



From the Pastor's

Today is the 5th Sunday of Lent and we first hear from the prophet Isaiah and from a part of that book which is Btsk called Second Isaiah because it was written during the time of the Babyloni-네an Exile. God had promised Abraham

and David that his people would live in the promised land; how can he have abandoned them? It is a terribly dark time for these people. Isaiah reminds them that God freed them from slavery in Egypt and that he will again return them to their land.

Our second reading comes from Paul's Letter to the Philippians and once more, Paul is teaching that salvation comes from Christ, not through the observance of the law. Remember that Paul is writing to them from prison and, like the exiles in the first reading, he is suffering. Like the exiles, he longs to find meaning in that suffering and he finds it by joining his suffering to that of Christ. As always, Paul's sentence structure is dense and remember also that Paul writes these letters long before the gospels would be written, and so these letters play a much more prominent role in shaping the beliefs of the early Christians than would the gospels.

Our gospel today does not come from Luke who we read from this year, but from John because we get the story of the woman caught in adultery. a story found only in John. It is not in the other 3 gospels. Once again, we are exposed to the challenge Jesus faces of being faithful to the law (stone the woman to death) or faithful to his new message, that of healing and forgiveness. When Jesus is finally alone with the woman, he does two incredible things: first, he refuses to condemn her and then he instructs her to sin no more. The woman is offered forgiveness, not punishment. Jesus is upending the Law that has guided these people for so long and instead comes offering healing and forgiveness.

Today is the feast of Saint Patrick, our patron saint, but because it is a Sunday of Lent we cannot observe it. The Knights and Ladies of St. Patrick will install new members at a Sunday evening 5 PM Mass but that Mass will also have to be the Mass of the 5th Sunday of Lent. They had originally scheduled their event for Friday evening, March 15, which would have allowed them to use the Mass of St. Patrick.

Among those being inducted as a new member of the Knights and Ladies is St. Patrick parishioner John Maloney. You may recall that last summer John pulled together a reunion of all the people who had attended St. Patrick's School and the turnout was incredible. I know you join me in congratulating him on this honor. His family originally lived at the corner of Fourth and French and his father was popularly known as the Mayor of East Fourth Street, so it's good that John is carrying on the family tradition!!

We recently had all of the Eucharistic Ministers, the lectors, choir, ushers and greeters to St. Patrick's rectory for a 5-7 PM cocktail party. The event was scheduled for two reasons: to thank them for their ministry to the parish and to allow people to get to know one another better. We have a number of new parishioners and new ministers and many of us don't know one another. When we first planned this, I thought it would be approximately 35-40 people. Would you believe that we have 84 people involved in ministry here at St. Patrick's!

I have to share part of a note I received from a relatively new parishioner who writes, "It is difficult to put into words the warm spiritual feeling my wife and I experience by attending Mass at St. Patrick's. It not just the beauty of the church but the sense of community and friendship which makes attending Mass not an obligation but an enriching spiritual experience." Those words speak very well of St. Patrick's. I constantly have new people tell me how welcoming and warm all of you are. That's what parish is about.

After Easter I'm once again going to have the bridal couples into the rectory for a relaxing evening. I invite them to come around 5:30 and we have a drink and then a catered dinner is served at 6:30. I have the couples come in groups of 4 or 5 couples at a time, and it's a chance to make them feel welcome as well as an opportunity for me to get to know them better. I use three parish volunteers to help serve and clean up and I have most of the dinners covered, but if you would be interested in helping, please let me know.

It's hard to believe that it is only 2 weeks until Easter. That feast is celebrated this year at the closest to its earliest date possible. We will have

the Easter Vigil Mass at St. Patrick's on Saturday at 8 PM. On Easter Sunday there will be an 8 AM Mass and a 10:30 AM Mass at St. Patrick's. The 8 AM will not have music. There will be no Vigil Mass at St. Hedwig's on Holy Saturday but there will be a 9 AM Mass on Easter Sunday.

And remember that we will once again have bells at St. Patrick's on Easter Sunday!

I've had a very positive response to adding a Sunday 8 AM Mass at St. Patrick's at least for the months of June, July and August. Parishioners have particularly commented how they would like an earlier Mass on Sundays during the summer so they can enjoy the day. We'll see how attendance is at that Mass as to whether we will continue it in the winter months. Because of my tight schedule on Sunday mornings, there will not be any music at the 8 AM Mass. I have to be over at St. Hedwig's for the 9 AM Mass and then back here for the 10:30 AM Mass.

The restored St. Patrick's Church is proving very popular with brides. We have nothing left open in 2013 and already have 11 weddings scheduled for 2014. Interestingly, at a recent meeting of the priests we were told that weddings in the diocese have decreased by 50% since 2000; at St. Patrick's, they've increased by 900%!!!

If you've not yet made a pledge to the Catholic Services Appeal, can I urge you to do so. Our assessments have to be paid whether we raise this money or not, and I'm hoping you will help me meet our goal. At. St. Hedwig's our assessment is \$11,029 and at St. Patrick's it is \$38,500. Funds raised in this annual appeal serve a variety of causes from Catholic Charities to care for retired priests. Your participation is vital to success.

After the Sunday service, seven year old Brian said to the minister, "When I grow up, I'm going to give you some money." "Well, thank you," said the minister, "but why?" "Because my dad says you're the poorest preacher we've ever had!"

The pastor will never forget the birthday card that his first grade students gave him for his 70th birthday. The front said, "Inside is a message from God." Inside it said simply, "See you soon!!"
