





Today is the 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from the Book of Exodus. The Israelites have grown Desk impatient with God. It seems to them that Moses is spending an inordinate amount of time on Mount Sinai, re-

ceiving the commandments. They then call on Aaron to make a new god for them. Aaron was not the strongest of leaders and he implemented a plan to fulfill their wish. All members would donate their gold earrings which were melted to fashion a molten calf which the people would worship. Aaron even built an altar in front of the statue for people to offer sacrifice after which they would feast. Our reading today begins with God telling Moses to go back to his people and to remind them that they have violated the basic commandment by worshipping another God. The Lord is consumed with anger but he will not harm Moses. But Moses stands up for the people and reminds God that their freedom from slavery in Egypt came not from Moses but from the Lord and he reminds the Lord of his promise. The Lord then relents, not the only time that he forgives the Israelites for their sins.

Our second reading comes from Paul's Letter to Timothy, and we will read from this letter for the next seven Sundays. These two letters to Timothy and the one to Titus are called pastoral letters because they address practical aspects of the early church. They were not written by Paul himself but by one of his disciples. Today's reading is addressed to church leaders and recounts Paul's own conversion from being a false teacher to his ministry as an apostle. The author reminds us that neither right thinking nor right action will merit salvation but only the Lord's grace which is freely given. The author reminds us that if God saved the great sinner Paul, he will certainly save us.

Our gospel is from Luke today in which he once again reminds us that Jesus welcomes the sinner and dines with them. The parable of importance today is the Parable of the Prodigal Son, one of the most powerful stories in all of the scriptures. The son has insulted his father. squandered his fortune and comes meekly back to beg forgiveness; but he is never given the chance. The minute the father sees him coming from afar, he forgives the son and calls for a great celebration. It's an incredible reminder to

one of us that we can be forgiven anything wrong we do, provided we recognize the wrong. An often forgotten section of this parable is the older son who assumes a self-righteous stance and refuses to welcome and forgive his brother. Quite frankly, we're seeing some of this in the church today as the very right wing of the church is very loudly condemning Pope Francis because he's not talking endlessly about same sex marriage. birth control and abortion. One prominent American archbishop said recently, "We will not tolerate a pope who does not address these issues." What a stance of self-righteousness, rather than rejoicing in the mercy and healing which this new pope embraces.

Throughout the Diocese of Erie this weekend, we have the annual Catholic education collection. One half of the funds raised in this appeal remain in the parish to help with our costs of religious ed and the other half is invested by the diocese to grant scholarships to students.

This weekend is our Irish Festival. It is the largest fundraising event of the year for St. Patrick's Parish, and I hope you will help support it. The monies raised will help eliminate our debt and also help finance the St. Patrick Food Pantry.

Sunday morning we will host a full Irish breakfast from 8:30 until 12:30. Cost is \$9 per person, \$6 for children under 12 and children under 5 are admitted free. It promises to be the concluding part of a fun weekend, and I hope you'll consider joining us.

The new Finance Council for St. Hedwig's parish consists of Jim Gorski, Peter Pentz, Nancy Widomski and Paul Siegel. I'm grateful for their giving time and talent to help me with the finances at the parish.

We have just completed some work on the tall chimney behind St. Patrick's church. Northwest Restoration discovered that many of the bricks at the very top were loose. We initially thought of lowering the chimney, but the cost is prohibitive and so we had the area pointed and repaired. The chimney is still a functioning chimney, it's just that we don't need it that high, but I guess that is the way it's going to remain.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

I had planned to use the majority of the profit from the Irish Festival to put toward our debt, but I'm going to hold off a bit until Northwest Restoration finishes the exterior work on the church. Both the east and west gable roofs had to be replaced. I was honestly shocked when I saw the condition of some of the tiles that came down in the bucket. They were so badly broken that I don't know how they ever kept water out of the building. Hopefully, they will finish their work soon and then I will know how much I can put toward the debt. We have already paid Northwest over \$40,000 for work they've done this summer. As you know, none of this was anticipated. We spent over \$120,000 pointing the exterior of the church prior to the restoration as well as carefully checking the roof. I thought we were done; but old buildings have a mind of their own.

Northwest Restoration tells me that the west wall of St. Patrick's Church will need to be pointed at least every 12 to 15 years because of the weather that it is exposed to. The same thing is true on the west wall at St. Hedwig's. We pointed that a few years ago and it will need it again. Unfortunately very expensive wooden doors were put on the main entrance (the west wall) and they are not designed for our weather. As such, they have to be stripped down, sanded and refinished every year. It takes the maintenance man a full week of work to do this each year. They should never have been installed. We are not going to strip them and repair them this year. We cannot put money into the buildings there until the report on the future of parishes is complete next spring.

Don't forget the Irish Festival this weekend. It's going to be a great event and Sunday morning's breakfast at \$9 for adults, \$6 for children under 12 and children under 5 free is the biggest bargain of the year. It will be a full Irish breakfast.

I was visiting my daughter last week when I asked if could borrow a newspaper. "This is the 21st century," she said, "We don't waste money on newspapers. Here, use my IPad." I can tell you this, that fly never knew what hit him.

A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: Exodus 32:7-15

Reading II: 1 Timothy 1:12-17

Gospel: Luke 15:1-32



The story of the prodigal son is quite possibly Jesus' best known parable. It challenges us all, whether as a forgiver, someone forgiven, or as one who feels wronged. There is in most of us a bit of each of these three: repentant prodigal, loving parent, resentful sibling. We can learn from this parable first, that love can be squandered, spread generously, or stored away for some other time. The choice is ours; second, that God's love, extended to everyone, forgives equally, and welcomes all of us back home; and third, forgiveness leads to gratitude and rejoicing.
