



Today is the Fourth Sunday of Lent. Our gospel will narrate a story of sight rendered to a blind man; here we read that God does not see as we see. In both instances we encounter challenges about what we see when we look at things. When the Phari-

sees looked at the blind man, they saw a sinner. David's family saw only a young sheep herder where God saw a future king. The story of David is important because is clearly demonstrates the power of God to raise up and transform, to establish and tear down. The Spirit of God will transform this boy into Israel's greatest king. We're reminded that our expectations do not correspond with God's. David, the last of the brothers to be interviewed, embodies one of the features of God's kingdom: "the last shall be first."

Think of the effort needed to make progress in the areas which Paul addresses now in his Letter to the Ephesians: that we move from darkness to light. We're told that once we were a child and now we are adults; once we were ignorant, but now we know; once we were without Christ, now we have him. And Paul's tone seems to add, "So act like it! Be an adult, use your knowledge, live like a Christian." Paul reminds us to take no part in the shameful things done in secret but to live always in the light. The last three lines of the reading, "Awake, o sleeper..." is a rousing call to action of living in the light of Christ.

Again today we have a very long gospel from John. We begin with the question and assumption that presumed that some sin, either of the individual or his parents, was the root cause of his blindness. John uses this misunderstanding to set up one of his typical scenarios: sequences that reveal his insight that Jesus is the Light of the World. The challenge of Jesus to the blind man to wash is met with compliance; it may be a test of faith which the blind man passes. We hear the neighbors who are astounded and each becomes immediately an authority claiming to know the truth. While the blind man initially responds joyfully to the fact that he can see; he is really not yet seeing what is being unfolded before him. The Pharisees begin to make judgments and accusations and Jesus responds angrily and then he turns to the blind man and invites him to see what Jesus is really unfolding for him—that he may see the Messiah.

I hope you don't think I'm nagging, but just a reminder that the Catholic Services Appeal is underway in all parishes in the diocese. Monies raised in this appeal are used to fund the education of future priests, care for retired priests, grants to Catholic Charities, expenses for our Marriage Tribunal, etc. Each parish is assessed a set amount which must be paid and any monies raised over and above that remain in the parishes. This year we have to raise \$11,803 at St. Hedwig's and \$42,350 at St. Patrick's. If we can exceed our goal at St. Patrick's, I can put that extra money toward paying down the debt we have from the church restoration. To date we have pledges at St. Patrick's to meet our assessment and anything additional can go toward our debt from the restoration.

We have a program to bring a few meals to new parents after they bring a baby home and are in need of a few more volunteers. It would just involve preparing one meal. If interested, call the parish office.

We're fast approaching the mid-point of Lent and time to ask ourselves "is this season making any difference in my life? Am I focused more on the needs of others? Do I spend some time in a prayerful conversation with my God? What have I done to help the poor, the hungry, the homeless? What are my priorities in life?" Pope Francis keeps telling us that mercy, more than anything else, is what Jesus asks of us and what will wipe away every stain of our sin and failure.

Speaking of Pope Francis, he recently held a meeting in Rome of the treasurers of all of the major religious orders in the world and he asked them to set priorities with what they do with their assets and investments. He said that we primarily have to ask "Are we serving the needs of humanity?" He is asking all of these religious orders, many of whom have huge investments. large tracts of valuable land, etc. to re-evaluate what they have, what they are doing with it and how it will serve humanity. He continues to call us to be, not a church of power as we have been so long, but a church of the poor, a church in service to the needs of others; not a church dictating political viewpoints, moral commands and control of other people's lives. He is asking us to be more and more each day, the Church that Jesus

asks us to be; not one of power & wealth.

Finance Council reviewed and approved the replacement of several sections of sidewalk in front of St. Patrick's Church. Some were damaged by the equipment used to point and work on the exterior of the building and others have just deteriorated. We are also putting central A/C on the ground floor of the rectory. We've had window units which are very expensive to run, very noisy and, most of all, are a real security threat because someone can push them in and enter the building. We hope to have the A/C in place by the time warm weather arrives.

I mentioned the leaking roof at the Food Pantry. The last of the bids arrived this past week, and I continue to get a bit overwhelmed by the ongoing costs of maintaining these old buildings. The low bid for the work on the roof is over \$25,000. The reason the bid is so high is because the area has been so long neglected, water has seeped beneath the roof and much of the framing and structure are rotted and have to be replaced. I'm not sure how we'll pay for it; but we will. This is another case that screams aloud that we cannot let these old buildings go; it's constant maintenance

With the large number of people attending Mass at St. Patrick's on Ash Wednesday and asking for a later Mass, I am going to hold all of the Ash Wednesday Masses next year at St. Patrick's because that is where the crowds of people are.

An old nun lived next door to a construction site and noticed the coarse language of the workers and decided to spend some time with them to correct their ways. She decided she would take her lunch and sit with the workers. She put her sandwich in a brown bag and walked over to the spot where the men were eating. Sporting a big smile, she walked up to the group and asked, "Do you men know Jesus Christ?" They shook their heads and looked at each other, very confused. One of the workers looked up into the steelworks and yelled out, "Anybody up there know Jesus Christ?" One of the workers yelled down, "Why?" The worker yelled back, "Because his mom's here with his lunch."
