



Today is the Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross. Often depicted as coiled around a cross-shaped rod, the Best seraph serpent of Moses is viewed as a type of the Cross of Jesus. Clearly, this is the reason this text is chosen for today's first reading. Though deliv-

ered from Egyptian slavery through wonderful manifestations of God's power and protection, years of wandering in the desert have wearied the people and eroded their faith. So once again they complain against God and Moses. They wonder aloud why they left the comforts of Eqypt for a pipedream of freedom in a foreign land, and they accuse Moses of leading them to their death. The Lord punishes them and coming to their senses, the people repent and plead for mercy. God graciously responds and orders Moses to construct the bronze serpent promising that it will be a source of healing

Our second reading from the Letter to the Philippians is proclaimed every year on Palm Sunday. Its theological significance is great because it traces the trajectory of Christ's eternal existence from before the incarnation when he enjoyed equality with God; through his incarnation when he willingly surrendered that status to become human in all things but sin and accepted even death of a cross. It is a very early Christian hymn that predated Paul and was probably composed by the apostles to explain the lofty theology of Christ's pre-existence, his humility and willingness to be subjected to all of the consequences of sin. The first half of the hymn (up to "death on a cross") refers exclusively to Christ, telling us who he is. God is the subject of the second half and there we learn what God has done for Christ.

In this brief exchange with Nicodemus, Jesus has expounded a profound truth in the statement that to enter the Kingdom of God one has to be reborn of water and the Spirit. The dialogue with Nicodemus, a Pharisee and member of the Sanhedrin, serves Jesus' purpose to contrast human stubbornness with God's overwhelming generosity. Though Nicodemus could not possibly understand the reference to the Son of Man needing to be lifted up in order to become the source of eternal life, he is certainly aware that the serpent "lifted up" in the desert by Moses became a source of divine healing. The final part of the exchange focuses on the divine motive for the

incarnation: extravagant love. God did not become human for the purpose of judgment and condemnation (though we can condemn ourselves when we refuse his love), but God sent his Son for only one reason: "that the world might be saved through him."

Well, we're finally at the big week. Our festival opens on Friday evening with bagpipers coming from Perry Square, down State Street and over East Fourth St. to the church. We're open Friday night from 5 -10 PM and Saturday from noon until 10 PM. Sunday morning we will serve a full Irish breakfast in the Social Center at the Church of the Nativity.

Following their Sunday morning services which should end around 10:30, the Church of the Nativity will be open for the public to tour it. If you have never been in it, please take advantage of this opportunity. It is an incredible building. The art work inside is amazing.

Pray for good weather this week, though that has not been the case much of this summer. Remember that even if it rains, everything is tented and the Festival will go on rain or shine. Erie Insurance has bent over backwards to help us by supplying extra security as well as giving us the use of their parking lots for the weekend.

And to practical matters, there will be 8 port-apotties on the sidewalk in front of the rectory.

I hope you'll take the time to attend the festival as a ton of work has gone into the preparation. If it were not for the leadership of Angie Kontur this year, none of this would have come to reality. She and Cal Pifer have put in endless hours and I think you're going to be impressed with the outcome.

St. Patrick's Church will be open Friday from 5-8 PM, and Saturday from 4-8 PM for people to tour the building. We have volunteers who will be in the building to oversee and answer any guestions. Alice Daub has been gracious enough to have the Gift Shop open during those hours.

seating area. We have also secured bleachers which will be on the sidewalk in front of the church for people to listen to the music. The music will stop during the Saturday 5 PM Mass and resume immediately after.

It has been nice the past several weeks to see a significant number of Gannon University students attending Mass at St. Patrick's. I hope they know how much we welcome them and I hope that if you know a college age student attending Mass you would go out of your way to welcome them.

We're continuing some extensive work on the exterior of St. Patrick's Rectory. We have cleaned and painted all of the eaves (and they tell me they have not been touched since Fr. Plunkett left in 1974). We have painted all of the exterior trim and done an enormous amount of caulking between the bricks, much of which had been almost completely gone. Some of the windows were in bad condition and we've replaced all of the caulking on the third floor and are also working on the second floor. The first floor was done earlier. By doing this ongoing maintenance, I think we can avoid falling into any major disrepairs with these hundred year old buildings. We have more sidewalk to be replaced in front of the rectory before winter and then next spring we will do another section of it and keep at it until it is all replaced.

The small shrine area east of the church has been nicely restored.

With pledges of \$82,000 for our Catholic Services Appeal, we currently have payments of \$68,347. I owe the diocese \$44,000 on our assessment and the balance I can put toward the debt on the restoration.
