



Today is the Third Sunday of Easter and again our first reading is from Acts of the Apostles. Last Sunday's nest reading told us how successful the apostles were in preaching in Jerusa-IJlem. Between that reading and today's the high priest has had the

apostles arrested only to have an angel release them. Today begins with their being brought before the Sanhedrin who orders them to stop preaching for several reasons, one of which is the apostle's telling people of the role the Sanhedrin played in the crucifixion. Peter replies by saying that they must obey God, not men, and that Jesus, whom they crucified, has been raised and is now their God. Finally, they are released with another order not to preach.

Our second reading is also again from Revelations. In our first reading, the apostles claim that Jesus sits at God's right hand; this reading says the same thing only in apocalyptic style, ie., John is describing a vision. This style of literature was written in a code because the author wants the persecuted audience to understand it but not the persecutors. John does not call Jesus by name, but instead as the "Lamb of God," a title which would mean nothing to non-believers.

Our gospel from John describes another of Jesus' appearances after his resurrection. Take note of several points in this account. First, they do not recognize Jesus initially. The postresurrection Jesus was somehow different in appearance than the pre-resurrection Jesus. Secondly, Jesus cooks some fish for them and shares it with them. That is telling us that the post-resurrection Jesus possessed a real human body, he was not some type of a spiritual being. Spiritual beings don't cook food for others and certainly don't eat it themselves. Furthermore, no one was frightened when they saw the postresurrection Jesus. They realized who he was but as of yet, they still do not understand what has taken place and its full meaning.

The 2013 Diocesan Services Appeal is currently being conducted in all of the parishes of the diocese. Each parish is assessed a set amount and that must be paid to the diocese whether we make that amount or not. At St. Hedwig's our assessment is \$11,029; at St. Patrick's it is \$38,500. I'm hoping that you can help each of

parishes by participating in whatever way you can. Some of you are still paying on a pledge to the restoration of St. Patrick's and I don't expect you to do both that and the CSA. If you can help. please do so.

I continue to be amazed at the number of people coming to see the church. When we hosted the open house for Erie Insurance, we had huge crowds of people. We have a similar open house coming up for the UPMC Hamot employees on April 19. Various parish organizations from all over the city and the diocese have visited. We even had a group from Lakeside United Methodist Church. We also host regular tour buses that come from all over the surrounding region. When those tours come, Sister Marie gives a history of the building, Mark Aloway gives a brief organ concert and Alice Daub has the gift shop open for visitors.

We're having a color brochure of the church printed to distribute to visitors and will also have them in church if you wish to take one.

Next Sunday, the second collection is the annual Good Shepherd Collection which provides care for our retired priests. Last year's collection in the diocese totaled \$198,853, the largest ever. Since this collection began in 2008, \$858,171 has been raised. Thank you for your generosity and I hope you will continue to support the appeal.

We have completely redone the restroom that serves the Food Pantry and the sacristy of the main church. The floor in that room, like the entire floor in the Food Pantry, was completely rotted through and had to be replaced. We then tiled it, and put in new fixtures.

The railing for the choir loft has been ordered and will be installed as soon as it is made. There is a railing in the center section, but not on the side areas. Because that railing is so low, safety codes require a railing.

If anyone is planning a wedding at St. Patrick's in 2014, you would be wise to explore availability as we already have a large number of reservations. Since the restoration of the church, it seems that every bride in Erie County wants to be married here!!!! We're now in full swing with the 2013 weddings and they don't end until New Year's Eve!

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

We've hosted two groups of bridal couples for dinner at St. Patrick's, and I have to tell you what fun evenings those are. All of the couples are in the same boat, and I overhear them discussing the same challenges that they are facing. It's also a chance for me to get to know them a bit better rather than just be a stranger when I stand before them for their wedding ceremony. I think many of them feel alienated from the church, and these dinners are also a small way of trying to say that we welcome them. We have three more evenings to go. I'm grateful to several parishioners who help serve and clean up which allows me time with the bridal couples.

It was amazing to see the number of young couples at Mass on Easter Sunday. There was a din over the entire Mass as you could hear babies fussing, and I love it. Please don't ever feel you have to take a fussing baby out of church because of me. It's a sign of life. We are extremely fortunate that a large number of young families have joined St. Patrick's Parish in the last two years. Our parish membership has gone from slightly over 200 families to over 600 families.

He repeats this the next nite and soon the whole village is praying for the soul of one of his brothers. The next nite, the bartender says to him. "All of us want to offer condolences on the death of your brother. You know—the two beers and all." The man replies, "You'll be happy to know that my two brothers are alive and well. It's just that I, myself, have decided to give up drinking for Lent."

A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: Acts 5:27-32. 40-41

Reading II: Psalm 5:27-6. 11-13

Revelation 5:11 –14

Gospel: John 21:1-19



How well do you see in the dark? Sometimes we can't see things as they really are. We need light and that is also true of the apostles in this week's gospel. They didn't recognize the man on shore as Jesus. John perceives Jesus' presence and Jesus invites them to breakfast. The early Christian community came to use the fish as a symbol for Jesus; it was the way they identified themselves to each other in times of persecution. It marks the resting place of Christians in the catacombs. The letters of the Greek word for fish, ichthus stood for the expression Jesus Christ (ich), son of God (thu), Savior (s). To follow faithfully, we need to live in his light: we also need the fish that Jesus serves - Himself, in our celebration of the Eucharist.
