



Today is the 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading is from the 2nd Book of Kings. The passage about Naaman's cure from leprosy begins several verses before what we read today and we learn that he was a highly respected commander of the

king of Aram. A new servant in his household had been captured from Israel and she urged Naaman to go to the prophet in Samaria who would cure him. The king sends a letter to the king of Israel attesting to his desire for a cure; but the king of Israel tears his garments and is convinced he is being set up. The prophet Elisha finds out about the encounter and sends word to the king to send Naaman to him. When he arrives he is told to wash in the Jordan seven times and his flesh will be healed. But Naaman balks that the prophet did not come out to meet him, lay hands on him and cure him. His anger causes him to turn away from Elisha's house, concluding that the God of Israel is no better than any other god. His servants, however, intervene and convince him to wash in the Jordan. It is at this point that our reading today begins, a reading which focuses not so much on his healing but on his confession of faith. Elisha's refusal to accept Naaman's gift is also a confession of faith for it shows that those who serve the Lord are not in need of material things.

Our second reading continues today from Paul's letter to Timothy, a letter written in deeply personal terms. He urges Timothy to remember the gospel of Jesus for which Paul is enduring suffering and imprisonment. The freedom of God's word allows Paul to bear with his own suffering for the sake of those whom God chooses. The reading concludes with verses from a hymn used in first century house churches.

Our gospel today is the familiar story of the healing of the ten lepers. Remember that our first reading and the gospel are always connected and today in both we hear a healed leper profess that it is faith that saves us. In neither case does religious or ethnic background pose an obstacle. Both men are foreigners. This story is found only in Luke and concludes with Jesus sending the cured leper on his way knowing that his faith brings him salvation. Like Naaman, he goes forward in life differently now, a grateful and saved foreigner who speaks of new life.

As the diocese begins a study of future planning, one of the areas that has to be carefully explored is our Catholic schools. Since 2000, baptismal rates in the diocese have dropped 36%, and the birth rate in northwest Pennsylvania has dropped. This raises the inevitable question who will be sitting in our elementary schools in five to seven years; and then the even more ominous question—who will be sitting in our Catholic high schools in eight to ten years. Enrollment in both our elementary and secondary schools has declined dramatically largely because of a lack of bodies to fill the seats as well as the financial struggle entailed in providing a child with a Catholic education. Some very hard and difficult decisions will have to be made; some of which may not be popular, but we have to be practical and know our limitations.

Another growing area of concern is the rather dramatic drop in funerals and burials in our Catholic cemeteries. The cremation rate in the city of Erie is now at about 43%, and many of those who are cremated are not being buried. You will also notice a growing number of families who do not have a funeral Mass when a parent dies.

Rainbow Gardens we feel would more than cover the costs of tents, tables, chairs, freezers, port-apotties, etc. We would not have to rent an RV for the people to count money; they could do it in the safety of the rectory. There is more than adequate parking in the area, and it would bring lots of people downtown. We could also open the church and showcase it for people who have not seen it. There are a huge number of logistics to be worked out; but we're trying to see if we can pull it off.

We're all going to have to take a vow of patience if we attempt to do this as we'll make some mistakes, some feelings will get hurt, there will be some bumps in the road, etc. I personally think the whole idea is exciting. The festival belongs in our neighborhood, and here's hoping we can pull it off.

Dennis Michalski has taken over the program for the past two years and almost doubled the profit from it, and certainly produces a much nicer program than we ever had before. He has agreed to do this again next year, but would like someone to step forward who can work with him next year, learn the ropes and take it over in 2015. Is anyone interested? You can work out of the rectory; it's calling present advertisers to do so again.

Erie Insurance has once again proven what great neighbors they are with the planting of Cauley Memorial Park at the sight of the former Cauley Memorial Auditorium. Stop sometime and take a look at it. You will see they have carefully saved the granite stones which were above the entrance into the auditorium and placed those in the park.

A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: 2 Kings 5:14-17 Reading II: 2 Timothy 2:8-13

Gospel: Luke 17:11-19



This week we reflect on the place of trust and gratitude in our lives before God. How often God's grace comes to us in unexpected ways, especially through the words and actions of others. In this week's readings, the lepers Naaman and the Samaritan were not just lepers, who were considered outsiders-not part of the community-they were really outsiders-they were foreigners. They were both seeking a cure - they spoke with trust that their request would be granted. Their requirements for a cure were very ordinary, but they both responded with trust and gratitude. Sometimes in our own faith journey we seek the extraordinary, the miracle, when in reality, what God asks of us is trust in the grace of the ordinary. God is at work there. And our gratitude is the proper response for his abiding presence.
