



Today is the 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from Isaiah, Israel's greatest prophet. His prose and poetry are unmatched in the scriptures and today's reading is no exception. It is a message of hope and a promise that our God will care for us. Lis-

ten carefully as it is proclaimed ...Our second reading continues from the Letter of James and today he asks us to go against our natural instincts. When someone important enters a room, all eyes and attention are riveted on that person. James is saying that all people are worthy of royal treatment, not just important people. More than any other NT letter, James' writes almost as if Jesus were speaking, in earthy tones, with clear examples for his audience.

Our gospel continues from Mark and we hear the familiar story of healing which takes place today in Gentile territory, and Jesus treats the Gentiles just as he does the Israelites. God's promise is for all people. You'll notice that Jesus takes the man off away from the crowd before he performs the miracle. Today's miracle is not for the crowd, it is to manifest God's love for this man, and he does it in a very physical way, through intimacy and touch, sound and spoken word.

A sample of the new sanctuary flooring arrived this past week, and it is absolutely beautiful. It is a highly polished white Cararra marble which is almost identical to what was there when the church was built in 1903. Unfortunately, as you know, the carpet was glued to the marble (which is highly porous) and it has been destroyed. We are also inlaying a section of deep green tile under the altar and as an edging across the entire front of the sanctuary. The edge of each of the steps will be a one inch strip of green tile to help identify the edge of the steps.

The 10 artists from Conrad Schmitt Studio in Milwaukee will arrive on Monday and begin their work on Tuesday. They are going to work 6 days a week so that they can keep on the schedule to get us back into the church on Christmas Eve. Once they finish their work in mid-November, it will take Safway at least two weeks to dismantle the scaffolding so that we can proceed with the next stage of the work. You will be able to go to our webpage to keep up with what they are doing. While Barb Fischer will provide us with video each week, photographer John Baker is going to take photographs to document the entire process so that the parish will have these records for the future. We will also put his photos on the webpage so that you can see the artists at work. You can already find video on the webpage of what the church looks like at the present time. It's amazing to see all of that scaffolding in there.

A recent study, the General Social Survey, reveals some rather troubling trends about religious practice among American women. Women have traditionally been more likely to join churches, practice faith, adopt a religion, etc. than are men. By the mid-1990s, however, surveys began to reveal that, while older Catholic women were more religious than men of their age, the Catholic women born between 1962-1980 barely equaled their male counterparts in regular Mass attendance and were significantly more likely than men to profess heterodox opinions on women's ordination, the sinfulness of homosexual acts and premarital sex and on whether one could be a good Catholic without going to Mass. More recent data from 2002-2008 indicates that the trend continues among women born between 1981 and 1995. Both genders are much less devout and much less orthodox than their elders, but the decline has been steeper among women. Millennial Catholic women are slightly more likely than Catholic men their age to say that they never attend Mass. This is the first generation of American Catholic women for whom this is so. None of the millennial Catholic women in the survey expressed complete confidence in churches and religious organizations.

Data on those entering religious life and priesthood reveals the same disturbing trend. In the early 20th century, four times as many women entered religious life and did men. Currently, the proportions are nearly equal of in reverse: 1,396 men were in initial formation in religious institutes in 2009, compared with 1,206 women. A study in Philadelphia for example showed 173 men preparing to be priests, brothers or deacons, but only 30 women preparing to be sisters. More than one third of the women entering religious life today are over the age of 40, whereas fewer than a quarter of the men are that old.

A similar decline has occurred among Protestant women. All of this occurs while the study shows that these women consider themselves "very spiritual" persons. The danger is that Catholic millennial women who remain interested in spirituality and religious practice will seek an outlet for this interest outside the church in which they grew up......There are a variety of conclusions to the survey, but the last one states: The church could do nothing but notes that the consequences of this alternative would be fewer young women and likely fewer of their children remaining in the Catholic church. If that were to happen, practicing Catholics in North America and Europe would run the danger of dwindling to a small and eccentric fringe group, stereotyped in the popular imagination as quaint, irrelevant, self-limited and oppressive.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

The Catholic Education Collection will take place Sept. 15 & 16. The funds raised in this collection assist with the costs of Catholic education in the diocese, but an important factor is that half of the money raised remains in the parish to help us in covering the costs of Religious Education. This is the 22nd year that the diocese has sponsored this collection.

You'll notice a different format and type size for my weekly column. This comes from suggestions from many of you that the other was difficult to read. Let me know if this helps.

During the month of July, the St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 23,228 pounds of food at a cost of \$1,070.20 to the parish. That distribution went to 889 families. Your monthly packet now includes an envelope for the Food Pantry as an opportunity to make a gift in memory of someone, etc.

Next weekend is our annual Irish Festival and I hope you're in the mood to party. The committee has been hard at work for months and everything is looking really good, but we need YOU to help and to attend.

When we contracted to restore the church with the Conrad Schmitt Studio and we did not contract to paint the vestibule or the Gift Shop. The idea of the committee is that we might be able to get volunteers to do this. The gift shop is now being painted and once the scaffolding comes down we will do the vestibule.
