



Today is the Third Sunday of Easter and we continue to read first from the Acts of the Apostles. During the church year, we read our first reading from the Old Testament, with the exception of the Easter season when we read from Acts. This book was written by Luke as a continuation of his gospel, and gives us an incredible insight into the early church. Almost all of the information that we know about that early church comes from Luke.....One theme that will be dominant in Acts of the Apostles as well as Paul's letters is that these early Christians were convinced that the Second Coming of Jesus was immanent and they lived accordingly. Many of them sold everything they owned

and lived in common with one another, they spent long days in almost charismatic prayer with a heightened sense that Jesus would come soon. That early church had a major crisis on its hands as they slowly came to the realization that this was not what was going to happen. When you hear Paul write that those who are not married, should stay that way, etc.—all of that flows from this belief that Jesus' Second Coming was at hand.....We hear Peter, the stumbling and fumbling disciple of Mark's Gospel, who now understands what has happened and can't wait to proclaim it to everyone. Peter pulls no punches as he tells the crowd that they had once handed Jesus over to death, but he becomes conciliatory when he tells them that they acted out of ignorance and that our response now is to "repent.".....We continue our second reading from the first Letter of John which he addresses to those whom he calls "my children." Like a kind parent, he chides his audience and reminds them that if they say they know Jesus but do not keep his commandments, the truth is not in us.....Our gospel today comes from Luke and is the wonderful and familiar story of the disciples on the road to Emmaus. Our gospels for these Sundays are stories of Jesus' appearances after the resurrection. Note once again that they do not recognize Jesus as he walks with them and illustriously explains the scriptures to them. He finds them captivated by his words, but unable to recognize him. Remember how these post-resurrection appearances find a Jesus who is somehow different in appearance than the pre-resurrection Jesus. We're reminded constantly that he was not a ghost, he didn't frighten any one, he ate meals with them, etc. So he possessed a real physical body, but a body somehow different in appearance than he had before. And, finally, he rises above the limitations of time and space because he's all over the place in a very short period of time. He would never have had the opportunity to travel to all of these different places by ordinary means. Those three realities—a real physical body, somehow different in appearance and one that is not bound by the limits of time and space—are what the resurrection offers for each of us. When we stop and think about it, this resurrected Jesus has changed our lives. Death no longer has any hold over us......I know you join me in welcoming Father Jason Glover of the Theology Department at Gannon University as the celebrant of the Saturday evening 5 PM Mass today and also welcoming Monsignor John Hagerty, retired Headmaster of Cathedral Prep who will celebrate the Sunday morning 9 & 10:30 AM Masses. I will return on the 29th.....The timetable for the church restoration is now complete (provided we can raise 50% of the money to begin). On August 10, Schutte Woodworking will remove the outside rows of pews and Safway Scaffolding will begin building towers along the west and east walls. The center pews and the sanctuary will remain untouched until immediately after the last wedding on August 25. At that time, the center pews will be removed and the remainder of the scaffolding will be put in place....On September 3, the Conrad Schmitt foreman and one artist will arrive to cover the Stations, the pipe organ, etc. On September 11, the full crew of 10 Conrad Schmitt artists will arrive and begin working. They will finish their work and leave on December 7th. At that time, the scaffolding will be removed and the pews put back in place. Meanwhile, the new sanctuary floor will be laid, and the new carpeting placed in the aisles. Most of the electrical work will also be done between December 7 and what we plan as our first Mass in the restored church on Christmas Eve.....It's an exciting time for us, but it's also a time which will try our patience. The Cauley is not going to be the most comfortable nor uplifting environment in which to celebrate our weekend liturgies, but that will make us yearn all the more to be able to return to the restored church. And—I hope—encourage all of you to be as generous as possible in supporting this project......I had mentioned that the booklet for our Irish Festival this year will include memorials of people or families whom you wish to be remembered. Those memorials can be accompanied by a photograph. If you are interested in memorializing someone in your family, or even an entire family, please contact the parish office and we'll get you the details.....We have initiated Online Giving at St. Patrick's, a program that can benefit both parishioners and the parish. The program is secure and confidential and it is flexible. You can start or stop your contributions at any time. You can make your contribution to the church in this way, and you will receive notification. The parish benefits in increased offertory and dramatically cuts down on the time the parish office has to spend recording contributions each week. By using Online Giving, it is automatically recorded into your account. If interested, please contact the parish office.....Found in a church bulletin: "Next Thursday there will be tryouts for the choir. They need all the help they can get." Also "Irving Benson and Jessie Carter were married October 24th in our church. So ends a friendship that began in their school days." And finally, "The ladies of the church have cast off clothing of every kind. They may be seen in the church basement on Friday afternoon.".....Don't complain about my bulletin!!!



As a sacramental Church, Roman Catholicism faces unique challenges and opportunities in this endeavor.


