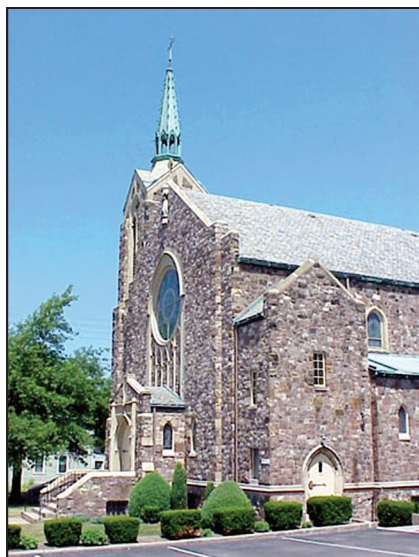

Today is the 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from the Book of Wisdom, and it is the last six verses of Solomon's prayer for divine Wisdom, characterized as a female. In the earlier part of the prayer, Solomon prays for the wisdom to serve as king and today he is asking for the wisdom to judge wisely. He reflects on our inability to know God's wisdom unless God grants it to us. Once we receive it, we will have the knowledge to know what God wants of us in life.

Our second reading comes from Paul's letter to Philomen, the only time in our three year cycle of readings that we read from this letter. It was addressed to three individuals: Philomen, a co-worker with Paul and Timothy; Apphia, whom Paul refers to as our sister and was most likely Philomen's wife; and Archippus, whom scholars believe to be their son. The slave, Onesimus, ran away from his master and found refuge with Paul in prison where he comes to believe in Christ. Paul is writing to Onesimus' master asking that he welcome him back as one would a fellow Christian. Paul does not ask directly that Philomen free him, but that he is a partner with him in the love of Christ. Inequality in the social order ceases to exist in Christ; we are equal partners in proclaiming the gospel.

God freely chooses disciples which today's gospel affirms. Jesus is trying to deter those who want to be a celebrity "groupy," because being a disciple involved accepting a different way of life. There is a difference between following Jesus because everyone else is doing it and truly following him. A good teacher often uses hyperbole to make a point, and Jesus does that today. Hate stands in contrast to love. Jesus is not asking people to turn against family, but is using the hyperbole to say that renouncing one's former way of life is the cross the disciples carry. The two brief parables illustrate that loyalty to Jesus cannot be half-hearted. If we become true disciples, then perhaps we will imitate Solomon in the first reading today and pray for wisdom. Remember that in our liturgy, the first reading and the gospel are always somehow connected.

Next weekend is, of course, our big Irish Festival, the largest fund-raising project of our year. The monies raised will be used both for the debt on

our restoration and to provide the funding for the St. Patrick's Food Pantry, the largest food distribution center in the city of Erie. Next Sunday morning at Rainbow Gardens will be a bit different this year with a full Irish Breakfast being served from 8:30 AM until 12:30 PM. Cost is \$9 per person; \$6 for children under 12 and children under 5 are admitted free. I hope you'll support the parish by attending the festival and joining in all of the fun. I'm especially grateful to Cal Pifer for his outstanding leadership in coordinating and running the festival.

Just a few weekends ago, Cal also hosted a "Field to Table" supper at the Battles Mansion in Girard. Three hundred and fifty people enjoyed an open bar and sit down dinner prepared from all fresh product from neighboring farms. I must tell you it was a nite to remember. The event was sponsored by the Erie County Historical Society.

Speaking of the Historical Society, they are sponsoring a walking tour of our neighborhood on Thursday, September 26, from 6-9 PM. Included in the tour will be St. Patrick's Church; the first floor of the rectory; the Tibbles House on East 5th Street which Erie Insurance magnificently restored; the two mansions on Parade Street which they also just recently restored and some other residences. Tickets are limited and can be obtained by contacting the Historical Society at 454-1813.

