

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Lent and we hear first from Ezekiel. He writes during a deep sense of depression among the Israelites that God has abandoned them and relegated Israel to tombs of exile and desolation. But Ezekiel is the mouthpiece through

which God speaks tender words, "O my people, I will open your graves." God has not forgotten his people. In our own day is not the Berlin wall and the wall of apartheid reminders that God continues to lift us out of desolation. God's second words, "I will put my spirit in you," are even more significant than the first. How do you speak to a battered wife or abused children huddled in fear? "I have promised and I will do it" is a very personal and direct assurance from a loving God to his people. Remember there is always a connection between our first reading and the gospel. Today we find it in references to tombs.

Paul offers a message of hope and promise in his letter to the Romans that echoes the words of Ezekiel. Paul starts with bad news: those in the "flesh" cannot please God, but he quickly qualifies and tells them that "you are not " part of that bad news. He then announces good news in the life of the Spirit. For Paul "flesh" is all those things that focus us on self rather than on God and others. It is the existence we had prior to baptism. Even though we still live in the flesh, it no longer defines us; our identity now is in the Lord.

Every Gospel story speaks to then and now. Then God acted powerfully in Jesus, turning darkness into light, despair into hope, death into life. It also tells us that lives can still be transformed. Almost daily death finds us whether in the guise of a failed relationship or a great loss. We drink life's pain and enter dark tombs with large stones rolled across them. But faith tells us that Jesus comes today as he did for Lazarus. Today's story employs the familiar Johannine motif of day and night in which day refers to Christ's earthly ministry. ("If one walks during the day, he does not stumble.") While Martha greets Jesus as a friend, he sort of rebukes her and rather than speaking to her on friendly terms, he makes a public proclamation that he is the source of life, prompting Martha to lay aside her agenda and make a clear declaration of faith. In raising Lazarus from the dead, Jesus seals his

fate in John's eyes and he will go from Bethany straight to Jerusalem and death. Here we find Jesus proclaiming his authority more than in any other passage in John's gospel. What we must remember is that just as he rolled away the stone and gave new life to Jesus so can he roll away the stones that cover our lives and give us new life.

A reminder that during Lent we are conducting our annual Catholic Services Appeal in all of our parishes. At St. Patrick's we must raise \$42.350 and at St. Hedwig's we must raise \$11,803. I'm hoping at St. Patrick's to significantly exceed our goal so that I can put the excess money (which remains in the parish) toward our restoration debt. To date, we have pledges of \$48,630.00.

If I ever complain about our utility bills again, slap me!!!!! Father Ferrick told me recently that his January gas bill at the cathedral was \$28,436!!!

People have been asking about the Easter schedule so that they can plan. We will have the Holy Thursday Mass at 7 PM at St. Patrick's. On Good Friday, Stations at St. Patrick's are at noon and the Liturgy is at 2 PM. On Holy Saturday we are not permitted to celebrate the Easter Vigil before 9 PM and that is when we will begin. We will follow the regular Sunday Mass schedule on Easter Sunday. The parish office will be closed Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Monday.

There will be a meeting of the Irish Festival Committee immediately following the Sunday 10:30 Mass in the Pascal Room.

We have a program to provide a few nights meals for parents of a new baby just to give them a little chance to get back on their feet. The proiect is chaired by Abby Lechner, and we are in need of additional volunteers. If you are interested in just providing one meal, please contact the parish office and Abby will contact you.

I'm starting the evenings in the rectory with this year's bridal couples. We invite them in for a casual evening. Drinks at 5:30 and dinner at 6:30. I have it catered so that I can spend time with them. People from the parish have graciously volunteered to help serve and clean up. As I've mentioned in the past, we have the original

Cauley family china which dates to 1908 and is 23 carat gold. There is an additional service, this one for 24 people, that was made in 1938, and is also 23 carat gold. We get all of it out and set up the dining room as it was almost a century ago, and it's a fun evening. I have 4 or 5 couples at a time and it's a chance to get to know them better and to hopefully make them feel more welcome in the parish.

Our number of weddings is down a little bit this year. I think we have 28 on the calendar. Catholic weddings in the Diocese of Erie are down over 50% from the year 2000, simply a sign that there are fewer young people in our area and also that fewer of them are opting to be married in the church. I'm thrilled that so many want to be married here even though it's a great deal of work. The staff here is committed to doing anything we can to make these young people feel welcome at St. Patrick's.

The chairs of the Irish Festival Committee met recently to review where we are with all of the plans for moving the September event down to the church grounds. I have to tell you that I sensed a great deal of enthusiasm about the project even though we all realize it's going to involve extra work and a lot of patience as we work out the kinks. We are meeting again the week after Easter with the food vendors and then should be able to wrap that up.

After Easter I'm going to be looking for come people in the parish who might be willing to build us a 20' x 20' stage, preferably in sections so that we can store in for future years. We have a similar size dance floor, and if we can get our own stage it will save us \$1,500 per year.

Fourth Sunday of Lent (Laetare Sunday: pronounced "lay-tar-ray") Why is there such an emphasis on "joy" and "rejoicing" on this Sunday of Lent? Joy and rejoicing are emphasized because joy is the fruit or result of penance, prayer. and works of mercy directed toward others. When this kind of freedom is achieved, a feeling of gratitude to God appears in one's thoughts, works, and feelings. From there, it passes on into how we act (our actions and deeds). Experiencing this makes one very aware of God. This awareness of God produces a sense of well-being. The result of this feeling of "well-being" is what we call joy. Since it comes from God and not the usual earthly sources of joy, this is what Jesus meant when He said that He would give us a peace and joy the world cannot give (See John 14:27)! It can be yours! These are solid indicators that a person is close to God. Lent is a season geared to bring this closeness about.


