From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the third Sunday of Easter and again we read from Acts of the Apostles. Today's reading is an excerpt from the second major speech that Peter delivers in Jerusalem. The focus is on the meaning of the death and resurrection of Jesus and takes places just after Peter heals a cripple. Like all of the speeches in Acts, this reflects the kerygma (oral proclamations) which Luke wants to preserve for us. One of the consistent themes in all of these speeches is the connection between the resurrection of Jesus and the God of the historical figures of ancient Israel. The speech ends with a call to conversion. It is not enough simply to listen, but we must change. Note the dramatic change in Peter from the bumbling, fumbling pre-resurrection man to this man of incredible faith and insight. The resurrection completely transformed him.

The author of this First Letter of John is not the same John who wrote the gospel. The language and terminology are dramatically different. He does not identify himself in this letter but in the second and third letters, he refers to himself as a "presbyter" suggesting some type of leadership within a congregation. Remember we would not have priests in the church until the late 3rd century; the early church had presbyters, appointed at first by the apostles to oversee a local church but were not ordained. That would come much later.

Our gospel is the final resurrection appearance in Luke and since Luke wrote both the gospel and Acts of the Apostles, it is not surprising that a similar theme arises in both: the death and the resurrection of Jesus fulfills God's covenant with Israel. Both in last week's resurrection story from John and today, Jesus greets his disciples with "Peace be with you," a comforting phrase given the trauma they have all experienced. Both John

and Luke place great emphasis on the physical resurrection. He invites his disciples to touch him "because a ghost does not have flesh and bones as I do." He also asks for something to eat, again emphasizing a physical resurrection. There is also found in both accounts an element of doubt and confusion. Finally, Jesus' final words convey two important elements of the early Church: the life, death and resurrection fulfill scripture ("the law of Moses and the prophets and psalms") and second, the instruction that the disciples are to preach "repentance for the forgiveness of sins."

If you listen carefully to these post-resurrection stories, you will easily hear the three fundamental doctrines of our faith surrounding death. First, note that no one recognizes Jesus at first. Remember Mary Magdalene at the tomb on Easter morning. She thought he was the gardener until he called her name. Remember the two disciples on the road to Emmaus later on Easter Sunday. They, too, did not initially recognize him. We conclude from this that our appearance after our own resurrection will be different than our preresurrection appearance.

Secondly, note that Jesus is not a ghost. He possesses a real physical body. He eats food, no one is frightened at his appearance. This gives us our second doctrine—that we will possess a real physical body after the resurrection.

And, finally, if you take a map of Israel and note all of the places where Jesus appears, it is obvious that he is free of the limitations of time and space. He suddenly appears in the upper room though "the doors and windows were locked." It is from this that we draw the conclusion that we, too, will be free of the limitations of time and space after the resurrection.

When you put these three factors together, death doesn't sound quite so bad.

Jamie will then be deacon at the 5 PM Mass that same day and preach his first homily. He will spend the summer months as a deacon at St. Joseph Parish, Warren, and then return to St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore to complete his final year of theology studies. In the spring of 2016 he will be ordained to priesthood for the diocese of Erie. I know you all join me in congratulating Jamie and in thanking him for responding to God's call. We desperately need young men like him to assume the mantel of priesthood, and our parish rejoices that he is moving in this direction.

Congratulations to St. Patrick parishioner and lector, Attorney Ed Smith, who is one of eight candidates for judge. In voting by his peer attorneys, the Erie County Bar Association gave Ed the second highest number of votes among the eight candidates.

There will be a meeting of the Irish Festival Committee on Sunday, May 3, after the 10:30 AM Mass. This year we are not going to have a breakfast on the Sunday of the festival, but will continue with the festival from 11 AM until about 2 PM. Once the committee starts meeting, we can get things finalized. I think I mentioned we are moving the kitchen to the east side of church.

This is a church at Schweidnitz near Breslau, the new Polish names are now Svidnice and Wroclay. After the defeat of Nazi Germany in 1945, the town became part of Poland according to the post-war Potsdam Conference in 1945. The German population who had not fled during the war were subsequently expelled to Germany and replaced with Poles. They changed the historical names to Polish and have so become unrecognizable as being of German origin, but the craftsmanship which the original natives have left there are now rich sources of Polish tourist trade. An Old Wooden Church in Poland.....really something to see. This church is so beautiful, one has to wonder how you could possibly concentrate on the service. This church had been built by Germans since this part of Poland had been German until WWII, when the Oder/Neisse line had been drawn. Take a good look. Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Next Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Easter, is known as Good Shepherd Sunday. Since 2009, the diocese has established the Good Shepherd Collection so that parishioners can show their appreciation and love for our priests – those already retired those who will retire in the future. We have been so blessed with dedicated priests who have tirelessly given their lives to serve the people of the diocese. This has been, and continues to be, a true blessing and one for which we are so grateful.

When a priest is ordained there is a point in the ceremony where he kneels in front of the bishop and places his hands inside those of the bishop and promises obedience of service to his bishop; in return the bishop, by holding the new priest's hands, commits himself to be responsible for the priest's well-being throughout all of his life, including old age and retirement.

Our priests are with us every step of the way celebrating new births and burying our deceased loved ones. They offer their lives without expectation of financial gain beyond that which they need to sustain themselves. As they are, we, in turn, are called to minister to their needs. Let us show our gratitude to our priests by helping to provide for their care and needs in retirement.

The number of priests reaching retirement age continues to grow each year. Currently, there are 50 retired priests within our own Diocese. Although they may be viewed as "retired", many of them remain very active providing sacramental ministry in our parishes, schools, hospitals, nursing homes and substituting for priests to allow them to take vacation.

The response to the Good Shepherd collection has been one of great generosity. The unfunded liability in our priests' retirement fund, along with the rising expenses of healthcare needs for retired priests now and in the years to come, relies on funds generated by this annual collection.

Your contributions for the "Good Shepherd Collection" can be made on Good Shepherd Sunday—April 25/26 at your parish or online at <u>www.ErieRCD.org</u>. Every contribution both great and small is greatly appreciated and will make a difference in the lives of our retired priests. This collection should not be confused with the collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious, which occurs in December and assists religious men and women – nuns, brother and priests belonging to religious orders. That - collection does not benefit retired diocesan priests.

I know that you hold great affection for our priests and deacons in the diocese who now serve our parishes in active ministry. Please pray that our Diocese will be blessed with more seminarians willing to respond to the call of the Lord. I know all our priests join me in thanking you for your kindness and generosity to our retired priests through the annual Good Shepherd Collection.

May the joy of the Risen Christ fill your hearts and homes with His love this Easter Season.
