

Today is the Feast of Corpus Christi, Latin for the Body of Christ. Around the world today there will be processions as priests carry the Blessed Sacrament through the streets of villages and cities in Europe and even in the United States. Our neighboring

St. Stanislaus parish will host their annual procession today.

In our first reading from the Book of Deuteronomy, Moses asks his people to do what we do in every Mass we celebrate. We remember. We remember that in Christ, God changed the world forever and we profess faith in truths that we can never prove. Moses is asking something much easier—that the people remember that God saved them from slavery in Egypt. The people he is addressing are the very ones who were part of that, but the human memory is fragile and quickly fades. He reminds them how God saved them from the serpents that attacked them, how he gave them food to eat and water to drink. But how quickly we forget.

In our second reading from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, Paul is focusing on the person of Christ—his life, death and resurrection—that we encounter and confess when we receive the Eucharist. But Paul goes a step further and says that it is not only the "bread" but also "we", many though we are, who are now Christ's body. As his body we are placed on the Eucharistic table right along with the Lord, broken and shared right along with him. The consequence is that Eucharist is not just a way of becoming one with Jesus, but a way of entering more deeply into community, embracing a spirituality of communion with one another.

In our gospel, we hear Jesus announce to the crowds who he is. He had to know he'd meet with unparalleled skepticism. Yet there is no hint of an apology or explanation in his words. The crowd appears both angry and confused. They must decide whether this man is a blasphemer, a lunatic or possibly, a prophet. Though Jesus responds with "Amen, amen," a formula that suggests solemn assurance, his words are of little help to anyone who's mad at him or anyone who thinks him mad. Listen carefully as he addresses the cynical and confused as we hear no anger or judgment in his words. Instead, Jesus offers

himself as the only hope for eternal life, urging the crowd to let him who is "true food" and "true drink" be their source of nourishment. "I am the living bread come down from heaven" suggests the incarnation; "my flesh for the life of the world" alludes to his sacrificial death and "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood" suggests that the Eucharistic sacrament that makes Christ's death and resurrection constantly present and available within the believing community.

Today as the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, and we have returned to the custom of having the cup available at the Saturday evening and Sunday morning 10:30 AM Masses.

We met recently with the Erie Police Department and the Erie Insurance Security to take a look at security for the Festival. I must tell you again that Erie Insurance is the best neighbor we could ever have. They are adding a couple of security people who will be on foot patrol the entire time of the festival. They also have cameras focused on Fourth Street which are being watched 24 hours a day. We will have one Erie policeman here during the night hours on Thursday, Friday and Saturday. Most of the workers at the booths will have a small radio transmitter that if there is any type of a problem, they just have to push a button and the police will be here immediately. The police are also going to supply us with some small units that we can take a driver's license and swipe it and we will have an immediate reading if that person is over the age of 21. If they are, we will put a wrist band on their wrist and they will be able to purchase beer.

In reviewing the layout of the festival with Holy Trinity people who have real knowledge of how to do this, we have decided to add one more 40' x 60' tent which will be in the street immediately in front of the church. That tent will contain the 15'x 20' stage and the 20' x 20' dance floor as well as some tables and chairs for people to sit at and listen to the music.

We're going to need a great deal of volunteers this year, so I'm hoping everyone will jump in. We will need a large number of volunteers to set up and tear down and clean the Russian Church of the Nativity Parish Center for our breakfast on Sunday. We certainly want to return that room to

them in first class condition. As we get closer to the festival, we'll have sign up sheets for volunteers.

Have you ever thought of remembering your parish as you do your estate planning? A gift for a particular purpose or for the parish general fund can go a long way to helping us. Both St. Patrick's and St. Hedwig's are old buildings that are in constant need of repair. At St. Patrick's we have established the St. Patrick Foundation, and the monies in that fund can only be used to maintain and repair the church. None of that can be used for normal operating expenses. You might also consider naming the parish as beneficiary in a life insurance policy.

We need to paint the eaves on St. Patrick's Rectory, but because the building is three stories high, we need some type of a high lift to get up there. Does anyone in the parish own a business that has a piece of equipment that we could use or rent at a nominal fee for a few days so that we can get this painted? Our maintenance people can do the work; otherwise, I'm going to have to contract a painting company, and it will end up costing a small fortune.

I'm grateful to Dr. Forrest and Shirley Mischler for underwriting the costs of repairing and planting the small shrine area to the east of the church. That entire area had fallen into disrepair and was looking a little seedy, but thanks to their generosity and the volunteer work of Tim Torrey, Tom Golab, Mary Pat Schlaudecker (foreman!!) and Rick DeLuca, the area is now looking very nice and presentable. In working there, they discovered that this used to be some type of a fountain but we can't find any records or photos.




















Reading I: Deuteron 8:2-3, 14-16

Gospel: John 6:51-58



There are thousands of books out about the Eucharist written by people who are who are true mystics and scholars. But in receiving the Body of Christ, the believer responds with one word: "Amen." "Amen" is a word that came to English from Latin, which got it from Greek, which got it from Hebrew, which got it from Aramaic. In saying "Amen" when we receive Holy Communion, we are saving something very significant...we are confirming, supporting, and upholding all that the Body and Blood of Jesus is, that he is as real today as when he walked on this earth, and that he is an intimate part of our lives as we reach out to a world in need of comfort and healing. Speaking of the Eucharist, St. Augustine tells us "BE WHAT YOU SEE; RECEIVE WHAT YOU ARE." How are you good bread for other these days?
