

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Our first reading continues from last week's where you may recall Paul preached in the temple. The audience was so impressed that they invite him back to preach again as we hear today. Under Paul's guidance, the audience will shift from primarily Jewish to Gentile. He relates to that audience that Jesus was the fulfillment of all the Old Testament prophecies aimed only at the Israelites. However, Paul says that the Spirit has opened his eyes to the fact that many of those people kept their hearts and ears closed to Jesus, and so he extends it to anyone who will listen. While the Gentiles respond with great joy, the Jewish leadership were enraged. The ending words are important in that not only did Paul & Barnabas shake dust from their feet in protest to the Jewish leadership, but at the same time, they rejoice in the Holy Spirit.

Human hearts long to hear words of comfort and assurance like those proclaimed at the end of our second reading. During times of crisis, we all need a pledge that tears will be wiped away and that the one who loves us will forever shelter us. Though written to Christians enduring persecution, the Book of Revelation contains a timeless message. It asserts that those who oppose God's work will not prevail; that suffering, even martyrdom, will lead to new and greater life than we could have imagined.

Coming at the end of Jesus' Good Shepherd discourse, found only in John, today's brief passage asserts Jesus' devotion for his sheep and his identity with his father. In this reading, Jesus has been confronted by Jewish authorities who want him to tell them clearly if he is the Messiah. He responds by saying they don't believe because they are not among his sheep. His sheep, he says, are those who "hear" and "follow" him and he goes on to assert that they are hearing the

Father for whom he speaks. His opponents won't follow him because their hearts as well as their ears are closed.

I can't begin to thank so many of you for your generous response to the Catholic Services Appeal. This annual drive levies an assessment on each parish and any funds raised beyond that stay in the parish. As you can see, we have surpassed our assessment and I'm hoping that those who have not responded will consider a gift—whatever amount you want—so that we can use this extra money to pay down the debt on our restoration.

Speaking of that debt, in 2012 it was \$780,000. Today the balance is \$180,000 and by paying \$10,000 plus interest a month, we will have it down to \$60,000 in a year and pay it off completely in a year and a half. All of this thanks to your generosity.

The second collection this weekend is the annual Good Shepherd collection which helps with the retirement costs for our priests. We presently have 115 active priests in the diocese, including 7 of whom are over the age of 75. In addition, we have 49 retired priests and an additional thirty priests who will reach the age of 75 in the next five years. I hope you will consider helping with this annual appeal to help offset the costs of their retirement. Since this appeal began in 2009, we have raised \$1,352,879.

Open Doors, the organization that advocates for persecuted Christians, published a 47 page report recently which said that a minimum of 9,000-11,500 Christians have been killed in northern Nigeria, that 1.3 million Christians have fled their homes since 2000 and that 13,000 churches have been closed or destroyed. The report blamed radical Islam, Boko Haram and Muslim Hausa-Fulani herdsmen for the persecutions.

From the Pastor's Desk continued.....

I think by now you are aware of the draft plan unfolded for the future configuration of parishes in the Diocese of Erie. There is bound to be pain and nostalgia as people say goodbye to churches where they have worshipped all their lives, received sacraments, buried parents and grandparents. But we simply cannot go on as we have; we have to control change or change will control us.

Now that the draft proposal has been presented, people will have an opportunity to react to it and a final proposal will be presented in September. As you know, St. Hedwig's will no longer be partnered with St. Patrick's. St. Patrick's will remain a stand alone parish while St. Hedwig's will join a cluster of parishes under the title of Mother of Sorrows (St. Casimir, Holy Family, St. Ann's and St. Hedwig's.)

St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 16,739 pounds of food during the month of March at a cost to the parish of \$1,403.98. The Food Pantry served 759 families including 997 children and 429 elderly. Thank you for your ongoing support of this outreach project.

At the present time, we pay a Catholic school assessment of \$46,000 a year to the diocese. The new formula, which will tax 20% of offertory income, will be phased in over three years beginning in the 2016-17 fiscal year. We also pay a tax for secondary schools, and, as part of the transition, the amount distributed to secondary schools will be reduced by 50% over the transition period.

Bridal couples have been coming in for an evening of drinks and dinner at the rectory over the past few weeks and with two more to come.

Hospital regulations require a wheelchair for patients being discharged. However, one of my first days on the job, I found an elderly gentleman dressed and sitting on his bed with a suitcase at his feet who insisted that he did not need a wheelchair to leave the hospital. After a chat about rules being rules, he reluctantly let me wheel him to the elevator. On the way down, I asked him if his wife was meeting him. "I don't know," he replied, "she's still upstairs in the bathroom changing out of her hospital gown!"

THE ONCE AND FUTURE CHAIRS

What do Angie Kontur and Barb Fischer have in common—aside from charm, grace, and good looks? They are the bookends to this year's festival. Angie shepherded the festival from Rainbow Gardens to outside on 4th street—with no blueprint or prior knowledge, but with lots of eager and experienced helpers, she built the outdoor festival. And Barb is next to take over the reigns and give the festival her personal stamp, working this year in tandem with this year's chairpersons.

Angie is a recent inductee as a Lady of St. Patrick who once bathed an elephant in the Mekong River—"Why?" you may ask—because she got it dirty riding on it, of course! After a successful real estate career that landed her in the RE/Max Real Estate Hall of Fame, she spends her time volunteering at the food pantry, the homeless shelter, the St. Patrick's Pastoral Planning group, Parkinson Partners on NW Pa. and, of course the Irish Festival. She and her husband also provide food for the homeless shelter and Greg is on the board of the St. Patrick's Haven. Their kids are now on both coasts and in Pittsburgh and we're told they have a granddaughter named Coraline who is absolutely perfect in every way—takes after Barb, we guess.


