



Today is the 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading is from the Book of Numbers and once again we have a very clear example of how the first reading is related to the gospel. It presents an all too familiar scene: those closest to the seat of power, relishing their privileged position, play gatekeeper to ensure that others who are not authorized don't gain access to the coveted power. The same dynamic is at play in the gospel where John tries to prevent someone from driving out demons. Here Joshua wants to stop Eldad and Medad from prophesying. In both instances, a subordinate tells his superior that his toes are being stepped on and both times the superior says, "It's not a problem." Today we have Moses who clearly understands that religious authority comes from God and if God chooses to distribute it more widely than anticipated, all that the rest of us can do is rejoice in God's generosity.....It's also important to understand that when both the Old and the New Testament stories speak about prophesying, it doesn't mean seeing the future but a type of inspired and spontaneous charismatic utterance.....Our second reading moves today to the Letter of James, a New Testament book accepted in the Catholic bible but not in the Protestant bible. The words we hear today are stark and unsettling as James reminds his readers that wealth, fine clothing and precious metals will all fade away; they will disappoint us and not sustain us. James is trying to tell them that real wealth is found in the ways of the Lord.....Our gospel from Mark reveals Jesus dealing with overzealous disciples who think they are safeguarding his authority by forbidding one who is not of their group from exercising power in his name. Jesus responds by challenging their narrow-mindedness and jealousy and offers a larger vision: "He who is not against us is for us." Jesus goes further and points to God's generosity. Then Jesus has disturbing words of warning to those who exercise power and authority. Death, he says, is better than causing scandal to one of God's innocent ones. His reference today to Gehenna is one of only two times in Mark's gospel that Jesus refers to hell.....We are very quickly filling up for wedding dates at St. Patrick's for 2013. At the present time, all we have open between Easter and November 1 are a weekend in July, one in August and one in September. If someone is thinking of a wedding here next year, you would be wise to contact the office and firm up your date because they are disappearing fast.

We're grateful to Lou Ann Nowosielski for underwriting the expense of restoring the bell carillon at St. Hedwig's. That carillon was severely damaged when hit by lightning early this summer, and it's nice to have the bells ringing again.

Congratulations to St. Patrick's parishioner Elisa Guida, who recently obtained her 501 c 3 status for her organization, StringsforaCure. Elisa is a two-time breast cancer survivor and jewelry designer who transforms guitar strings from famous musicians into one-of-a-kind bracelets, earrings, pendants and rings. Proceeds are used to fund the foundation's efforts to educate, comfort and support cancer victims, primarily those with breast cancer. If you have not yet returned your reservation for the 175th anniversary banquet on October 20th at the Bayfront Convention Center, please do so soon. We're rapidly filling up. I'm happy to tell you that Bishop Persico has graciously agreed to join us for the evening thus giving many of you an opportunity to meet him for the first time.

Father Michael DeMartinis is going to be offering a Bible Study class on the Letters of St. Paul on Tuesday evenings from 7-8 PM beginning October 16th and ending December 18. The classes are open to the public and additional information is available by calling Mount Calvary Parish at 454-0061.

St. Patrick's Food Pantry distributed 18,388 pounds of food during the month of August at a cost to the parish of \$607.99 That distribution served 736 families.

The ordination and installation of Bishop Persico will take place Monday, Oct. 1, beginning at 2:30 at the cathedral. Access is by ticket only. We are very fortunate that WJET TV, Channel 24, is going to broadcast it live. They will leave the ceremony at 5 because of their news, but you can then switch over to Fox, and coverage will continue. Because he is being ordained a bishop and installed as bishop of Erie, it will be a very, very long ceremony and certainly not finished by 5 PM. Please keep him in your prayers as he faces a daunting task trying to lead a diocese in these very changing times.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

Work continues in St. Patrick's Church. You would not believe the maze of scaffolding. You can hardly walk in the building. The work on the exterior is finishing up, and the artists from the Conrad Schmitt Company tell me we are on schedule to be ready for Christmas Eve and the grand opening. I'll probably wait until spring but the sidewalks have to be replaced. They are badly broken and someone could fall. The ones right in front of the church have been replaced. but the rest now need to be done.

As workmen were installing the last of the scaffolding in the choir loft, one of the men reached out and touched the wall and the entire west wall of the choir loft collapsed. About 2 hours later. the entire wall of the stairwell collapsed. We knew those would have to be replaced.

The artists working on the ceiling have discovered that the plaster work done after the 1978 fire is not holding up, so much so that you can press the plaster in the dome. It's just a matter of time before it would come down, so that area has to be re-plastered!

You might notice that the bell in front of St. Patrick's Church has been restored.
