From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Twenty-fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time and we read from the Book of Wisdom. Today's passage shares much in common with the Suffering Servant in Isaiah whom we read about last week. Here we see a figure called the "just one." This motif developed later in 333 BC when Judea fell under Greek rule. First they imposed Greek culture and language on the people and ultimately Greek religious beliefs. Many of the people gave up their faith; and those who did not faced execution. This time period also gives birth to belief in an afterlife among some Jews. And it is in this time of upheaval that the just one appears. He is portraved as a faithful, obedient person who does God's will, suffers ridicule, even torture and death and because of it is rewarded by God. In Wisdom, written about a half century before Christ, the just one's reward includes resurrection and immortality. The early church would soon identify Jesus as this just one.

Next we hear James consider his exhortation with a turn toward internal causes of unethical behavior. Earlier, the author points to unacceptable behavior among members of the church including discrimination and discord. Here the author follows Jesus as he points out the interior dispositions that underlie such ethical lapses. He reminds readers of their Jewish tradition, wisdom embodied in Christ. Inner attitudes of peace, gentleness and mercy as well as dependence upon God will counteract the selfish desires that lead to actions unacceptable to those following Christ.

Last Sunday we heard of Jesus's three predictions of this death and the second appears today in the Transfiguration story, followed by a lengthy exorcism story. The disciples are still focused on Jesus as wonder worker. As often seen in Mark.

the disciples fail to connect Jesus the Messiah with suffering and death. Jesus again speaks clearly that he will be put to death. Jesus's reference to resurrection was inserted after the fact. Mark portrays the disciples in a very negative way as unable to grasp what Jesus is really about.

This is the big weekend for our Irish Festival. I know it's a bit hectic coming to Mass here this weekend, but it's wonderful to see all of these people enjoying the festival. You would be amazed at how many people stop to see the church and are blown away by it. Most of them had no idea there was such a beautiful church in Erie.

Can I particularly encourage parishioners to purchase raffle tickets on the trip to Ireland. Last year we had a very small proportion of the parish purchase tickets, and I'm hoping we can improve that this year.

Special thanks to Dennis Michalski and Gretchen Durney for all of their hard work in putting together the program for this year's festival. Since Dennis took over the leadership of that program a few years ago, it has become the largest source of revenue from the festival.

And, a more than special thanks to Angie Kontur for her leadership in organizing this year's festival. She has not only done an incredible job, but she is fun to work with. Assisting her this year are Gary and Becky Johnson who will chair the festival next year. By doing this rotation each year, no one person gets burdened with the festival for years and years as was the case with Mark Shaw who chaired it for 12 years and was burned out from it. That's not fair. If anyone is interested in taking on this role, please contact me. There are confessional discounts, indulgences, anything you can imagine for whomever is brave enough to take on this role!!

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

A special thanks for help with our festival goes to Erie Insurance, the finest neighbor that anyone could ever have. They assist us with the security for the festival as well as allow us the use of their parking lots. It's because of this available parking that we are able to move the festival to the church grounds. Otherwise we would not be able to accommodate all of these crowds.

If you think the preparation and workings of our Irish Festival are complicated, think of this for a second. In preparing the food for their annual festival, the people at Holy Trinity Parish used 15,000 heads of cabbage!

The Pastoral Planning process should begin to wind down with phase one looking at the city of Erie. The committee will make its recommendations to Bishop Persico before the end of this month. He will then begin to discuss those suggestions with various consultative bodies in the diocese such as the Presbyteral Council of priests, the Diocesan Finance Council, etc. He is meeting with all we priests October 27 to unveil the plan for schools. The plan for parish restructuring will follow rather quickly after the schools are announced. Once that is done, the process will begin all over for other areas of the diocese. We simply have to restructure ourselves. Take, for example, Oil City which in the 1950s had 5 parishes for 30,000 people. Oil City today still has 5 parishes for 9,000 people. We have a multitude of places that repeat that such as Meadville, Sharon-Farrell, DuBois, St. Marys, etc.

St. Patrick's is now booked for a wedding every Saturday between Easter and Thanksgiving. This will be the largest number of weddings here in the six years I've been here.

After a very long and boring homily, the parishioners filed out church, all of them saying nothing to the pastor. Towards the end of the line was a person who always commented on the homilies. "Father, your homily today reminded me of the peace and love of God." The pastor was thrilled. "No one has ever said anything like that to me. Why did it remind you of that?" "Well, it reminded me of the peace of God because it surpassed all understanding, and of the love of God because it endured forever."
