 of Vietnam Veterans of America.

I recently mentioned that we have had some water leakage problems in the Food Pantry and that we have found the source of the problem. Unfortunately it means we have to replace the entire roof over the Food Pantry, but we have to wait until the weather breaks before we can do this. I don't yet have bids, but the Finance Council will review everything before we do anything. God keeps reminding me of what it means to be steward of hundred year old buildings!

We're getting close to being able to meet with all of the committee heads for the 2014 Irish Festival. The move to downtown is exciting, but a lot of work. A lot of work!! I'm grateful to Cal Pifer and Angie Kontur for their leadership with all of this. We have now secured permission from the city to close a part of East 4th Street from the rectory driveway east to the west wall of the church. We will tent that entire area and then another tent will go south along the lawn between the church and the rectory. That area will be the stage, dance floor and tables and chairs. The booths will be out on 4th Street. The area behind the rectory is going to be tented and serve as the food area. We are seriously exploring eliminating the entrance fee and trying to make up that income in another way. We are presently the only festival in the city that charges an entrance fee and we'd love to eliminate it. There are just a few more details to work out and then we'll take the entire proposal to the chairs of the various committees. We met recently with Calamari's who are doing the food as well as Tap House, Scully's and Sullivan's who are going to join in helping them. There will be 24 hour security and no need to put things away at night.

Some people are kind, polite and sweet until you try to sit in their pew......God didn't create anything without a purpose, but mosquitos come very close.....People are funny: they want the front of the bus, the middle of the road and the back of church.....Quit griping about your church; if it was perfect, you couldn't belong.
