From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent and we hear from the Book of Isaiah. Today's words were meant to rouse a disillusioned exile people from languishing in a foreign land wondering whether God still loved them. The words are just as fitting today for people whose lives have been turned upside down and wonder if God still loves them. The prophet begins by reminding them what God has done in the past and telling them that he will do the same again. He tells them that God will do even more wondrous things for them. For Isaiah, this is not a distant, future promise but a present reality. But the clearest sign of God's love will not be new roads in the desert, etc., but the transformation of the people themselves.

Today's excerpt from Philippians is rather difficult. Prior to these verses, Paul cites himself as one who was beyond reproach of the old Law. Hence, he was circumcised according to that law, but he now sees this as "rubbish." He tells us that Christ has replaced the law. Paul, writing from prison, has surrendered even his freedom for the sake of Christ. The second paragraph makes clear that Paul has no delusions about his own spirituality. Unlike the early Gnostics who believed they had attained perfect maturity, Paul notes how far he has to go.

Sometimes the biggest divide between people is over the smallest points. In this story, no one disagrees about the sin committed. Jesus, however, differs from the Pharisees, not on the ability to see right from wrong, but from making judgment, of standing in God's place, presuming to read a person's heart and condemning them, rather than calling them to repentance which Jesus does. The religious leaders hope to trap Jesus; the woman is merely the pawn in the game. Either Jesus will challenge Roman law that denied the Israelites the right to impose capital punish-

ment, or he will negate the Law of Moses that requires it in this instance. But Jesus makes the woman more important than their gamesmanship. Before him is someone gripped by sin and shame who needs liberation. Finally alone with the woman he opens her eyes. Neither he nor anyone else can condemn her. Our sins, freely chosen acts of selfishness, condemn us, not God or man.

Today is designated as a day to honor Women Religious in our church. We are blessed at St. Patrick's to have had 136 years of the Sisters of St. Joseph serving the parish in one capacity or another. Some of them were giants. Sister Mary Fromknecht founded St. Patrick's Haven while at St. Patrick's; Sister Mary Pascal founded our ongoing Food Pantry, etc. We continue to be blessed today in the presence of Sister Marie Kebort, without whose advice and assistance I would be lost. Our bulletin today contains a list of the women from St. Patrick's Parish who have entered Religious Life. It is a rather impressive list.

As part of the Pastoral Planning in the diocese, parishes are being asked to work together and cooperate with one another rather than being in competition. As such, on the east side of Erie, all of we parishes have come together and formed the Eastside Religious Formation program. All of the parishes have their religious ed program, preparation for First Penance, First Communion and Confirmation, done together rather than separately. In addition, we are sharing information about spiritual exercises, confessions, etc. so that you might have a better opportunity to take advantage of these events.

On Friday, March 4, at 7 PM, Our Lady of Mercy Church in Harborcreek will offer a moving celebration of the Stations of the Cross with music, readings and imagery. After the Stations, there will be an opportunity for confession.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

That same parish will offer Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament on Saturday, March 5, after the 8:30 AM Mass. The Blessed Sacrament will be exposed until the 6 PM Vigil Mass that evening.

There will also be Stations of the Cross and Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament each Friday during Lent at 7 PM at St. James Church.

In addition, there will be Lenten Penance Services on the following dates: St. Gregory, North East, Sun., March 13 2 PM; St. Mark, Lawrence Park, Mon, March 14, 7 PM; St. James, Erie, Tuesday March 15, 7 PM; O.L. Mercy, Harborcreek, Wed., March 16, 7 PM; St. Luke, Erie, Sunday, March 20, 3 PM

Times are changing, but one of the good things to emerge from all of this is the greater cooperation among the parishes. We're all realizing that we can't do everything alone; that we need one another perhaps more than we ever have. It's time to break down any old rivalries between parishes and work together for the common good.

The third, and final, of our Scripture classes here at St. Patrick's will be held on Wednesday at 10 AM in church addressing the subject of the Passion and Crucifixion of Jesus as presented in the different gospels—you might be amazed at how differently they tell the story. On the same day, we will continue with our 6 PM class, An Introduction to the Four Gospels. Each class lasts between 45 minutes and an hour.
