



Today is the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time and our first reading is from the prophet Jeremiah. He prophesied before and during the Babylonian Exile, sometimes threatening judgment and other times promising mercy and restoration. Today's text falls into the latter category and it overflows with the promise of God's love manifested in an immense throng of God's people returning in joy to the promised land of their birth. "Shout.. exalt... proclaim," commands the prophet. God has ended the exile and will restore the nation. The names "Jacob" (another name for Israel) and "Ephraim" (a son of Joseph who became one of Israel's 12 tribes) both represent the nation as a whole.

A reading of scripture is always the "then" and the "now." What did it mean then and what does it mean now? This reading in the now sense reminds us that God, a father, will clear the way for his children, consoling and guiding them back to the safety of his heart. And he does this in every age.

We continue to read from Hebrews in our second reading as we proceed with a reflection of the high priesthood of Jesus, comparing and contrasting his role with that of human priests.

In our gospel from Mark we meet the blind beggar, Bartimaeus who has heard of Jesus and cries out so boldly that members of the crowd try to silence him. But he cries out all the more. Once Jesus takes note of him, the crowd then advocates for him and tells him to take courage and get up hoping that Bartimaeus will give them a share in the blessing he will receive. The fickle crowd serves as a foil for the resolute beggar who won't abandon his resolve to be heard. When he makes his request of Jesus, he is no longer shouting, but displays an earnest, intense simplicity that convinces Jesus this man "sees" better than the crowd or even his own disciples. And Jesus responds to him with the familiar, "Your faith has saved you." Recall in Mark that Jesus cannot get his own disciples to "see" who he is even though Jesus can give sight to the blind. It will only be after the resurrection that they will be able to understand.

Celebrant of the Saturday evening 5 PM Mass next weekend will be Father Dennis Martin, chaplain at Saint Vincent Health Center, Celebrant of of the Sunday 9 AM at St. Hedwig's and the 10:30 AM at St. Patrick's next Sunday will be Fr. Tom Fialkowski, retired pastor of Mount Carmel Parish. I will be in California to baptize the twin babies of some good friends.

Northwest Restoration has completed the pointing of the exterior of the church, painting all of the window frames, etc. They met with me last week to tell me that the roofs on the two large east and west gables of the church are beyond repair. They have to remove the slate, go down to the bare wood, and start over again. It just seems that every day brings another bit of bad news with the building, but we've started and we're going to do it and do it right. They estimate this work to cost about \$100,000. We will borrow the money from the diocese, and we can pay it back. If you look simply at the amount of money we earned in our Irish Festival this year, we can use that money each year as repayment on the loan. There is no sense in doing all of the interior work and not having the building sealed against the weather. I don't like the news anymore than you, but I know we can handle it.

On a brighter side, Rick Statz, the general overseer from the Conrad Schmitt Studio in Milwaukee & Lynn Howard, the lighting consultant, will be here this week. They continue to assure me that they are right on schedule and that we will definitely be back in the church for Christmas Eve. I believe I mentioned to you that the refurbished pews and the new cushions are beginning to arrive and are being stored in the Cauley Auditorium until they will be returned to the church. There were 3 small pews up in the choir loft. We're having those refinished and new cushions made for them and they are then going to be permanently placed near the piano for the choir to use rather than returning the red chairs which they have been using.

The work on the vestibule is now underway and the work in the Gift Shop is complete and it really looks nice. I'm grateful to our custodian, Tony D'Aurora, for doing this work and for doing it so well. He had to re-plaster the walls and ceiling as they were so badly damaged.

Thursday, Nov. 1, is the feast of All Saints and a holyday. Masses are Wed. at 5 PM at St. Hedwig's and Thursday at 12:05 PM at St. Patrick's temporary location—Cauley Auditorium.

From the Pastor's Desk continued......

The Archdiocese of Philadelphia recently released financial data showing how bad its finances are. The archbishop noted that 2/3 of the parishes have operating deficits and over 100 of them are in serious financial distress. Parishes are \$62 million in arrears in what they owe the archdiocese in assessments. That's a staggering amount of money. The archdiocese recently sold the cardinal's residence and an elegant mansion on the Jersey shore which was an open house for priests for a total of \$14.1 million. I share those figures with you because, to a much smaller degree, we're going to find the same problem in our own diocese. We have a significant number of parishes who can't pay their bills, are not paying diocesan assessments, membership is plummeting downward and income decreasing. While dioceses in the south and the southwest are growing in numbers, many in the northeast are declining dramatically. Most of the dioceses around us have been forced to close parishes, and we're going to have to ultimately face that issue. It's going to be a difficult time for Bishop Persico as well as priests and people in the affected parishes, but we have too long delayed the inevitable.

High School students planning for college should think seriously about Gannon University and the advantages of their diocesan scholarship programs. Grants of \$1,000 are available to new students who are members of a parish in the diocese and further grants of \$1,500 are available to Catholic high school students who enroll for full-time undergraduate study directly out of high school.
