



Today is the Second Sunday of Lent and we hear again from Genesis as our first reading. Israel's history begins when seventy-five year old Abraham agrees to leave everything he knows and loves for a promised land he's never seen. A new moment in

history begins with Abram's "yes" to God but it comes at God's initiative. Abram need only cooperate; God will make his name great. Abram's privileged role is underscored by the fact that God will "bless those who bless" and "curse those who curse" him.

Our second letter comes from Paul's Letter to Timothy. Timothy and Titus were two disciples of Paul's whom he left behind to lead churches he had founded. Timothy, a very young man, is greeted by Paul as "my dear child." Paul is urging this young bishop to live with the same firmness of faith that has sustained him through all of his trials. Paul is writing from prison and reminds Timothy and his congregation that God saved us, not because of our own good works, but because of his own purposes. Paul is not naïve about his own future. As a Roman citizen he is both a Jew and a Christian so he is highly expendable to the empire; Paul holds no illusions about his own fate. But Christ has already "destroyed death" and offered immortality to those who believe in him. Because Paul walks in the light of the gospel, no darkness can overcome him.

A great truth of Christian spirituality declares that "life is not about you." We encounter that today in the story of the Transfiguration. Peter is moved by the moment and begins to babble that we should erect tents here only to have God interrupt him with a thundering voice from a cloud. A miracle has occurred and Peter has begun thinking how he can make it better. He's so caught up in his idea of what is the appropriate response that he neglects to make an appropriate response. The three privileged disciples are given a unique opportunity to glimpse Jesus in his fullness and accompanied by two icons of the old covenant: Moses and Elijah, one representing the law and the other the prophets. Jesus reassures the disciples when he tells them not to tell anyone of what they have seen and he concludes the instruction with another prophecy of his impending death which turns our gaze to another mountain—Calvary.

Pope Francis has written a Lenten message in which he says we "are called to confront the poverty of our brothers and sisters, to touch it, to make it our own and to take practical steps to alleviate it." He says that destitution is not the same as poverty; destitution is poverty without faith, without hope and says there are three types of destitution: moral destitution affects those living in conditions opposed to human dignity; those who lack basic rights such as food, water, hygiene, work and the opportunity to grow. Moral destitution consists of slavery to vice and sin. He speaks of the pain families experience when someone, often a young person, is addicted to alcohol, drugs, gambling, etc. and says that many of these people lose hope. He says that spiritual destitution is when we turn from God and reject his love. He invites us to embrace the gospel as the way to console broken hearts, offer hope to others experiencing darkness and bring joy into the lives of the destitute.

I don't like to harp on money, and you know I will never do it in the pulpit, but just a reminder that the CSA is underway in both parishes during Lent. I have to raise \$11,803 at St. Hedwig's and \$42,350 at St. Patrick's. Any monies we raise over that goal stays in the parish. I'm hoping that we can double our goal at St. Patrick's so that I can apply the extra income to the debt remaining from our church restoration. Any extra monies at St. Hedwig's will be used for operating expenses. All parishioners have received a letter outlining the appeal as well as a pledge envelope which you can return. I hope you'll do whatever you can with this appeal. I really need your help.

All of the pieces for the 2014 Irish Festival are now coming together and we're going to meet soon with all of the committee chairs to share with them what we've done and get their input. I think it's an exciting moment for all of us. We're going to bring the festival back to the church where it really belongs, bring a boost to downtown Erie and truly celebrate our Irish heritage in the East Bayfront. I must tell you that Erie Insurance could not be more helpful and cooperative with our venture. They are jumping in with both feet to support us in this effort, and I'm grateful for their help. We will have 24 hour security so it will not be necessary to pack up the booths each night and store things. Everything can just remain

and it will be safe. We are using off-duty Erie police officers to provide security. We now have the proposal for tents, port-a-potties, etc. and are now working on the lighting. All of the tents have flaps in the event of bad weather, and we have stand-by heaters if it is cold. AND all of this is not costing us what it cost to rent a previous venue for the weekend. In fact, we have tents, lighting, port a potties and security for less than it cost us to rent what we had in the past.

Our neighbors at the Russian Church of the Nativity are likewise bending over backwards to accommodate us for our Sunday morning brunch. We will host that event in their Parish Center on German Street between First and Second Sts. It is a mere 4 blocks from the church and convenient for families to go over after any of our Masses and have a full breakfast and brunch. It might even be good to walk over from St. Patrick's and see some of the improvements that continue to be made to this once deteriorating neighborhood.

Downtown Erie as well as the city are being very helpful even to providing trash removal, permits for everything, etc. They will come and pick up our trash, etc. There are going to be mix-ups and a few things we do wrong, but we'll get there. One of the nicest things about this is seeing everyone working together on a new and exciting idea that can help invigorate downtown Erie.

The entire project is something completely new and a lot of work; but it's exciting. Thinking outside the box and reinventing "the way we always did things" brings a great deal of enthusiasm. Rick Filippi was telling me recently how the original festivals were held downtown near Sullivan's on Third and French Streets and how they closed French Street for the event.
