



Today is the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from Deuteronomy. The Israelites have wandered in the wilderness for 40 years and soon they will cross the Jordan River into the Promised Land. But Moses will die before that happens and to-

day's reading is part of his final instruction to them emphasizing fidelity to the law.

In our second reading, we read from Paul's Letter to the Colossians. We will read from this letter for the next three weeks. The letter aims to present the correct teaching about Christ and his role in salvation. Paul was prompted to write this letter because false prophets were teaching these people that other principalities and powers played a role in salvation. Today's excerpt has been used as a liturgical text since the time of the apostles. Paul is very clear that reconciliation and salvation come only from Christ Jesus.

The opening question in today's gospel from Luke is one that people of faith often ponder. "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" The scholar is intent on learning and performing the right actions to merit heaven. When Jesus simply affirms the man's own answer, the scholar presses further, intent on justifying himself. He then asks who his neighbor is which Jesus answers with a simple parable. Jesus portrays a Samaritan, one whom law-abiding Jews would hate, as the good and caring neighbor. The point of the parable is not that we earn salvation by our compassionate actions, nor that following the Law merits eternal life; rather, the point is that if we count ourselves as members of God's Chosen People by virtue of our baptism, then we must follow the example of the Good Samaritan. His spontaneous compassion made human distinctions irrelevant. Everyone is a neighbor. Again, this is a parable found only in Luke's gospel. We do not find it in the other three gospels. It's one of those very simple stories which Jesus told but full of meaning and message. Remember that he was speaking to people who were illiterate and who lived off the land. You'll find that many of these parables are stories about the earth, crops, etc.

I continue to marvel at how well the new air conditioning system works at St. Patrick's. The bid for standard A/C in that room was \$285,000 and this product cost \$115,000. You will recall that it only air conditions up 8 feet. None of that huge space above is cooled. At the console of the pipe organ, the system has isolated an area 8' x 8' x8' and it works like a charm. By removing the old water based system which was in the church, we were also able to see—for the first time in years—two beautiful stained glass windows in the choir loft that had been covered up.

There are three additional stained glass windows behind the pipe organ which cannot be seen because of the pipes. The original design for the church calls not for those windows to be there, but where the center window is, there was to be a larger than life statue of St. Patrick. The two smaller side windows were to have been empty niches. If you also look up at the southwest tower, you can see circular wood inserts high on the tower. Those were originally intended to have been clocks which would have been visible from far and near. For some reason the clocks were never installed nor was the statue of St. Patrick.

People planning a wedding at St. Patrick's in 2014 would be wise to seek out a date as we are filling up very fast. I'm amazed at how many people want to be married here since we did the restoration. Of course, it's only the most beautiful church in the city!

A reminder that the Sunday 9 AM St. Hedwig Mass is being celebrated at St. Patrick's until the heat breaks and what a relief that is. I would finish Mass over there in the summer months and immediately have to take a shower because I was soaking wet.

We're also having a Sunday 8 AM Mass for the summer months and then we'll decide if we want to continue to keep it. There seem to be enough people attending that we might continue with it.

The Irish Festival Committee has been busy meeting and planning our September 13, 14 and 15 event. Under Cal Pifer's leadership, we are making a number of improvements to the event including ending the festival on Saturday evening and then on Sunday serving an Irish breakfast from 8:30 AM until noon. We're hoping to advertise that widely so that people from other

parishes will come for breakfast when they leave their Sunday morning Mass. The food will once again be prepared by Calamari's who have done an excellent job the past two years.

Thanks to parishioner Marilyn Lechner of Vacation Playgrounds, we once again have a tour of Ireland donated to us from CIE Tours. That saves the parish a great deal of money. All we have to do is supply the airfare for two people.

We are in the process of submitting our financial and spiritual reports to the diocese from both parishes. Once those are completed, I will publish both of them in the bulletin so that you can see how we are doing. Sacramental viability is one of the criterion for keeping a parish open. That means baptisms are keeping up with deaths and in most parishes, unfortunately, that is not the case. I'm happy to tell you that at St. Patrick's, our baptism far outshine our deaths. We have been incredibly fortunate with the numbers of young families who have joined the parish in recent years. On the other hand, there has not been a baptism at St. Hedwig's Parish in over 7 years. I think in the almost 4 years I have been here there have been two weddings there.

An elderly man lay dying in bed. Suddenly death's agony was pushed aside as he smelled the aroma of his favorite homemade chocolate chip cookies. They also need to be careful of any photos they might post. A simple picture of your daughter in a cheerleading uniform, standing in front of your house, could provide enough information for a stranger to physically locate her. Online predators have ways to innocently ask simple questions over a period of time that gives them enough information to know who children are and where they live.
