



Today is the third Sunday of Easter and once again we read first from the Acts of the Apostles. We begin a se-Desk ries of proclamations heralding the resurrection of Jesus and the salvation of the world. Of the five proclamations, Peter is the unlikely source of

four of them. Despite the fact that he is a fisherman, not a trained orator; that religious authorities are going to frown on his efforts; that the crowds think Peter and the disciples are drunk, and most importantly that Peter stands up with no clear idea of what he is going to say, despite all of this. Peter validates Jesus' choice of him as leader. The transformation of Peter from the bumbling fool of the gospels, the man who denied Jesus three times, etc. to this incredible man of faith is nothing short of extraordinary. Peter has experienced the resurrection and is forever changed. He quotes Psalm 16, attributing to Jesus what David says of the coming Messiah.

Our second reading will also come from Peter and his first letter. With fatherly concern he calls for behavior that is consistent with the new status we have received through the blood of Christ. He reminds us that we have been rescued from the futile conduct we inherited from our ancestors. He is referring to sin and says that we are free from it, not through perishable things like silver and gold, but the blood of Christ.

Few Scripture stores are as beloved as the one we hear today. There is much about us as we read of the disciples on the road to Emmaus, for we too often walk through life feeling afraid and alone; we too often are unable to recognize the "stranger" who walks besides us . Jesus intentionally plays dumb as he asks "What sort of things?" Clopas vents some anger. He's obviously disappointed at having seen the hoped-for Messiah strung up on a cross. He needs to be andry with someone and this stranger is an easy target. Jesus tells them what fools they are for not understanding. We have a clear example here of the low role of women for they have heard of the women going to the tomb, but who wants to believe women! Jesus calls their lack of faith an act of foolishness. They knew Jesus, they knew the law, they heard the testimony of the women, they stand in the very presence of Jesus and still don't understand. The entire story ends with the "breaking of the bread" and how Jesus

is revealed to us in that action-the Eucharist. The ending of the story is joyous exultation as opposed to its beginning in anger and disappointment.

Celebrant of the Saturday evening Mass at St. Patrick's next Saturday will be Father Jason Glover of Gannon University. Celebrant of the Sunday morning 8 and 10:30 AM Masses at St. Patrick's and the 9 AM Mass at St. Hedwig's will be Monsignor Richard Sullivan, retired pastor of St. Andrew's Parish. I will return next Tuesday.

I know I speak for the entire parish when I thank the Erie Community Foundation for a grant to cover 100% of the costs of replacing the roof over our St. Patrick's Food Pantry. You may recall that it has been leaking badly, and we applied for a grant because the Food Pantry is not a religious undertaking but a social outreach to the community. We are the largest food pantry in the city and regularly feed up to 900 families a week. The Erie Community Foundation has been extremely generous and kind to us. I think I expressed to you my concern as to where I would come up with the money to undertake this project, a project that simply has to be done.

The Erie Community Foundation exists to help non-profits in Erie County and renders an incredible service to the community. Individuals are invited to establish a trust at the Foundation, and can then determine how income from that trust is used or they can allow the Foundation itself to make that determination. We are very fortunate to have such an organization in the city, and I feel particularly grateful for the help they have given our Food Pantry. You may recall that, two years ago when we discovered that the floor in the Food Pantry was collapsing, it was again the Erie Community Foundation who came to our rescue.

A new study by CARA (The Center for Applied Research in America), an organization that studies religious trends, notes that infant baptisms in the Catholic Church in the United States have fallen to 20% of all live births, down from 24% in the past. The report also notes that Catholic marriages in the United States have fallen from 20% of all marriage ten years ago to only 8% today. It isn't the case that Catholics aren't marrying says

the report. They simply aren't marrying in the church. While the church is declining sharply in the northeast and Midwest, it is largely because of out migration to the south where the church is growing faster than dioceses can accommodate the numbers. There is also migration from other countries where baptized Catholics are now joining churches largely in the south. Migration from outside the US and from the north accounts for about 24% of the growth in the south while RCIA and baptisms account for 58% of the growth. An additional 18% are people "coming home."

In the early 1990s a bequest was left in the form of a scholarship fund at St. Peter grade school to assist with the tuition of any St. Patrick students who attend there. Unfortunately that money disappeared with the recent financial mishaps at the cathedral. But fortunately, it has been found and restored. As such, if any St. Patrick parishioner is attending Cathedral Grade School they can contact me and we will help with the tuition.

Blessing of blessings—the new Women's Restroom in St. Patrick's Church is finally finished. We began this work in August with the assumption that the walls were 36 inches thick and planned everything on that. Only later did we discover they are 52 inches thick!!! This building will never fall down. This new women's restroom will also allow a room for a bridal party as they prepare for their wedding. We will now switch the restrooms and what was the men's room in the past (the west side of the church) has become the new women's restroom with access from the vestibule or from the west tower room. The restroom on the east side of the church will now become the men's room and we will restore it al-SO.



Reading II: 1 Peter 1:17-21

Gospel: Luke 24:13-35

Scattered throughout our lives are moments of revelation. These moments have the potential to transform. Luke recounts one such moment, when the two disciples on the road to Emmaus felt like they were stumbling in the darkness. After their encounter with Jesus everything was changed for them; everything began to make sense. Encountering Christ in the blessing and breaking of the bread, the two disciples moved from spiritual darkness into light. And not only did they see, they acted. A moment of revelation means nothing without action. Our lives are full of moments of revelation, and in the clarity of these moments we are called to act. How often is it that we look and do not act. Think back to some of your own a-ha moments of clarity. What was it like to "see"?
