



Today is the Twenty-Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from Ezekiel. In this ancient culture, indi-Desk vidual identity developed very slowly, subsumed for centuries within the identity of the community. For example, it was believed that children were

accountable for the sins of their parents. But Exekiel champions the notion of individual responsibility. The trauma of the exile contributed to the emergence of a maturing sense of personal accountability. Speaking for the Lord, Ezekiel calls on the Israelites to take responsibility for their own decisions and realize they have the power to turn from bad to good and from good to bad as we will hear in today's gospel. In response to a childlike whine that God's ways are "not fair," God asks for an honest assessment of just whose ways are not fair, God's or the people? God explains how divine judgment is meted out: each one is judged on his or her own behavior.

We continue reading from Paul's Letter to the Philippians as we hear him again plead for unity among believers. He lists all of the things about these people that bring him joy and then he asks, "complete my joy" by being "of the same mind." Only someone who loves deeply can scold, love and teach at the same time. "Do nothing out of..." echoes the urgency of a dying parent or a departing leader who wants to ensure that structures and relationships will remain intact. Paul also calls for selflessness, urging that they think of others as superior to themselves. Then we begin a very early hymn in the church, one which is proclaimed every Palm Sunday. This mystical, almost musical passage revels in the paradox of Christ's grandeur and his remarkable humility. He asks that if thinking of others as superior seems like he is asking a lot, just look at Christ. He was God, yet became human like us and endured a humiliating death.

In our gospel, Jesus draws an ever-clearer line in the sand between himself and the Pharisees as his tolerance of hypocrisy and spiritual barrenness grows thin. This passage follows the cleansing of the temple and the cursing of the fig tree, a parable which speaks of judgment coming upon those who feign goodness but fail to bear fruit. In today's parable, Jesus points to the primacy of deeds over words. The greatest crime of the leaders is not their hypocrisy but their failure

to teach, their failure to understand that physicians heal the sick, not those who are well. Instead, they turn their backs of the sick, even after seeing John calling the greatest sinners to conversion. He is very critical of them saying that while the son changed his mind and went, but they did not later change their minds and believe.

This past February a number of parishioners volunteered to help our neighboring Russian Church of the Nativity as they hosted about 40 homeless people for a 2 week period. They are doing the same thing in December of this year and have been asked to take a two-week session again in February. They are reticent to do so because they do not have enough volunteers and are asking if St. Patrick's Parish would be willing to take the entire two-week session in February. They are willing to allow us use of their Social Center, but we would have to get enough volunteers to staff it from 7 PM until 7 AM each day as well as enough people who would prepare a meal to be served in the evening. I'm hoping that we could gather enough volunteers to undertake this. Anything we do to help the poor and the homeless will find enormous reward and forgiveness from the Lord. If you are interested in helping, can you please call the parish office.

I'm going to contact the Knights and Ladies of St. Patrick to see if some of them would volunteer to help with this project. It would be a perfect way for them to show their commitment to the gospel beyond simply gathering for Mass and a dinner. I hope they will respond. I am also going to contact the local Knights of Columbus and members of the Serra Club to see if we can garner some volunteers from among them.

Father Mike DeMartinis and his Youth Group are going to prepare and serve meals for 4 nights and a group of Gannon University students are going to do the same thing, so we already have 8 of the 14 nights covered.

Thanks for the generosity of a good friend, I was a recent guest at the Inner City Neighborhood Art House event on September 9. I sometimes wonder if we realize the incredible work these Benedictine Sisters do in our midst. To see some of the art work that they bring out in inner city children and the hope they give some of these poor

impoverished children is incredible. What would some of our inner city be like without the endless work and commitment of these women? They made decisions long ago to refocus ministry and to serve the poorest of the poor. Where would we be without them? I'm going to ask the St. Patrick Finance Council if they would approve our sending a \$100 check each month to the Emmaus Soup Kitchen which the sisters run to feed the homeless and the poor. You have been incredibly generous in our offertory, and we've been able to have a beautiful church, etc. But our primary focus has to be on the poorest of the poor, and I hope you will support me in asking the Finance Council to approve this. It is precisely what Pope Francis is asking us to do. I feel so proud of your generous support of our Food Pantry and your generosity in helping the poor, and I hope you will support me in asking this.

In the past we have been able to borrow kettle drums for special occasions, but we are no longer able to borrow them. Mark Alloway has found some used drums in very good condition which we would buy and then have available whenever we want to use them. A set of drums would cost about \$800. He located a set in Pittsburgh and drove down to pick them up, so we will now have them available for us. Perhaps brides might want to include kettle drums in some of the music for their wedding. If anyone is interested in donating these as a memorial, please contact me.

The number of wedding reservations for next year is down dramatically from what we have had in the past. Since the restoration of the church, by this time each year we have had 25-30 reservations for the following summer. This year we only have 12.
