

#### From the Pastor's Desk......

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent and we hear first from the prophet Ezekiel. This brief reading is Ezekiel's larger prophetic vision of the dry bones and two sticks. The prophecy dates to the early stages of Israel's seventy-year exile in Babylon, around 575 BC. When the Babylonian king Nebuchadnezzar laid siege to the southern kingdom of Judah, Ezekiel was captured and brought to Babylon along with the other religious and political leaders of Jerusalem. It was in the fifth year of exile, that Ezekiel was called by God to be a prophet. He and Second Isaiah are the only two called outside of Jerusalem. The reference to dry bones is when Ezekiel is led into the desert filled with human bones and he bears witness to their resurrection from the dead. As we hear today, God promises to raise the people from their graves and return them to Israel.

Today's reading from Paul's letter to the Romans emphasizes the tension between the spirit and the flesh. You can see the connection between this reading and the first reading in that God told Ezekiel he would "put my spirit in you," and Paul sees this promise fulfilled for believers in Christ. Non-believers remain in the flesh; while we are in the Spirit.

The raising of Lazarus from the dead is the seventh and final sign Jesus performs in John's gospel. In Mt., Mk and Lk, it is the cleansing of the temple that triggers the events that lead to Jesus' death. In John, it is the raising of Lazarus that facilitates his death by the Sanhedrin. John incorporates three themes into this reading: the dialogue between Jesus and Mary; Jesus' range of emotions at the death of his friend; and the reaction of the Jews to Jesus raising Lazarus. The Greek word used to describe Jesus' emotions is *embrimaomai*, "a snort in anger." Scholars feel Jesus' anger is directed at death and the

sadness it brings to others.

Scripture class on Thursday morning from 10—11 in the church will address life in the time of Jesus. There is an extensive handout showing what homes were like, how people dressed, interacted, what did the temple look like? Who was Paul? What was the early church like?

Never in my life did I imagine that St. Patrick's Day is as crazy as it is in this neighborhood. It starts with a line of people waiting for Sullivan's to open at 7 AM and continues with revelry all day long. There is not a parking space to be found anywhere in the neighborhood. I look out my office window and see people walking by in the craziest outfits imaginable.

Pledges for the 2015 Catholic Services Appeal continue to come in at both parishes. While our assessment at St. Patrick's is \$46,585, any money we raise above and beyond that remains in the parish. I am hoping against hope that we can set a goal of \$100,000 to give us money for the new boiler as well as some money to apply to the debt on the restoration. Last year, with an assessment of \$41,000, we raised \$80,000. Your generosity is incredible.

I met recently with Angie Kontur who is going to chair the Irish Festival this year, and we began the discussions for that event. After last year's festival, the committee decided to drop the breakfast on Sunday and instead continue having the festival. The security people we had last year asked us to end the evenings at 10 PM rather than 11 PM and we are going to do that. We will be open Friday from 5-10 PM; Saturday from noon until 10 PM and Sunday from 11:30 until 2 PM. Another change we are making for the coming year is to relocate the vendors. They were, if you recall, in a large tent on the eastside of the church—the tent that connected the eating area

music, etc. in front of the church. The area became a complete bottleneck, and so this year we are going to put the vendors in the large tent with the food area and move organizations like the Knights and Ladies, the Irish Cultural Society, etc. into that tent.

We are also going to change the way food is served this year. You may recall the long lines we had. This year we will have volunteers who will take orders, give people a ticket with a number on it, place the order and then people can pick it up when their number is called. This should cut down on the long lines.

Some parishioners are looking at ways we can bring water to the eastside of the church and construct a small building that will serve as the kitchen rather than having to transport food from the garage behind the rectory over to the serving area.

Another change we are making is that starting this year, while Angie Kontur will chair the event, another person will work beside her. Next year, that person will chair along with another parishioner working beside him or her. This way a volunteer will only have to help for one year and then chair for one year.

The Homeless Shelter Committee met recently and we have decided that we will take one week next year, St. Jude's the other and we will help Church of the Nativity with their two weeks.

#### The Annunciation of the Lord - March 25th

The Annunciation is the visit of the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary to inform her that she was to be the Mother of the Savior. If one notices, the Feast of the Annunciation fall exactly 9 months prior to the Feast of Our Lord's Nativity or birth, Christmas! Jesus Christ Our Lord is both truly God and man. The Father's only Son, conceived as man in the womb of the Virgin Mary, is "Christ". That means, from the beginning of His human existence, the Son of God never ceases to be God, but "from the very beginning of His human existence", Jesus is anointed by the Holy Spirit" as "Christ—the Anointed One."

## Prayer - Planning - Possibilities

#### What is a VIBRANT PARISH?

#### **KEY INDICATORS:** an overview

Parishes and schools are essential elements that make up the infrastructure of our diocese. That is why every parish, every school and every ministry in the Diocese of Erie is undergoing a rigorous selfassessment as part of the Pastoral Planning Process.

In order to evaluate parishes and schools on an even playing field, the Diocese of Erie has developed two important documents: Key Indicators for a Vibrant Parish in the Diocese of Erie, and Key Indicators for a Healthy School in the Diocese of Erie. Although the list of indicators is not exhaustive, it provides a good foundation for planning. All are encouraged to log onto www.ErieRCD.org/planning.asp to review the documents in their entirety, but this report provides a snapshot of some of the factors to be considered in evaluating the vibrancy of a parish.

