



Today is the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from the Book of Exodus. Even though God has freed them from the Egyptians, the people are still grumbling—at least we had full stomachs before we began this journey they whine. They long for the fleshpots or metal cauldrons in which wealthy Egyptians cooked meat. No longer their hero, Moses is indicted for leading them out into the desert. Almost as amazing as their whining is God's indulgence on them. Without a word from Moses, God promises to rain bread from heaven for them.....Our second reading continues from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians in which he reminds us that we experience new life in Christ and even though we only experience a foretaste of it, it is enough to change us. Unfortunately this reading eliminates two verses which speak of the hardness of heart of those who have not heard the word of God, but he tells his audience, to abandon such corruption and and put on the new self.....Our Gospels for the next few weeks will come from John rather than Mark and we will hear for three weeks what are called Bread of Life passages. Scandalized by what sounds like blasphemy or lunacy, many disciples will abandon Jesus because of this discourse which takes place almost immediately after the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. In John's gospel, signs are meant to signify conversion; but this crowd can't see beyond the sign of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes. They see Jesus as a wonder worker. When he asks them to seek food for the soul for eternal life, they ask him to show them how to acquire it. Jesus' simple answer, "Believe in me," generates their response, "What will you do to MAKE us believe?" They are simply looking for another miracle and even suggest that he make something like manna in the desert. And now Jesus starts with some hardcore teaching—it was God, not Moses, who fed them in the desert and he equates himself with the bread that comes down from heaven. They simply can't understand all that he is trying to tell them......Today we begin our rather historical move with the restoration of St. Patrick's Church. All weekend Masses will now be held in the Cauley Auditorium. There is ample parking and the Cauley is air-conditioned. It's not going to be the greatest comfort, but it's going to help us appreciate the restored St. Patrick's when we do move back in on Christmas Eve...... Weekday Masses are held in the rectory chapel. You can enter through the back door of the rectory, go up the stairs to the second floor or go to the front hall and take the elevator up......Bear with us as we get used to this change of venue......If you are planning a wedding at St. Patrick's for 2013 I urge you to get your date reserved as soon as possible. The dates are really filling up fast and once people see the restored church, there is going to be even greater demand......During the month of June, the St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed over 19,180 pounds of food to 728 families. Those figures continue to boggle my mind each month. The cost for the month of June to the parish was \$1,078.03. Starting with your next packet of envelopes, you will find an additional envelope for a donation to the Food Pantry. Perhaps you can do it as a memorial to a deceased person or in memory of someone from your own family. Those will be listed in the weekly bulletin. Trust me, a donation to the neediest never goes unrecognized by our God......Mark your calendars for September 14, 15 & 16 for our Erie Irish Festival and even more than that why not call the parish office and volunteer to help. We desperately need you......I have often cited studies showing declines of religion in different parts of the world, and there is now a new report out on the state of the Catholic Church in Poland which shows rather dramatic declines in recent years. In 1992, 64% of young Polish Catholics said they go to Mass on Sundays; today 44%. The number who pay attention to the church's teachings on sexuality is absolutely miniscule. Illegal abortions in Poland are in the hundreds of thousands a year.....I'm thrilled to tell you that we have now gone \$3,000 over our \$1 million goal for the restoration of St. Patrick's. That is incredible generosity on the part of a great number of you, and now our dream can be realized. I'm hoping that more pledges continue to come in because we will certainly have cost over runs with the project......St. Patrick parishioner and architect Chip Wachter and I recently spent a day with Lynn Howard, the lighting consultant from Milwaukee who has designed the new lighting system for the church. I must tell you that the new lighting is as exciting as the new painting will be. It's amazing how brilliantly the room can be lit and how evenly the lighting is spread. There is particularly amazing new lighting for the altars and the Stations of the Cross which will highlight them like they have never been before.....In the vestibule there are three large light fixtures from the former St. Joseph Orphanage chapel. Two additional ones are in the tower rooms. Inside the church, under the choir loft balcony are three smaller light fixtures from the same chapel. We are bring the 5 from the vestibule and tower rooms in and putting them under the balcony to give much more light and putting the three smaller ones in the vestibule. The larger

ones in the vestibule and tower rooms also match the sanctuary lamp.....As I anticipated, we also find that we have to redo a great deal of the wiring in the attic of the church. It was last put in during the 1920s and is very inadequate and also a fire hazard......The new lighting system also has the option for dimming the lights for various reasons, something which we do not have today.....I hope you're planning on joining us for the upcoming Irish Festival Sept. 14, 15 & 16 and also joining us for the 17th Anniversary Banquet on Oct. 20 at the Convention Center. Those invitations will be mailed Sept. 3.....A priest waited in line to have his car filled with gas before a long holiday weekend. The attendant worked quickly but there were a number of cars ahead of him. Finally the attendant got to the priest and apologized, "I'm sorry about the delay. It seems as if everyone waits until the last minute to get ready for a long trip." The priest smiled and replied, "I know what you mean; it's the same in my business.".....A first grade teacher asked her class, "Name one important thing we have today that we didn't have 10 years ago to which one child promptly answered, "Me!"....An ad actually found in a British newspaper read "Wedding dress for sale. Worn once by mistake. Call Stephanie."....A sign on the First Cumberland Presbyterian Church: "Don't gripe about your church. If it was perfect you couldn't be in it!!"
