



Today is the Twenty-Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time and once again we hear first from Isaiah. The connection Desk with today's gospel might escape you until you realize that, like the king in IJthe parable, the "Lord of Hosts" is preparing a rich feast to which "all peo-

ples" are invited. The image of a great banquet as the ultimate symbol of salvation has a long history that predates even Isaiah. He does more than just write poetry. He feeds the religious imagination of his people and paints a picture of a time that is not yet, but will be. Joy crescendos in the closing lines that announce the coming of our God. The prophet sees what we cannot and announces it with certainty.

Paul has learned a secret from living in scarcity and in abundance. All things are doable and all is tolerable, he says, "because of Christ who provides the strength to embrace abundance" without pride and endure want without resentment. At the time he is writing this, Paul is in prison facing death. Yet his spirit is undaunted and he proves the sincerity of his words by being able to express gratitude, speaking words of encouragement, and ending in prayer. Paul's secret is that in Christ he found a way to hover above life's circumstances so that when abundance gives way to need and comfort yields to bare necessity, the faith path he walks remains stable and unshaken. We almost sense a regret that the Philippians have been so generous in sending money, not just once but multiple times. Paul has learned to rely solely on God. Nonetheless, he thanks them sincerely for wanting to relieve his distress.

Like the first reading, our gospel begins by stressing the lavish preparations that were made and the invitations that were sent for a great banquet. The hostility and violence of the invitees can only be understood as an allegory that reflects the situation faced by the church of Matthew's day. He's making sense of the destruction of Jerusalem and sees it as the consequence of Israel's rejection of Jesus and their hostility towards the Christian community. The king in no way anticipates a negative response, but naïve no more, the "enraged" king sends an army to destroy and burn. As the destruction begins, so does the banquet. Because the king ordered that "whomever you find" be "invited to the feast," the

banquet is filled with "good and bad alike." A new controversy, and many Scripture scholars would say, a new parable begins with the king's entrance into the feast. Anger and disappointment flare when he spots someone "not dressed in a wedding garment." He gives the guest an opportunity to defend himself, but can't abide the man's rudeness. The man has not taken the (Eucharistic) banquet seriously; he does not have the awe of God that would have compelled him to prepare. Swift and terrible judgment follows. It's a warning to all of us to recognize the divine invitations we may be ignoring.

Today's bulletin contains the Financial and Spiritual reports for 2013-14 from both St. Hedwig's and St. Patrick's parishes. I hope you will take the time to review them. If you have any guestions, please do not hesitate to contact me. As you can readily see, both parishes operated in the black and both parishes have reserves. At St. Patrick's, remember that we still owe \$390,000 on the debt for the restoration of the church. A little over \$200,000 remains to be paid on pledges and the balance will be paid from our Catholic Services Appeal and income from the festival.

What is more important to read is the Spiritual Report. To sustain itself, a parish must have more baptisms than deaths, and we are clearly in that category at St. Patrick's. St. Hedwig's, however, is a different story as there has not been a baptism in over 7 years. Remember also that many of the deaths recorded at St. Patrick's are non-parishioners who perhaps were baptized there, married there, etc. and expressed a wish to their survivors that they be buried from there, and I always accommodate.

It is much too early to know the financial results of the Festival, but the overwhelming response is that everyone loved it being downtown, and we're going to continue that in the future. The committee heads are all meeting to review glitches and other things that we can improve for next year, but it was an incredible success. The crowds were unlike anything we've experienced in the past and eliminating the entrance fee proved to be very beneficial. Everywhere I've gone in the city in the past weeks people have come up to me and raved about the festival and what a great time they had. Our profit may be down a bit this year because of first-time expenses, but we now

have these and we won't have to invest in them again. For example, we spent over \$10,000 with new electricity to be able to accommodate everything, and we won't have that cost again. Starting next year, we're going to buy a piece of cooking equipment each year so that we won't have to rent it.

I'm especially grateful to Holy Trinity Parish and to St. Paul's Parish for lending us lighting for use in the tents. That saved a great deal of money and both parishes gave that lighting to us at no cost. In addition, several Holy Trinity parishioners volunteered and helped in serving food. It's so nice to see parishes working together rather than against one another.

You're aware of the tragedy which occurred in St. Patrick's Church a few weeks ago when we found a young man dead of a heroin overdose. I looked at him sitting there and could have cried. Handsome young man with all the potential for life, and now it was all over. When the detective told me that this was the 42nd drug related death in Erie this year, I realized we have an epidemic on our hands. I don't know what the solution is but we need to find it before we bury more of our young people.

I'm grateful to a couple in the parish who have graciously donated the new kettle drums for St. Patrick's Church.

Two nuns were shopping. As they passed the beer cooler, one nun said to the other, "Wouldn't a cold beer or two taste good on a hot summer evening?" The second nun answered, "It would, Sister, but I would not feel comfortable buying beer since I am certain it would cause a scene at the checkout stand." "I can handle that," said the other nun. And she picked up a six pack and headed for the check-out. The cashier looked surprised, but one of the nuns said, "We use beer for washing our hair. Back at the convent, we call it 'Catholic Shampoo.'" she said without blinking an eye. The cashier reached under the counter. pulled our a package of pretzel sticks and placed them in the bag with the beer. He then looked the two nuns straight in the eye and said, "The curlers are on the house."