The process for future planning for the Diocese of Erie, including the eventual reconfiguration of parishes, has begun. A priest from the Diocese of Greensburg is leading the project, and he spoke with the bishop, the Vicars and the Deans for an entire day-long meeting recently. A steering committee of five priests has been identified and now the general committee for the process is being formed with those people already chosen. The next step will be for each pastor to identify one person from his finance council and one person from his parish council who will be the "go to it" people for parishioners. In other words, if someone has concerns, anxieties, questions, etc. they can give them to those delegates. All of the representatives from all of the east side parishes will then meet and try to coordinate the concerns, etc. and come up with a working document. Then we will conduct a demographic study of the entire

East side and the study will get underway. It will gather data on how many Catholics live in the area, what percentage of those Catholics belong to a parish and/or go to Mass regularly? Do baptisms come close to matching deaths in the parish? Is the parish church at least 50% full for every weekend Mass? What is the condition of the buildings, etc? Once that data is gathered in both the east side and west side deaneries, the committee will then come together, study all of the data, look at our resources (priest personnel, parishioners, finances, property and buildings) and try to make some projections for the future. How can we maintain the number of parishes we have with a sharply declining number of priests? Should women religious or lay people be appointed administrators of parishes and merely have the priest available for sacramental purposes? Do we have to merge or even close some of our parishes so that we can better utilize our resources?

As you can see there is a great deal of work which lies ahead, and it's going to take some very concentrated efforts on the part of those who will study the data and then make final recommendations to Bishop Persico. We are beginning the process in the city of Erie, and once that is complete the process will move to other areas of the diocese. It is the bishop's hope that we can complete the study of the city of Erie by spring and he can announce what future plans are for the city and what, if any, reconfiguration of parishes will take place.

Also to be studied is the future of our Catholic schools. Both birth and baptismal rates have dropped dramatically in Erie County. Our baptisms are down 40% from 2000. Who, then, will be sitting in our schools in ten years? We're living at a strange moment in the history of the church.

An old Texas cowboy counseled his granddaughter that if she wanted to live a long life, the secret was to sprinkle a pinch of gun powder on her oatmeal every morning. The granddaughter did this religiously until the age of 103 when she died. She left behind 14 children, 30 grandchildren, 45 great grandchildren, 25 great-great grandchildren and a 40 foot hole where the crematorium used to be.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

I join my brother bishops across the United States in asking that September 8 be set aside to consider the importance of fair and compassionate immigration reform.

Immigration reform is complex. Americans have a right to secure borders, especially in an era of anti-American violence. We have a right to exclude criminals from our country, to protect the financial health of our public institutions, and to expect foreign visitors and guest workers to comply with our laws.

Most undocumented immigrants never commit a violent act and want only to contribute to American prosperity. Our farms and businesses rely on their services. Today's immigrants seek the same opportunities our parents, grandparents, and great grandparents sought when they came to America.

Congress will likely take up the issue of immigration reform early this fall. The United States bishops have identified five key legislative elements for reform that make good economic, political, and human sense. We support immigration reform that:

- provides a path to citizenship for undocumented persons in the country;
- preserves family unity as a cornerstone of our national immigration system;
- provides legal paths for low-skilled immigrant workers to come and work in the United States;
- restores due process protections to our immigration enforcement policies;
- and addresses the root causes of migration such as persecution and poverty.

Immigrants are an important part of our communities in northwest Pennsylvania. Migrant workers play a key role on many of the farms in our diocese. The Catholic Church has always provided spiritual, educational, health, and social services to immigrants because we believe that all children of God deserve the same rights and freedoms we enjoy. Hundreds of refugees, who receive permission to come to the United States as a result of persecution in their homeland, are settled in the Erie area each year, many with the help of Catholic Charities of the Diocese of Erie.

I invite you to become more familiar with this issue and to pray for immigrant families as well as our elected officials. The bishops of Pennsylvania are releasing a statement today as part of the September 8th awareness effort. You will find it on our diocesan website at www.ErieRCD.org.

In addition, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops has created an e-postcard which can be directed to your legislators based on your zip code. I urge you to visit www.justiceforimmigrants.org/index.shtml in order to make your voice heard. You will also find links to many helpful documents and interesting videos on this vital topic.

Thank you for your prayers and action on behalf of immigration reform.
