



Today is the 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading is again from Isaiah. Today's reading is always also proclaimed on Palm Sunday to identify Jesus as the focus of the reading. Jesus is the Suffering Servant of whom Isaiah speaks. It is proclaimed today because of its strong connection to the gospel where Jesus speaks of the necessity of suffering with clear implications about its redemptive power. Isaiah also reminds us that we never suffer alone, for God is always with us in the midst of our trials.

Our second reading continues from James, the letter which is at the heart of debates between those who argue that faith alone is sufficient for salvation and those who say faith without works is lifeless. James makes it clear that faith calls us to certain behavior. We can get into some very heavy theological arguments about James' approach to faith and works and Paul's approach that salvation is by faith alone; but I had to do all of that in the seminary and once in life is enough!

Mark's gospel today notes that progress and backsliding mark the spiritual life. We never stand still, we either move forward or we slip backwards. Peter's answer today that Jesus is the Christ is central because Christianity is a commitment to a person who is the Son of God. The commandments, the beatitudes, etc. are merely our way of living out our conviction that Jesus is who we say he is.

This is our annual Erie Irish Festival weekend, and things are hopping. I hope you'll take some time to come out to Rainbow Gardens and support our venture. A lot of people have put a lot of hard work and time and talent into making this weekend a success. The revenue from the weekend will help with our restoration project at St. Patrick's.....Our grand prize again this year is a trip to Ireland for two. The trip, donated by CIE Tours, includes airfare from either Cleveland, Buffalo or Pittsburgh, a rental car in Ireland and 6 nights lodging in charming B & Bs. There are so many people to thank for the success of this year's festival that I can't begin to name them. It is really a project where hundreds of people come together to give talent and time. I'm especially grateful to our chairman this year, Cal Pifer, for his leadership. Cal joined the parish about 2 years ago, is an example of so many of the young professionals who have joined, and it's great that they are willing to share their time and their leadership skills to help the parish as they do. Another new volunteer this year who has done an outstanding job is Dennis Michalski. Dennis took over the chairing of the program and has spent endless hours working on it getting ads, totally reconfiguring it from previous years and reducing the costs. Marilyn Lechner of Vacation Playgrounds convinced CIE Tours to donate this year's 6 night Ireland trip for 2 at a great cost savings to the parish. When the winner decides when to travel, we will pick up the cost of the air, but the entire ground package is covered.....

Most of the pipes from the pipe organ have been removed to make room for scaffolding, and several have been taken to the Tellers Organ Company for restoration and repair.

The full 10 man Conrad Schmitt crew arrived early this past week and have been hard at work in the church. They plan to work 6 day weeks so that they can complete the plaster repair, painting, gilding, etc. by November 19th. Once they finish, it will take Safway another two weeks to dismantle the scaffolding so that we can move on to the next phase: reinstalling the renewed pews, carpeting and the sanctuary floor.

Once again, Barb Fischer is going to videotape their work and put up on the web page so that you can follow the progress. It's rather difficult to see the work because the entire building is full of scaffolding, but it's amazing the artistry with which these artists work. It seems like it's all natural to them.

We decided early on not to have the vestibule restored, but instead to paint it by ourselves. We decided the same thing with the gift shop while we also decided to leave the southwest tower room as it is so that people can see the condition the building was in when we began.

The plaster in the Gift Shop has been restored, it has been painted and new lighting installed. We will probably have to wait until we are all finished before we can do the vestibule.

A new Pew study released last week shows that the number of people who check "none" for religious affiliation in America are now nearly one in five Americans (10&). The rapid rise of "nones" includes atheists, agnostics and those who say they believe "nothing in particular" and according to the report defies the usually glacial rate of change in spiritual identity. One of the conclusions of the report is that young people are resistant to the authority of institutional religion, older people are turned off by the politicization of religion and people are simply less into theology than ever before. The study is based on interviews with 19,377 people......The first study of this kind was done in 1990 when 6% of American's identified themselves as "nones." The study also shows that the Catholic Church, the nation's largest denomination, the Southern Baptist Convention, Methodists and Lutherans all show membership flat or inching downward. And, finally, the study reports that two factors could hold the number of "nones' down. First, they are disproportionately young, often single and highly educated—all groups with a low birth rate. Second, the number of believers who immigrate to the U..S. from particularly religious nations, such as Mexico, fluctuates with government policies and economic issues.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

I hope you can get to the Festival this weekend at Rainbow Gardens. A good time will be had by all. Once again our food is being prepared by Calamaris, and a score of parish volunteers are giving their time and talent to make this a success. The Ave Society has been working hard making a score of baskets to be raffled off. The rectory has been a beehive of activity with different people and groups working to make this year's event another smashing success. I think you're going to be pleasantly surprised when you see this year's program. It is very, very different from those of the past, and I think, very exciting and refreshing. Our grand raffle of a trip for two to Ireland promises to give the lucky winner a trip of a lifetime. And Erie Beer is this year building us an Irish Pub as the spot to dispense beer and other drinks. The funds from this year's festival will be used toward the restoration of the church. Please come and join us.

I had hoped we would have enough money to redo the church restrooms, but I don't think we're going to because of cost overruns with electricity, etc. Perhaps we could make it a goal of next year's festival to use those funds to begin doing that project. I particularly want to get the Women's Room redone as soon as we have the funds.

How our world has changed in the last 100 years. One hundred years ago, the average U.S. worker made between \$200 and \$400 per year. More than 95% of all births took place at home. Ninety percent of doctors had no college education!! Instead they attended socalled medical schools, many of which were condemned by the government as substandard. Sugar cost four cents a pound, eggs were fourteen cents a pound and coffee was fifteen cents a pound. Most women washed their hair once a month and used Borax or egg yolks for shampoo. The population of Las Vegas was 30 people and marijuana, heroin and morphine were all available over the counter at the local corner drugstore. Back then pharmacists said, "Heroin clears the complexion, gives buoyancy to the mind, regulates the stomach and bowels and is a perfect guardian of health!!!" And, finally, in 1912, there were a total of 230 murders in the entire United States for the entire year.
