

From the Pastor's Desk.....

Today is the Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time and we first hear part of Jeremiah's promise of future restoration for God's people. Even as the kingdom of Judah continues it dissolution, nearing its final end, the prophet, relying on an everfaithful God, promises that beyond destruction and exile lies a recreated people. All this will be solely a divine work beyond human power. Jeremiah's ultimate vision is of a God who would bring final salvation to a sinful, scattered people, treating them as a favored firstborn and renewing all creation.

Last Sunday's reading from Hebrews declared the full humanity of Jesus, tested in every way that we are but never choosing sin. Today the author again insists that Christ intimately experienced the struggle and weakness shared by all human beings. But he also attests that the totally human Jesus is Son of God as well and so becomes the final High Priest, the mediator between God and man. Jesus knows human trial and weakness by experience, and so understands human failings and treats them with patience. Called by God to do so, he brings all humanity with him to God for healing and restoration.

Today's gospel serves as an important transition in Mark's account of the Good News. Remember, Mark is writing to a community suffering confusion, loss and persecution. They struggled with the erroneous assumption that the Second Coming of Jesus was immanent, many of their members were falling away and they were being persecuted by Rome. Mark emphasizes Jesus as the Messiah who inaugurates God's final rule in the pattern of Isaiah's suffering servant. The story of Bartimaeus also closes the important three-part section of Mark in which Jesus attempts in vain to clarify his mission as Suffering Servant of

God rather than triumphant earthly king. Immediately after today's miracle story, Jesus enters Jerusalem to begin the final act in the Suffering Servant-Messiah. Mark employs a technique called "framing" which sets off important content with a similar account at the beginning and end of a section. The frame serves as a king of commentary on what appears within it. Two stories of Jesus healing a blind man punctuate Mark's tripartite portrayal of Jesus proclaiming his impending suffering and execution, repeatedly followed by the disciple's lack of understanding. They are as blind as the people Jesus cured. With the healing of Bartimeaus, Jesus sets before us one who quickly sees through his persistence of faith; unlike the disciples who only begin to see in slow phases.

As you may recall, we need a new walk-in freezer for the Food Pantry. The cost is \$20,000. We applied for a grant from the Erie Community Foundation who informed us this past week that they are giving us \$10,000 toward the cost of the freezer and that the Erie County Gaming Authority is giving us \$10,000. Thanks to the generosity and concern for the poor and needy of these two organizations, we can now order the new walk-in freezer and it will not cost the parish a penny. I'm particularly grateful to B. J. Lechner who wrote the grant request.

If you are in a position to do so, I would recommend you explore setting up a trust at the Erie Community Foundation. That organization does more to help non-profits and groups serving the poor and needy than any other organization in the county. Over the years they have paid for a new floor in the Food Pantry, a new roof and now a new walk-in freezer. I don't know that we could have done these things on our own. The parish—and the community—owe the Erie Community Foundation a deep and lasting debt of gratitude for all that they do.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

We've been meeting already to start planning for next year's Irish Festival. Our main goal next year is to get more quality entertainment for the festival. We're discovering that the particular weekend we have the festival—which is half way to St. Patrick's Day—is also the second biggest day for Irish bars and pubs. As a consequence some of the big names we want to contract with are already committed. We're toying very seriously with moving the festival up one weekend. We can't do that next year because of the wedding schedule; but we'll make a decision about this before January 1.

Saint Patrick's Haven is located at East 12th St. and German and houses up to 21 homeless men every night. They can come in at 7 PM, get a shower, a clean bed and then have to be out of the facility by 7 AM. From there they can go to the Upper Room at 10th & Peach for a full hot breakfast, the Bishop's Breakfast which is sponsored by the Diocese of Erie. The clients get their evening meal at Emmaus Soup Kitchen but they are not open on Sunday evenings and so groups of volunteers prepare a hot meal and take it to the Haven on a Sunday evening. If you volunteer, you are only expected to take a meal a couple of times a year. If interested or if you want more information, contact Mary Harsh at maryryan140@gmail.com.

October is Polish Heritage Month

The story of General Jozef Haller and the Polish army in France has long gone untold. The Army, also known as Haller's Army and the Blue Army, fought under French Command in World War I, as well as in the Polish-Soviet War of 1918-1921. Many of the member of Haller's Army were Polish American who answered the call of prestigious recruiters, such as Ignacy Paderewski, Polish Statesman and renowned musician. Paderewski was instrumental in getting President Woodrow Wilson's approval to recruit a Polish army on American soil. Wilson, however, would not allow such an army to be formed or trained within the US, so recruits mustered in Canada.
