



Today is the Feast of Christ the King which is always celebrated on the last Sunday of the church year. Next Sunday, the priest will be dressed in violet as we begin our four weeks of Advent in anticipation of Christmas.

Our first reading today is from Daniel and recounts a vision he has in his sleep which deeply frightens him. He sees four beasts symbolizing this world who are opposed to God but he also sees a "Son of Man" coming to save us. That term will later be used to describe the earthly Jesus. Unfortunately, we come into this story in the middle of it and we've not heard the rest of Daniel's vision.

Our second reading is from the Book of Revelation, a very complex book written by John in a cave on one of the Greek islands. Yet today we can visit the monastery there and go into the actual cave where he wrote this book. Like the Book of Daniel, Revelations is written by a visionary to bring comfort to believers during a time of persecution. These opening verses exalt Christ as one who has formed us into his people and whom he will sustain with his love.

Our Gospel comes from John and is an excerpt from the Passion narrative of John where Christ and Pilate are sparring. John is the most detailed of the gospel authors about this exchange. What is important to grasp is that Jesus is describing his kingdom in other worldly terms and that Jesus, not Pilate, attests to the truth. Pilate wants Jesus to make a definitive statement one way or the other so that he can convict or exonerate him, but Jesus fails to cooperate. He knows his fate and is not trying to avoid it. When Pilate asks him if he is a king, Jesus replies by saying, "You say that I am a king."

It is just four more weeks until we return to St. Patrick's Church. The scaffolding is starting to come down in the sanctuary which will allow the people from South One Supply to start laying the new marble floor in the sanctuary. Then the scaffolding along the east and west walls will come down and, some volunteers, under the direction of Jeff Rouse, can begin cleaning the Stations.. Though they are tightly wrapped, I'm sure the plaster dust has seeped in — it seems to have gone everywhere in the building. It's now possible to see more and more of the finished product, You are going to be thrilled when you see it. I stand in there sometimes and get teary because it is simply so beautiful and elegant. Just imagine what your generosity has done to preserve this beautiful building for future generations. St. Patrick's belongs not just to us, but to the entire city as it is one of the city's most noteworthy landmarks, and we have now secured it for future generations.

Since we are a bit ahead of schedule with the work in the church, we are hoping against hope that we might be able to move into the church on Friday, December 21 and celebrate our weekend Masses of Dec. 22 & 23 in the church. If we can do this, it's going to make the transition much easier. The sound system that we are using in the Cauley has to be reinstalled in church, etc. Let's keep our fingers crossed and hope that we can do this.

The new marble flooring for the sanctuary is now being laid and will take a little more than 2 weeks. Most of the pews have been restored and the new cushions added, and the chairs for the sanctuary are being reupholstered to match the cushions on the pews. Those pews will start to be reinstalled in the church within the next week. And, finally, the carpeting for the aisles will be laid, and we should be ready to go.

I think what amazes me the most with the building is the new lighting. It is just incredible. In the past, the lighting was here and there. It was low in one spot, and bright in another and now it is so evenly distributed that it really highlights the architectural beauty of the building.

The roof replacement on the side gables should be almost finished by now. I was surprised how badly deteriorated those areas where. They have been patched for years and years, and it's obvious that they needed to be completely replaced. No sense in doing the interior and not getting the exterior right.

The new lighting for the Stations of the Cross will really highlight them for the very first time. Good lighting couldn't get close to them because of the heat of the lights and the potential damage it could do to the statues. But now, the LED lighting there is no heat and so concentrated lighting can

The St. Patrick Food Pantry distributed 18,922 pounds of food during the month of September at a cost to the parish of \$812.61. A total of 767 families received food that month. A special thank you to those of you who donate to help us make this project possible.

The annual collection for the Retirement Fund for Religious will be taken up in all churches the weekend of December 8 & 9. These women have served our parishes and our schools for over a hundred years with no compensation and now face old age with no Social Security and little money to care for them. Last year, the faithful of our diocese contributed \$167.1122 to the collection and when the national funds were distributed, our women religious received a combined total of \$194,190. Contributions to the 2011 appeal totaled \$27.4 million, with \$26 million of that being distributed to religious communities.

We have a confusing weekend coming up on December 8 & 9. Usually when a holyday falls on a Saturday or Monday, the obligation to attend Mass is dispensed, but the American bishops voted to keep the Feast of the Immaculate Conception, Saturday, December 8, as a holyday. Thus, we will have a Mass at St. Hedwig's on Friday evening at 5:30 and a Mass at St. Patrick's on Saturday at 12:05 PM.

Next week we begin the season of Advent as our four weeks of preparation for the coming of Christ at Christmas.
