



December 8th is the feast of the Immaculate Conception, a holyday of obligation for Catholics living in the NE United States. However, no feast Sunday ADVENT usurps the Advent feasts and so the Immaculate Conception is

transferred to Monday, Dec. 9th. It is NOT, however, a holyday of obligation.

The rich and elegant words we first hear today from Isaiah express the hope that all of the kings of Israel would rule with justice. But Israel never had such a king and so these words became their hope for a Messiah. Isaiah returns us to the garden of Eden where everything is peaceful and well. The meaning of these words today is that the coming of the Messiah will reverse all of the ill effects of sin and restore the innocence and trust of the garden. This Messiah will be a descendant of David, the son of Jesse. The "stump of Jesse" is a reference to the current king. Ahaz, whose reliance on political alliances rather than on God demonstrated his last of faith and made him an unfit king. The Messiah, on the other hand, will defend the poor and afflicted and deal decisively with the wicked.

In our second reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans, he is addressing the tensions between Jews and Gentiles. Paul tells us that whatever was written previously, that is, all the words of Scripture, offers hope to anyone who embraces God's word. Hope is what sustains us in the face of mounting evidence that sin more than grace abounds.

In our gospel, Matthew introduces us to the stark, stern and riveting figure of John the Baptist. It will not be until the fourth week of Advent that we will begin to hear of angels, etc. Today and next week, John holds the stage and reminds us that this season is not about preparing for the babe in the manger, but for the Christ who was born amid livestock and urine, who lived among tax collectors and prostitutes, and who died shamefully on the cross. John's presence reminds us that we are preparing for the coming of Jesus' whole life and ministry, not just the romantic moment in a manger. John's call was heard by large numbers of the people who went out to listen to him. John speaks of the one to follow him as mightier than he and better able to separate wheat from chaff. John is saving very clearly that without genuine repentance we will lack the weight of the wheat and be blown away with the chaff when the Messiah comes.

People have been asking about our Christmas Mass schedule so they can plan family events. We will have a 4:30 PM Christmas Eve Mass at St. Hedwig's; then a 5 PM Mass at St. Patrick's and finally a 9 PM Mass at St. Patrick's. On Christmas Day there will be a 9 AM Mass at St. Hedwig's and a 10:30 AM Mass at St. Patrick's.

Congratulations to St. Patrick parishioners Mary Daly and Elisa Guida who are among the 12 women chosen by Mercy Center for Women as their 2014 "Women Making History" honorees.

Following the Saturday evening 5 PM Mass and the Sunday morning 10:30 AM Mass, the rectory will be open if you want to see my new apartment on the third floor. Last weekend, people whose last name began with the letters A-L went over and this weekend anyone whose last name begins K-Z is welcome to go over. I would only caution you that it is up three flights of stairs. Take special notice of the beautiful hardwood floors we found under the carpets as well as the three Waterford crystal chandeliers (original to the house) which we found and did not know were still in the building. The original file for the house shows that there were 20 Waterford crystal chandeliers but they have almost all mysteriously disappeared.

We've had some damage done to one of the Stations of the Cross in church. Someone broke a finger off one of the figures in the Fifth Station. I constantly see people kissing and hugging the statues and beg them not to touch them because just the oil on our fingers does damage. We presently have a security camera on the southwest tower door which is open during the week, but we are now going to put a second one on the west side aisle so that we will be able to see people who are in church. Those stations are absolutely priceless works of art and we need to do everything we can to preserve them. Hopefully the camera will be in place soon.

Pope Francis has asked Catholics throughout the world to respond to a questionnaire on the family, contraception, communion for divorced and

remarried Catholics, communion for elected officials who do not agree with church teaching, etc. The questionnaire has been sent to all bishops of the world and is available on our diocesan webpage until December 16th. I strongly encourage you to go to www.eriercd.org and click on the questionnaire and complete as much as you can. The results will be studied and analyzed at the coming Synod of Bishops and changes could come in our church teaching.

A couple who were married recently asked their guests to, rather than give them gifts, make a donation to the Saint Patrick Food Pantry. They came to the rectory recently and presented a check for \$600 for the Food Pantry. What a generous and wonderful gift.

The total cost of care for senior women and men religious topped \$1 billion in 2012. 61% of religious communities in the US have a median age of 75 or older. By 2023, retired religious will outnumber wage-earning religious by four to one. Of 548 communities who submitted data, only 8% are fully funded for retirement!

A priest was being honored after 25 years in the parish. A leading local citizen and member of the congregation was chosen to make the presentation and give a short speech at the dinner. However, he was delayed, so the priest decided to say his own few words while they waited. "I got my first impression of the parish from the very first confession I heard here. I thought I had been assigned to a terrible place. The first person to enter my confessional told me he had stolen a TV set and, when questioned by the police, was able to lie his way out of it. He had stolen money from his parents, from his employer, had an affair with his boss's wife and had used illegal drugs. I was appalled. But as the days went on, I learned that my people were not like that, and I had, indeed, come to a fine parish full of good and loving people." Just as the priest finished his talk, the man chosen to honor him arrived full of apologies at being late. He immediately began his talk by saying, "I'll never forget the first day our parish priest arrived," he said. "As a matter of fact, I had the honor of being the first person to go to confession to him!"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Soon, our parishes will be conducting the appeal for the Retirement Fund for Religious, an annual collection that benefits some 34,000 senior Sisters, Brothers, and religious order priests. As I reflect on the service of our women and men religious, I recall the words of Jesus in John's Gospel: "Whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be" (Jn 12:26). Through their prayer and ministries, religious can be found wherever Jesus is found—not just in Catholic parishes, schools, and hospitals, but also in service to the poor, the lonely, and the oppressed.

In a profound way, we also find Jesus in the ongoing witness of our elderly religious. While many continue in active and volunteer ministry, others are frail and need assistance. Yet they remain wholly committed to their vocations, accepting the limitations of aging and embracing the opportunity to focus more fully on praying for our Church and world.

Most elderly religious worked for years for small stipends, leaving a substantial gap in retirement savings. With the ever-rising cost of health care and the increase in the number of those needing care, many religious communities now struggle to provide for their senior members. The Retirement Fund for Religious offers vital financial assistance to help meet day-to-day needs for prescription medications, nursing care, and more.

In 2012, thanks to the generosity of the parishioners of the Diocese of Erie, \$182,685.05 was collected to help meet these needs.

The annual collection is an opportunity for each of us to be the presence of Jesus to our senior religious. I ask simply that you give what you can. Please join me in supporting the Retirement Fund for Religious and in praying for God's continued blessing on our nation's elderly Sisters, Brothers, and religious order priests.



Gospel: Matthew 3:1-12



This Sunday we hear John the Baptist cry out in the desert, calling us to promote the justice and peace that is the hallmark of the kingdom of God. Pope Paul VI said, "If you want peace, work for justice." This includes the difficult work of standing in solidarity with poor, working to correct unjust systems, and maintaining the dignity of every life. At Thanksgiving and in the season of Advent we witness the generosity of so many people in the way of food and gifts for our local poor. But what happens the rest of the year? What are we doing to get at the root of poverty? Social action involves walking on two feet: one foot is charity; the other is justice.
