



Today is the Third Sunday of Lent and we hear first from Exodus. The references to "thirst," "drink," and Besk water" we encounter here will become key elements of the gospel. Free from the slavery of Egypt, the Israelites wander in the desert and

begin to complain and desire to go back. Moses grows weary, but God comes to the aid of his people using the same rod he used in which he turned the river in Egypt into blood, he tells Moses to strike the rock and he provides water for his people. No matter how much the people turn from God and reject him, he always comes to their aid.

Paul's words in his letter to the Romans might well have served the wandering Israelites in our first reading. Paul insists that "hope does not disappoint," but he adds that this is a difficult concept to hang on to because hope is based on faith and faith is the "evidence of things not seen." When evidence is before us, we know; and we don't need to believe. But people of faith must believe without seeing. Faith is our "evidence," says Paul and on that evidence we base our hope. Paul goes on to weave faith and hope with love and demonstrates their inseparability.

Our gospel comes from John and is a lengthy and very difficult passage to understand. Jesus dialogues with an outcast, with no other male present. This was unheard of. Then he asks to drink from her bucket, a vessel rendered impure by the very fact that she is an unclean Samaritan. The passage is filled with baptismal images. There are three acts in this passage: the conversation with the woman which reveals who Jesus is: the return of the apostles, characterized by their surprise and confusion and finally, the woman's unexpected conversion. Jesus speaks of "living water" and the woman misses the reference. Jesus means "water of life," but she hears "flowing water." She mocks Jesus' naivete and in doing so mocks herself. But his argument is persuasive and evokes interest on her part mostly because she misunderstands. Jesus says that those who drink this water will thirst again; but those who drink the water he gives will never thirst. And then we move to the final stage and he calls for the woman's husband. She acknowledges her sinfulness and rather than becoming

defensive, she acknowledges Jesus as prophet. The return of the disciples and their questions, which hint of disapproval, show their confusion; but the woman, now free of shame, runs to share her discovery with the townspeople. This story is typically Johannine. Unlike the Synoptic gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke, it is filled with symbolism and hidden meanings. The Synoptic gospels are down to earth; John is theological.

The St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 22,101 pounds of food in January to 590 families. The cost to the parish was \$1,228.09, all of which is made possible because of your generous support of this ministry.

As we continue in Lent, I'm amazed again at the number of people who come to say the Stations of the Cross during the week. It seems there are always people in church. We've even had car loads of people come from Greenville, Meadville, and other parts of the diocese to take advantage of these beautiful Stations which we have. In addition to that, now that the weather is breaking, the tour groups will be starting up soon. They come from everywhere in the tri-state area for a tour of the church. That tour is given by Sister Marie and includes an explanation of the pipe organ by Mark Alloway as well as a brief concert.

I also have to tell you that I continue to be amazed at the number of people who register as new parishioners at St. Patrick's each week. It seems every week I sign welcome letters for 4 or 5 new members. And though I do not in any way want to denigrate older new members, I'm thrilled that so many of the new membership are young people, most of whom are married and many of whom now have a baby. I hope all of us who have been here so long will go out of our way to welcome any stranger we encounter at St. Patrick's.

I also love the way people "hang around" after the weekend Masses and visit with one another. Some Saturday evenings and Sunday mornings, there are people still standing in church visiting with each other a half hour after Mass has ended. I always pray that our parish "welcome the stranger, feed the hungry and provide a haven of prayer and worship for all who come here," and you certainly are making that happen.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

The St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 16,784 pounds of food to 632 families during the month of February. Total cost to the parish was \$928.57 all of which has been covered by your generosity in supporting this most important work.

You probably read recently of the closing of Gannondale on East Lake Road. That facility was founded by Archbishop Gannon in the 1920s as a place for unwed pregnant girls. They had care, love, etc. whereas they would have been in a much more hostile environment in their natural habitat. As trends changed, Gannondale reinvented itself as a facility for delinguent girls and young women. As years progressed, it cared for more and more hard core cases of criminal behavior in young girls. The way of treating those women has now changed and the facility is closing. The community of Sisters who staffed it has greatly diminished and aged and they are all returning to their motherhouse in Ohio. We owe them a debt of gratitude for their service to our diocese.

The closing is a clear example of what we face in many of our parishes and schools. They served another age, another time and are now no longer viable; and we have to be people of faith and move on. In many cases across the country when a parish faces closing, a group of parishioners rally and set battle grounds. "They're not closing our parish," becomes the motto. If, instead of all of that posturing, anger and confrontation, those people would take 25% of the energy they spend on that and spend it trying to pass on the faith tradition to their children, there might be a future. Otherwise, it is all an exercise in futility, anger, bitter feelings when we have to move on.

Bob, a 70-year-old extremely wealthy widower, shows up at the Country Club with a breathtakingly beautiful 25 year old blonde who knocks everyone's socks off. She gazes at him in wonder and his friends are aghast. "Bob, where did you find the trophy girlfriend?" one of them asked. "Girlfriend? She's my wife." They are knocked over and ask, "So how did you get her to marry you?" "I lied about my age," Bob replied. "What, did you tell her - you were only 50?" Bob smiles and says, "No, I told her I was 90."

A Moment of Reflection


