



Today is the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from Ecclesiastes. The word "Qoheleth"" is Bush Greek for "one who convokes the assembly." Today's reading is perhaps the best known line from this book, a book we hear from only once in the

entire three year cycle of readings. Unfortunately the reading is cut short and leaves us with the impression that all work is futile, but if you read further in the book, you'll discover the author saying that although we must toil during life, when we do so recognizing God's gifts of wisdom and knowledge, we will find joy in the ordinary, everyday course of life.

Our second reading is the reading that is proclaimed as the second reading every Easter. Paul is reminding his audience that they now live in Christ, they have died to earthly ways, but they continue to be drawn to them by false teachers. He provides a list of five earthly vices that his audience should avoid. He urges them to remember that in the Christian community divisions based on religion, ethnicity and social status cease to exist. All are one in Christ through our baptism.

For the next three Sundays, our gospel will come from chapter 12 of Luke, a chapter in which he shows the twofold opposition Jesus and his disciples face. First, they face a general human resistance to placing excessive importance on material possessions. Secondly, he notes religious leaders who Luke characterizes as greedy. The gospel is in two distinct sections. In the first, a man asks Jesus to use his power to tell his brother to share an inheritance. Jesus draws a boundary and says his role is not to interfere in family disputes, but rather teach family members how to mutually discern the best course of action. The criterion are simple: greed is unacceptable and life is not defined by possessions. Jesus then continues with a parable to demonstrate this. The prosperous farmer rests on his laurels and his life is demanded of him. A disciple's life is focused on belonging to God, not attachment to earthly goods. Although we have concerns about earthly and practical needs, if we focus on God, our burden will be eased.

I am in the process of moving from St. Hedwig's rectory to St. Patrick's. All of this, of course, is in line with the reconfiguration of parishes which is going to be coming soon. In the process of emptying a closet on the third floor of St. Patrick's rectory, we stumbled on a box of documents belonging to the Cauley brothers. In the box are scores of documents relating to their backing an inventor in the early 1930s. He was in the process of inventing television!!! And the Cauley brothers, smart investors that they were, backed the man financially. Also in the same closet we found boxes and boxes of old glass plate photographs that I'm hoping we can get developed. There are some fascinating pictures in the boxes, which have probably been in that closet for 50 to 75 years!

A belated congratulations to Peter and Judy Penz on their celebration of their 50th wedding anniversary.

During the month of June, the St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 20,811 pounds of food to 715 families. Total cost to the parish was \$1,003.10. Once again, your generosity and a score of volunteers make all of this possible.

With the pope's recent trip to Brazil, it is noteworthy that Brazil continues to be the country with the largest number of Catholics-123 million. But if 50 years ago 99% of the country was Catholic; today only 65% are Catholic. The number of Protestants has risen to 22%. The number of people who have no affiliation has risen sharply also, going from fewer than one million in 1970 to 15 million today. In Rio de Janeiro, where the pope visited, Catholics only number 62% of the population.

I will be on retreat this coming week at Christ the King Seminary in Buffalo.

This past week I buried ninety year old Helen Cauley Neubert, the last and final Cauley family member. Her father, Tim Cauley, was the youngest brother of Fathers Peter, Joseph, Charles and Stephen. Helen was raised on East Fourth

Street and used to tell me tales of coming to the rectory with her siblings and they would put on a Christmas or Easter play for the priests. She would also talk about the excitement they felt when they would go to Villa San Jose, the Cauley estate out on the east side of town near the present Gannondale.

If you are making a monthly payment on you pledge for the restoration, you might want to wait until Tuesday, August 13, to make your August payment. That is Erie Gives Day and we get to share in the additional \$200,000 that is prorated according to how much we raise that day.

I'm happy to tell you that with pledges of \$1,103.584, payments now total \$713,256. There is still a balance of \$400,727 remaining. We are presently paying the diocese \$10,000 + interest each month on our balance. That balance is now at \$600,000. We will use the remaining pledge payments and make a lump sum payment each year from the festival. I calculate that we should be debt free within 5 years. (and then I'm going to retire. Sister Marie says I'm not allowed to go anywhere until I pay off this debt!!!)

Work is almost complete on the new Women's Rest Room in church. We have cut a door through the 50 inch thick wall of the southwest tower so that brides, who wait in that room prior to their wedding, can have access to a restroom. We still have tile work, etc. to do and then we will be finished.

A doctor was addressing a large audience and said "The material we put into our stomachs is enough to have killed most of us sitting here, years ago. Red meat is awful; soft drinks corrode your stomach lining, Chinese food is loaded with MSG. High fat diets can be disastrous, and none of us realizes the long-term harm caused by the germs in our drinking water. However, there is one thing that is the most dangerous of all and we all have eaten or will eat it. Can anyone here tell me what food it is that causes the most grief and suffering for years after eating it?" After several seconds of quiet, a 75-year-old man in the front row raised his hand and softly said, "Wedding Cake!"
