



Today is the 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading comes from the Old Testament Book of Wisdom. The first chapter of this book reminds its readers that God is not responsible for the evil in the world, evildoers are. Rather than seeking justice, the wicked seek only their own gratification. Today we hear from chapter two which does more than place responsibility for evil squarely on the sounders of selfish humanity. It presents sinister plotting that often has been seen as a direct prophecy of the scheming that led to the Passion of Christ. Clearly, the liturgy makes a connection between the plots of the evildoers in Wisdom and the fate Jesus announces for himself in today's Gospel. Today we hear them plotting against "the just one." They justify their plans by telling themselves that if he is as good as he seems, God will protect him. Even death is not off limits, and so we clearly see the connection with today's Gospel.

Our second reading is from the Letter of James and we continue much the same theme as from Wisdom. Concerned about his readers ethical behavior, he constructs a work of proverbs and exhortations endorsing right conduct. He has already spoken of the need to put faith into action and the dangers of loose tongues. Now he addresses jealousy and ambition. James contrasts earthly wisdom that leads to disorder against heavenly wisdom. He reminds us that the conflicts we experience come from within ourselves, from the passions and cravings that war within us. We desire what we cannot have and the frustration leads us to vile and sinful behavior like fights, wars and even murder.

Just prior to today's reading from Mark's Gospel, Jesus drives out the evil spirits from a mute child and later explains to his disciples that such spirits can only be cast out with prayer. This manifestation of his divine power, and the Transfiguration that came just before it, set the stage for Jesus' prediction of his future suffering. He has acted with a power and authority unavailable to the disciples. He can command demons, so surely he could cast off the enemies who conspire against him. But Jesus is speaking about what he will allow to happen, about a choice he is willing to make and this poses a serious problem for his disciples. They simply don't understand, or perhaps don't want to. His ability to cast out demons is far more fascinating. Aware of this, Jesus

asks them what they were discussing. They won't say because they know it was inappropriate. So Jesus enacts a parable by taking a child into his arms. If you want to draw close to the Son of Man, he says, serve my little ones, the lowly, the poor, and be like them.

A special thanks to everyone who helped to make the Erie Irish Festival 2012 a great success. We won't have final figures for a week or two, but we certainly did very well. It's a great deal of hard work by a lot of people, but it's also a fun weekend. There are so many people to thank that it would be impossible to list all of their names, but it was a great event. And congratulations to our Erie Irish Festival Chairperson, Cal Pifer, who was just recently named the Executive Director of the Erie County Historical Society. Cal did a great job with the Festival; it was his first year at it and he certainly pulled it off.

There will be an opportunity to meet our new Bishop Persico on Wednesday, October 24, at St. Jude's Church. Priests will have dinner with him at 5:30 followed by a 7 PM Mass and then a public reception. You will also have an opportunity to meet the new bishop at our 175th anniversary dinner on Saturday, October 20, as he has graciously agreed to join us for the evening.

I believe I mentioned that we are reconfiguring the lights in the vestibule, Gift Shop, tower room and under the balcony. These were all originally in the chapel of St. Joseph's Orphanage and are beautiful lights. Instead of the three that were under the balcony, we will now have five. Tom Church of Church Electric has donated a large light fixture from the old Meadville High School Auditorium and it will be used as the light in the Gift Shop. We've also had to retain Northwest Restoration to do some major work on the church roof. There are areas that need all new tile and it wouldn't make sense to restore the interior and not do this.....The ordination of Bishop-elect Lawrence Persico will be held at St. Peter's Cathedral on Monday, October 1, at 2:30 PM. The ceremony is not open to the public, but Sunday evening Vespers are. Fortunately, the Erie TV stations are going to broadcast the ordination live so you can watch it that way. We have to give thanks to God for this wonderful man who he is sending as our new bishop. His 15 years as a pastor helped mold him into a genuine "people" person......The children were lined up in the cafeteria of a Catholic elementary school for lunch and the first item was a large pile of apples. The nun made a note and posted it on the apple tray. "Take only ONE. God is watching." Moving further along, at the other end of the table was a large pile of chocolate chip cookies.
