



Today is the 4th Sunday of Easter and we continue to read from the Acts of the Apostles hearing again today another one of Peter's early discourses. All of the fear and hesitation that had marked the pre-resurrection Peter is gone and we now have a man who is bold in his proclamation. He and John have been arrested for healing a cripple which causes him to burst into this bold statement. Peter seems to be recovering from his own history: abandoning Jesus in the garden, his threefold denial, the fearful waiting and hiding in the upper room, and now he is transformed into a bold proclaimer of the word. While he stands before hostile leaders, he is not hesitant for a moment to preach to them. This amazing miracle has occurred because of the man you crucified, he insists. His faith is not philosophical, but based on concrete realities like the empty tomb and a walking cripple. Because Peter takes such a bold posture in preaching the gospel, he will frequently be imprisoned and eventually martyred for his beliefs......If you are visiting Rome, you want to be sure to include a visit to the Mammartime Prison at the far end of the forum, and you are able to go down into the cell where Peter was detained. Once there, you get an idea of how cruel this form of punishment was. Nearby you can also visit the church of San Pietro in Vinculi (St. Peter in Chains). The church contains the monumental statue of Moses which Michaelangelo was carving for Pope Julius' tomb, but is also contains a large glass case in which are kept the chains that bound Peter when he was imprisoned. .....Our second reading from John's first letter is one of those wonderfully calming and soothing statements of God's love. This reading is proclaimed twice in the church year, today and on the feast of All Saints. The words give us hope that one day we will all be saints. But in light of what we know Peter and the others to be going through in a hostile world, we are told "the world does not know us." Forget that, he tells us, and warns that our greatest danger lies in our not seeing what we are and what God has done for us.....Today's gospel from John is the familiar story of the Good Shepherd. John is the only gospel author to give Jesus this title and the only one to tell this story. John is also the only gospel author to give Jesus a number of other titles, Bread of Life, The Way the Truth and the Life, etc. None of these titles are found in the other three gospels. The closing line today is one in which we learn the meaning of discipleship as demonstrated in Jesus' own life. We're told very clearly that discipleship and love equal obedience to the father......The 50 days from Easter Sunday to Pentecost are celebrated in a joyful exultation as one feast day, or better, as one "great Sunday." These, above all others, are the days for the singing of the Alleluia. While Scripture scholars are of the mind that the resurrection and the ascension both took place on Easter Sunday, we celebrate them liturgically as being 40 days apart. The first eight days of the Easter season are what is called the Octave of Easter. You will notice that the dismissal from Mass includes a double Alleluia......The paschal candle, a symbol of the presence of the risen Christ among the people of God, remains in the sanctuary near the altar or the pulpit and will continue here until Pentecost. The church also asks that children making their First Communion do so during the Easter season.....Work is complete now on the installation of the new electrical system in church as well as the new air conditioning system. Michael DeSanctis of Gannon University is going to do the faux finishing on each of the units and they will blend into the marble very easily. If you want to see some earlier work that he did, go into the west tower room and look at the radiator cover. That cover was a dark brown......I had no idea that the restoration was going to be so much work! I'm blessed with an incredible committee. I don't think I've ever worked with a committee that does its homework like this group does. I simply don't know a thing about air conditioning, electrical, etc. and the subcommittee for those projects took over and handled the entire thing. The same is true with the pews and the new cushions. We're now starting to tackle the new lighting system. We've engaged a lighting consultant from Cleveland who is meeting with us to scope out a plan which will provide much better lighting. One thing I learned at the Conrad Schmitt Studios in Milwaukee is that lighting is as important as is paint, and if you look around the church you can see a number of areas where the lighting is very poor......I've been meeting with people from the various tile companies in town, and they are recommending that we put down a 20 inch square white tile on the sanctuary floor and then all the way across the front there will be a 12 inch wide emerald green tile. In addition, we will have emerald green tile under the altar coming out about 15 inches all the way around the altar......You might notice if you look at the altars that they are a bit darkened. I'm told that is from the smoke from the fire in 1978. A parishioner whose expertise and work is in cleaning materials tells me that there is now a cleaning solution for marble and alabaster that can remove those stains. We're going to try it on a spot on the altar that is a bit hidden to see if it works. If it does, he tells me that the altars will sparkle. The main altar is marble and alabaster and weights 22 ton. There is a huge brick foundation in the basement underneath it to support it......As we look at the amount of money we need to raise for this project, I can't help but think of the daunting task that faced Father Peter Cauley and those poor penniless immigrants in building this magnificent structure. But they did it. So can we!!......A first grader was listening to her teacher talking about whales.
