

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time and we read from Genesis. Today's account of God distinguishing male and female and their oneness when united in marriage is actually part of a second creation story in Genesis. The first presents God forming major elements of creation in an orderly fashion, with humankind created last. The Hebrew word Adam means the human race. It is this first story of creation with which we are most familiar. In the second story, from which today's reading is taken, humans are the first act of creation. Prior to today's reading, God created Adam from the clay of the earth and breathed life into him. Today we are told that man is not to live in isolation but that God created other living beings and tells man to name them. But none proves to be a fitting companion. After woman is created from man's rib, we are today that when the man and woman are united in marriage, they for one single living person.

Today we begin a lengthy series of readings from Hebrews. It's author unknown, it is more a sermon than a letter. Today we hear of Jesus's self-emptying of himself in sharing in the human experience.

Last Sunday's gospel ended with Jesus teaching several proverbs to the inner circle of his disciples. Today the context changes and we hear a Pharisee (a member of a Jewish sect that strove to follow the law of Moses strictly) poses a question to test Jesus. Though Jewish law permitted divorce, only a man could initiate it. Jesus roots his response not in the law, but in creation itself. He quotes the first reading, pointing out that husband and wife form a bond such that they become a single living being. While the Pharisee makes no attempt to follow up, the disciples question Jesus. The importance of Jesus's quote that those who divorce "commit adultery," is

really a statement that he is treating man and woman as equals. He is repeating that the two partners are meant to create such oneness that they become an unbreakable unit.

We are completely booked for weddings in 2016 from May until the early November. I have to tell you that it is a lot of work on my part and others here, but we all share a thrill that these young people (and some not so young!!) want to be married in the church. Nationally Catholic marriages have declined dramatically, and the same is true in our own diocese. We're fortunate here that we have all of these weddings.

Once again, once we get through Easter I will invited all of the bridal couples in for an evening in the rectory. I do them in groups of 5 or 6 couples at a time. We gather at 5:30 for a drink and then at 6:30 have dinner. I have the meal catered so I can spend time with the bridal couples, and some parishioners volunteer to serve and clean up. It's a small way of trying to say to some of these young people who feel alienated or lukewarm about the church that we want them to feel welcome.

St. Martin's Center is in need of a volunteer or two who would be willing to give a couple hours each week to sort through the clothing that they receive. It would just be once a week. If interested in more information or in volunteering, please call Rita Zawacki at 452-6113, ext 215.

Pope Francis preached on September 10th that "If you are a priest and you can't manage to be merciful, tell your bishop to give you an administrative job, but please don't go into the confessional!" can't forgive, you cannot receive the peace of the Lord." After all these years of listening to pious platitudes at the highest levels of the church, don't you just love somebody telling it like it is!

The Young Adults group had their first Happy Hour last Sunday evening at the rectory. I told them that for their first get together they could use the rectory and I would treat for the wine and beer. I staved upstairs and let them get to know one another, but I understand they had a great time. A young couple in the parish, Matt & Jennifer Hausman are part of the group. Jennifer manages Erie Brewing and she has offered to open the Brewery on a Sunday evening and host the group for their second Happy Hour with the beer being provided to the group at no cost. I'm trying to figure out how I can join this group. They're having way too much fun!

As I mentioned at Mass two weeks ago, Bishop Persico has granted my request and renewed my appointment as your pastor. I'm grateful for his trust in me and for your acceptance of me. As I've said before, I could retire, but the very thought of that scares me to death. I don't know what I would do all day long. I know the day will inevitably come, and I'll have to face it; but I hope I can delay it for as long as possible.
