



Today is the 13th Sunday in Ordinary Time. The presence of evil in the world, best represented by death, has always been a source of much puzzlement. Did God create it to punish us? Today's first reading answers that question for us: God did not make death. It was never the divine will to bring corruption into the world. Rather, God's unfailing intent is life, wholesome and energizing. Our gospel will revisit this subject. In biblical times, illness was seen as directly inflicted by God, but the author of Wisdom is telling us this is not so. All of God's creation is good.....Our second reading is from Paul's 2nd Letter to the Corinthians. The reading seems confusing as Paul refers to "this gracious act," that his audience is about to do. Actually, Paul is taking up a collection for the church in Jerusalem. To inspire their generosity, he first acknowledges how they excel in other areas, even in winning his affection. He tells them that if they can excel in all of these areas, they can excel in charity also. In making his point, Paul uses a literary device called chiasmus, which reverses word order in two otherwise parallel phrases: Jesus, though he was rich (his preexistence with God), made himself poor (his earthly life and death) so that you can become rich (salvation) by his poverty (his human life and death.) Paul reminds them that God gave manna to everyone in the desert regardless of what efforts they put forth for the common good, and he tells his audience to imitate the generosity of God and no one will be wanting.....Our gospel is from Mark and is filled with brief descriptions of Jesus healing people. We first hear the familiar story of Jairus pleading that Jesus come and heal his daughter. A second outsider, a woman who has been ill works her way through the crowd and touches Jesus' clothes. Like Jairus she recognizes a need for physical touch to effect a healing. In her we see the impossible faith of one who, despite twelve years of dead ends, musters enough hope for one more try. We're told that when Jesus wants to know who touched his robe, the woman approaches "in fear and trembling," and like Jairus, falls at his feet. Suddenly the scene changes as Jairus is told that his daughter is dead, but Jesus tells him to hang on to faith. The mourners are angry that Jesus wants them out and they begin to ridicule him, but Jesus expels them and takes the girl's parents to her bedside where he restores her life. And, typically, as we can find in the gospels, after such an amazing event, Jesus tells them to "give her something to eat."....Allow me to add my voice to the myriad of voices expressing outrage over the Vatican's treatment of American Women Religious. These are the women who not only built our church but continue to sustain it. They are also women of great vision, not afraid to ask guestions that have to be explored. Whereas the institution remains in an unchanging atmosphere, oblivious of the challenges in today's world, these women seek truth and for that they are being unjustly treated......St. Patrick Parish Picnic will be held Sunday, June 29, at Shade's Beach. Mark your calendar......The festival committee has been meeting regularly and are now asking for volunteers to help us with the 3 day event (September 14, 15 & 16). The parish office will be closed Wednesday, July 4, in observance of the holiday......Mark your calendar for Saturday, October 20th, for the 175th Anniversary Banquet at the Bayfront Convention Center. It promises to be a fun-filled evening. The event will begin with a cash bar at 6 followed by a sit-down dinner at 7. Parishioners will receive an invitation in the mail in early September indicating dinner choices. Cost of the evening is \$40 per person. Two bottles of wine will also be on each table.....Mary Pat Schlaudecker, Kay Mannino and Kay Cline recently went to the Convention Center for a tasting and selected the dinner menu which was in last week's bulletin. In addition to the meal, our entertainment will include a wonderful brief video presentation of anecdotes about St. Patrick Parish that is being put together by Erin Doolin Fessler. Also a short presentation by Jeff Rouse, the Pittsburgh area artist who restored our Stations of the Cross, in which he will explain some of the detail of the Stations. And, finally, Mark Alloway and Ken Daub will lead us in a short Irish sing-along. We are also inviting the priests who were previously stationed here as well as the Sisters of St. Joseph who taught at St. Patrick's School to be our guests for the evening. ......Have you made your pledge to the St. Patrick Capital Campaign yet? We're getting very close to our goal, but less than 250 parishioners have responded to date. There are certainly a number of people in the parish who simply cannot afford a pledge to the project, and I hope none of them feel guilty. I don't expect them to make a gift, but there are a number of others who can help—in whatever way you decide—but we haven't heard from you yet. Can I please make a plea for you to return your pledge card, so that I know we have enough in pledges to be able to proceed with this project....!'ll put the timetable for the restoration in a future bulletin so you're all aware. We'll move into the Cauley August 11th and remain there until we return to church on Christmas Eve.....When we looked at the Cauley, we realized that the air conditioning has been partially dismantled and I called Erie Insurance to see if I could get someone in to reassemble it and they told me, "Our maintenance men will take care of it tomorrow." They could not be more gracious in allowing us to use the building.....A class of six year olds were asked to write letters to God. Here are some of the results: "Dear God, I went to this wedding and they kissed right in church. Is that ok? Neil. Dear God Instead of letting people die and having to make new ones, why don't you just keep the ones you got now? Jane. Dear God, In bible times, did they really talk that fancy? Dear God, I bet it is very hard for you to love all of everybody in the whole world. There are only 4 people in our family and I can never do it. Nan." And finally, "Dear God, Please put another holiday between Christmas and Easter. There is nothing good in there now. Ginny."