## Please note that key indicators are designed to provide:

- a **vision** for vibrant parishes and a vision for the future.
- direction for the Pastoral Plan.
- a **means for evaluating** recommendations in the plan.
- a **foundation** for pastoral planning in local schools and parishes.
- a **focus** on the long-term and future potential for individual Catholic schools and parishes.

#### Just as importantly, key indicators are NOT designed:

- as the sole criteria to determine if a school or parish will remain open. Factors such as mission, potential for the future, demographics, finances and consideration for alternative approaches are all going to be considered.
- as goals to achieve, but rather as expectations to meet or exceed.



**What is a PARISH?** Canon law defines a parish as a certain community of the Catholic faithful established in a specific geographic area and entrusted to the care of a pastor. A parish is the presence of Christ and the church in a given territory, an environment for hearing God's Word, for growth in the Christian life, for dialogue, proclamation, charitable outreach, worship and celebration. It is the extension of the diocesan bishop's ministry in a specific place.

Pope Francis addresses the role of the Catholic Church: Being Church means being God's people, in accordance with the great plan of his fatherly love. This means that we are to be God's leaven in the midst of humanity. It means proclaiming and bringing God's salvation into our world, which often goes astray and needs to be encouraged, given hope and strengthened on the way.

The Church must be a place of mercy freely given, where everyone can feel welcomed, loved, forgiven and encouraged to live the good life of the Gospel."

### **KEY INDICATORS** for a vibrant parish

#### **VISION AND LEADERSHIP**

- The parish follows and promotes the Gospel of Jesus Christ and understands its relationship to the diocese and universal church.
- **2.** The parish develops a local vision for pastoral activity in the coming years which is rooted in the Gospel of Jesus Christ.
- **3.** The parish is staffed by properly trained ministers or shares staff with other parishes to lead and direct all areas of the parish's mission.
- **4.** The parish has a finance council and a pastoral council in place, which meet regularly to engage and involve the faithful to help carry out the pastoral activity of the parish.

#### WORSHIP AND THE SACRAMENTS

- **5.** Liturgical celebrations are properly and thoughtfully prepared and well attended with full, active and conscious participation.
- **6.** Homilies are relevant, challenging and faithful to the Gospel and church teaching. Parishioners are taught how to grow, and are inspired to live as disciples of Jesus Christ.
- **7.** Sacramental preparation is thoughtfully and properly planned and conducted in accord with approved guidelines and diocesan policies.
- **8.** The prayer and devotional life of parishioners is supported and nourished beyond the Sunday liturgy and the sacraments.
- **9.** Music as a part of worship is of high quality.
- **10.** The RCIA is implemented and its rituals are celebrated at the proper times.

## LIFELONG FAITH FORMATION, CATHOLIC EDUCATION AND EVANGELIZATION

- **11.** The parish provides adult faith formation opportunities which include both study and spiritual formation in accord with diocesan policies.
- **12.** The parish provides comprehensive faith formation for children in religious education programs in accord with diocesan policy.

- **13.** The parish provides opportunities for learning, spiritual growth, participation in the sacramental life, service and community for its adolescents.
- **14.** The opportunity to attend a Catholic school is provided to parishioners, including some financial support from the parish.
- **15.** The parish is creating a culture of vocations that actively and prayerfully promotes vocations to the priesthood, diaconate and consecrated life.
- **16.** Parishioners are challenged to reach out to inactive Catholics, inquirers, the unchurched and others.

#### **SERVICE AND PASTORAL CARE**

- **17.** The parish is actively engaged in proclaiming the Gospel through service to people in need locally, in the wider community and the world.
- **18.** The parish provides ministry to the homebound and elderly parishioners and to those in hospitals, nursing homes and other care facilities.

#### STEWARDSHIP/BUILDING COMMUNITY

- **19.** The parish welcomes new parishioners and invites them to become involved in the parish mission.
- **20.** Parishioners are invited and provided opportunities to better understand their gifts and talents and ways these can be used to minister to others.
- **21.** Parishioners understand stewardship as a response to their discipleship and give of time, talent, and treasure to support the Church's mission.
- **22.** The parish fosters opportunities for fellowship providing a sense of community for parishioners.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES**

- 23. The parish operates with a balanced budget and has sufficient operating funds for ministries, programs, facilities and staff in order to meet the needs of the community.
- 24. The parish has all necessary financial controls and operating procedures in place in accordance with diocesan policies.
- **25.** Financial reporting is done in a timely manner and follows the accounting standards established by the diocese.
- **26.** Parish facilities are well-maintained, attractive, and appropriate for parish ministries and programs. Facilities are handicap-accessible and inviting.

How do we know if a parish is vibrant? fr

To be vibrant is to "show great life, activity and energy." The full list of indicators at www.ErieRCD.org/planning.asp has been created to describe vibrancy as it should be found in a Catholic community of God's faithful people. The parish community may not exhibit all the indicators at a particular time, however, the hope and expectation is that parishes are able to exhibit these indicators either independently or in collaboration with other parishes.

The indicators should be adapted to each local situation and provide criteria from which local parishes will develop their own plans.


