



Today is the 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time and we hear first from the Book of Maccabees, the only time in the Btsk state three year cycle of readings that we read from 2 Maccabees. We hear this passage as the liturgical year draws to a close because of its emphasis on

resurrection. Our passage describes the martyrdom of four brothers and their mother for their refusal to disobey God's law and eat pork. In later passages we will hear that the mother witnesses the death of all seven of her sons at the hand of the king, and yet she speaks words of hope. She recognizes that God gave life to her sons and he will give it back to them because they have been faithful to him. While the second son speaks of God raising them to eternal life, it is important to remember that belief in the resurrection was not widespread, even by the time of Jesus. This is one of the very few places in the Old Testament where we find a clear reference. Each of the brothers will make a statement of their belief in God who will restore them to life.

Paul's words to the Thessalonians that we hear today encourage them in prayer. This beautiful benediction proclaims hope and that Paul encourages them to remain faithful until Christ's second coming. He also recognizes that he and his companions need prayer and recognizing that the Thessalonians are living the gospel, he asks them to pray for him and his companions.

In our gospel, Jesus has just entered Jerusalem and is teaching in the temple area when the Sadducees question him. By asking whose wife a childless widow will be at the resurrection, they intend to show Jesus that belief in the resurrection is false. The basis of their question is found in Deuteronomy 25: 5-10 which makes a mockery of belief in the resurrection. Jesus' reply once again turns the tables on the very foundation upon which they ask the question. Referring to Exodus 3: 2, 6, verses with which the Sadducees would be familiar, Jesus explains that rising to life is not about whether one has married or remarried or had children in this world; rather it is about the children of God believing in the living God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, a God not of the dead but of the living. Jesus is here making a very clear reference that there indeed is resurrection and eternal life, something which the Sadducees would deny.

Next Sunday will be the last Sunday in Ordinary Time of this liturgical year. The following Sunday, the last Sunday of every liturgical year, is always the Feast of Christ the King. The following week we will begin the four weeks of Advent and a new liturgical year. Next year our gospels will come from Matthew which was written to Jewish converts to Christianity living in present day Damascus, Syria. Matthew is the only evangelist to tell us the story of the Magi. Mark doesn't mention the birth of Christ and Luke tells us the story of his birth in a stable. I'll use the homily of the first Sunday of Advent to introduce us better to Matthew so that hopefully we can listen carefully to what he tells us.

We would like to start a new ministry in the parish and I'm hoping some of you will volunteer. Abby Lechner, herself the new mother of twins, commented how great it was that people brought in some meals when she first came home from the hospital and she wondered if we could get a list of expectant parents and when the mother comes home from the hospital, we would get some volunteers to prepare a simple dinner for them for the first couple of nights. We have some damage to an arch in the vestibule, and when Gary went up to look at the little balcony which is above the main entrance to the church he found it to be badly in need of work. He is now up in the attic above the pillar on the east wall where you can see some water damage and has discovered that the wood is rotted and there is water coming in. I am so glad we have been able to retain this man to seal that building. Gary feels that the water is not coming in from the roof, but through the stone. He has brought in a high lift to get up to that area and examine it and determine what needs to be done.

Speaking of spring, the Farmers Almanac says we will never be so grateful to see a spring in our lives as we will next year. They are predicting a bitter cold winter and higher than normal snowfalls for our area. If you notice a lot of candles

in church, I lit them praying that the Almanac is wrong! When I was a child, the family Bible was on a table in the dining room and the Farmers Almanac was right next to it. Though I never dared to ask him, I am afraid if asked, my grandfather would have put them as equal authorities!!

Two young parishioners who were married here this summer are both bagpipers. One of them played for a recent wedding, and Mark Alloway has retained him to play some Christmas carols before the 5 PM Christmas Eve Mass. We are also going to have full tympani again for the Christmas Eve Masses. I can't believe we're talking about Christmas already—where does time go?

I am continuing the Sunday morning 8 AM Mass at St. Patrick's. None of those early Masses draw a large crowd, but there are obviously enough people who prefer an early Mass that we will continue it. There is no lector nor music as I have to be at St. Hedwig's in time to celebrate the 9 AM Mass there.

Paddy staggered home late after another evening of drinking with his buddies. He took off his shoes and tiptoed to avoid waking his wife, Kathleen. He tiptoed as guietly as he could toward the stairs, but misjudged the bottom step. As he caught himself by grabbing the banister, his body swung around he landed heavily on his rump. In the morning when he awoke, with searing pain in both his head and his butt. he saw Kathleen staring at him from across the room. "You were drunk again last nite, weren't you?" she said. Paddy said, "Why do you say such a mean thing?" "Well," Kathleen said, "it could be the open front door, it could be the broken glass at the bottom of the stairs, it could be the drops of blood trailing from there to the bed, it could be your bloodshot eyes, but mostly, it's all those band-aids stuck on the hall mirror."

A Moment of Reflection

Reading I: 2 Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14 Reading II: 2 Thessalonians 2:16-3:5 Gospel: Luke 20:27-38



This week Jesus cuts through the Sadducees' manipulative questioning with a forthright affirmation. Perhaps you know someone who loves to play mind games and enjoys trying to ridicule your or someone else's belief system by bringing up possible, but highly improbable situations. That is what the Sadducees were trying to do, to trip up Jesus. But Jesus did not respond to them. Instead, he uses a question as a springboard to talk about God being a God of the living and not of the dead. How is your faith, more like staying the course in difficult situations and maintaing trust in God, rather than simply believing in a doctrine?
