From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Fifth Sunday of Easter and we read again from Acts of the Apostles. One of the most dramatic moments in Acts is the conversion of Paul. Luke sees it as such a significant event that he offers three accounts of it. By the time Luke wrote Acts (about 85 AD), about 20 years after Paul's martyrdom, Luke saw Paul's conversion and thirty year mission to the Gentiles as the key to understanding the birth of the Church. Today we hear of the fear the disciples had with Paul. Prior to his conversion, Luke describes the terrible deeds of Paul, ie., dragging men and women out of their homes and handing them over to be imprisoned. Allowing Paul to infiltrate the church of Jerusalem would be very dangerous and it is only through Barnabas's witness and testimony that the disciples welcomed him. We're told that the Hellenists (Jews who spoke Greek) tried to kill him. Fearing for his safety, the disciples helped him escape to Tarsus, returning Paul to the city where he grew up.

In the first Letter of John, the presbyter (leader of the local church) urges people to love in word and in deed.

Our gospel readings for the three remaining Sunday of Easter are taken from John's "farewell discourse (chapters 13-17) in which Jesus shares his final meal with his disciples. In MT, MK & LK, Jesus teaches through simple parables; in John, he does so in lengthy, highly theological discourses. Jesus refers to himself as the true vine and the disciples as branches. This metaphor would be expressed in Israel for centuries, ie, the vineyard is not being properly cared for. For John, it is not enough to remain in Christ, but we have to bear fruit. For John, bearing fruit means professing Jesus as the Christ and the Son of God to others as well as loving one another. when they were bearing much fruit and being counted among Jesus' disciples. Just as Jesus glorified the Father through the resurrection, so too, followers of Christ have an avenue for glorifying the Father.

Next Sunday is Mother's Day and our bulletin will include an insert listing the names of mothers both living and deceased whom you wish remembered in Mass.

Representative parishioners from both St. Hedwig and St. Patrick parishes joined parishioners from every other parish on the East Side of Erie for a Listening Session recently. The session is part of the Pastoral Planning for the diocese and have been held in every area of the diocese. At the session, each parish was asked to identify its strongest point, its weakest, rate the liturgies, homilies and music, the school or Religious Ed program, etc. We were asked how each parish can help foster an increase in vocations to the priesthood, etc. Once all of the listening sessions are complete, all of that data will be formulated and in June those same people will hear the results of those sessions.

After that stage is completed, the diocesan team who are spearheading the Pastoral Plan will sift through the data and make recommendations to Bishop Persico as to how we re-energize our parishes, what steps to we need to take to make the parishes more vibrant, do we need to merge some parishes or even suppress some? How do we assure quality liturgies, music and homilies, how do parishes continue to be financially stable and able to maintain their facilities, etc.?

According to the time plan which was given us, Bishop Persico will then announce a reorganization of the diocese in early January 2016, and we will then regroup and attempt to make the parishes more vibrant, etc.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

The number of Catholic marriages in the United States is at its lowest point since 1965. Statistics show that there were over 420,00 Catholic weddings in 1970 but by 2014 that number had dwindled to 154,000. The report says there is no definitive answer but that we're seeing an increase in cohabitation, the notion of destination weddings, etc. The report also showed that annulments have dropped dramatically. In the US there were 60,691 annulments in 1985; last year there were 18,558. The report concludes that divorce is becoming less common and that more and more people who do divorce have no desire to seek an annulment before a second marriage.

I received our assessments from the diocese this past week, and I must tell you I am shocked at how high they are. On a total income of \$434,049, we must pay \$24,617 to the Diocesan Fund, \$11,275 to Priest Retirement, \$44,397 to Catholic School Support and \$46,585 to the Catholic Service Appeal. That totals \$126,000 or close to 25% of our total revenue. I realize that our income has increased dramatically from \$159,000 in 2009 to \$434,000 this past year; but those assessments seem to me to be inordinately high. We have the highest Catholic school assessment of any parish on the eastside of Erie while we have the second highest income. We are also the fifth highest Catholic school assessment of any parish in the entire diocese. At the same time. I think we have to realize how blessed we are at St. Patrick's with resources that many other parishes do not have; which always demands a response of stepping forward and doing our fair share. Perhaps the real challenge of the gospel is to do more than our share.





A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: Acts 9:26-31

Reading II: 1 John 3:18-24

Gospel: John 15:1-8



The metaphors of Jesus being the vine of God, the vineyard grower, and the disciples being the branches of that vine provide a theme for meditation by any gardener re-engaging in the awakening growing season. Growing is not a brief task, but requires patient and constant tending during a long season. And so it is with each of us in our relationship with God-responding to God's constant tending throughout our lifetime. Jesus uses the word "remain" eight times in this passage, a term which implies the promise of security and good things to come. Jesus "remain" connotes not only the significance of their relationship to him, but to one another, and to becoming a fruitful community together, to become church. As a church community, we should have the courage and wisdom to take the necessary actions by bearing the fruits of the Spirit and then we will remain. What pruning do you still need to be more fruitful in your living as a true Christian?
